Series Notes: The HEAT and Pacers meet for the second of four match-ups this season. Earlier this season, Miami captured the 118-83 on January 4 against Indiana. Last season, Miami won the season series, 2-1. The HEAT is 35-50 all-time versus the Pacers in the regular season, and is 8-34 in games played in Indiana. The HEAT is 27-16 in games played in Miami. Additionally, Miami's James Jones was selected in the second round (49th overall) of the 2003 NBA Draft by Indiana Pacers. He spent two seasons with Indiana before being traded to the Phoenix Suns on August 25, 2005.

MIAMI HEAT 107, ATLANTA HAWKS 87 (2/12/12): The Miami HEAT started their back-to-back-to-back set with a 107-87 win against the Atlanta Hawks. The HEAT scored the final 11 points of the first quarter to take a 12-point, 30-18, advantage after one. After the Hawks went on a small run of their own in the second, the HEAT then went on a 22-4 run to take a 58-33 lead with 1:14 left in the half on their way to a 63-41 halftime lead. Dwyane Wade had 21 points at the half for the HEAT who also got a 10-point, 10-rebound double-double from Chris Bosh and 14 points, nine rebounds and four assists from LeBron James heading into the break. The HEAT increased their lead to 32 points, 81-49, after a James' three-pointer with 4:02 remaining in the third quarter before taking an 88-61 lead into the final period as they captured the 107-87 victory. James finished with 23 points, 13 rebounds and six assists as Bosh finished with 14 points and 16 rebounds. Willie Green led the Hawks with 17 points.

MIAMI HEAT 106, WASHINGTON WIZARDS 89 (2/10/12): The Miami HEAT captured a 106-89 victory at Washington during the second game of their six-game road trip. The HEAT shot 52.4 percent in the first quarter taking a four-point, 23-19, lead after one. Behind Dwyane Wade's 14 second quarter points, Miami shot a scorching 61.9 percent in the period, taking a 10-point, 52-42, lead into halftime. After a HEAT basket, pushing their lead to 12 with 8:49 to play in the third, the Wizards went on a 13-2 run, cutting the Miami lead to only one, 62-61, at the 4:38 mark, however, the HEAT would increase their lead again, heading into the final period up seven, 74-67. Miami hit their first basket of the quarter and never looked back, increasing their lead to as many as 21 before closing out the game by 17, 106-89. Wade finished with a game-high 26 points as Bosh finished with a 24-point, 11-rebound double-double. JaVale McGee led Washington with 24 points.

QUICK HITS:

- Dwyane Wade recorded his 5,000th career field goal on 2/7 vs. CLE, and now currently has a franchise-record 5,035 career field goals.
- Miami has scored at least 50 points in the paint in 10 games already, while hitting that mark 11 times all of last season.
- The HEAT forced DET into 22 turnovers on 1/25, the eighth time this season an opponent has had at least 20 turnovers in a game.
- Miami has currently blocked a shot in a franchise-best 320 consecutive games dating back to 1/16/08.
- A HEAT player hasn't fouled out in 80-straight games; the longest streak during the shot-clock era (1954-55). The last HEAT player to foul out of a game was Mario Chalmers on 12/20/10 vs. DAL.
- Miami out-rebounded ATL by 14 (52-38) on 2/12. The HEAT is now 5-0 this season when out-rebounding their opponents by double-figures. Additionally, Miami has won their last 25-straight games when holding a double-figure rebound advantage and are 37-2 over the last four seasons in which they have accomplished the feat.
- The HEAT's 20-point win at ATL on 2/12 tied for their largest road win of the season, Miami also won by 20 at PHI on 2/3.
- Miami held a 28-point lead at ATL on 2/12, their largest since a 35-point lead (8:11 left in 3Q) in the season opener at DAL on 12/25.
- Miami last three consecutive road wins (at PHI, at WAS & at ATL) have all been by double-digits with a victory margin of 19.0ppg.
- Over his last three games, Shane Battier is averaging 10.0 points (30 total) on 66.7 percent (12-18) from the field and 50 percent (6-12) from three-point range.

A WIN TONIGHT: A win tonight would give Miami a 22-7 record, tying as their best 29-game start in franchise history. The previous best of 22-7 happened on two prior occasions, once in 1996-97 and then during the 2004-05 season.

MILWAUKEE: The HEAT has posted a 53-33 overall record against Milwaukee in their franchise's history. The 53 wins are the HEAT's third-most against any opponent in the NBA, one shy from tying New Jersey for the second-most. Additionally, the HEAT has posted a 27-17 road record against Milwaukee. The 27 wins in Milwaukee are the second-most HEAT road wins against any opponent in the NBA. Below you will find both the top five overall and road wins against any opponent in HEAT franchise history.

BENCH MOB: Miami's bench has scored at least 30 points in their last two games, both wins. The bench totaled 36 points at WAS on 2/10 and then 30 points at ATL on 2/12. That marks as the third time the HEAT bench has posted at least 30 points in consecutive games this season. They previously scored 37 points at ATL on 1/5 and the next game posted 36 points at NJ on 1/7 and then scored 30 points at DEN on 1/13 and the next game posted 35 points vs. SA on 1/17. Miami is 5-1 when their bench hits the 30-point mark.

WADE FROM THE STRIPE: Dwyane Wade has currently hit 23-straight free throws dating back to 2/5 and is now only two free throws shy from tying his career-best streak for consecutive free throws made. He previously hit 25-straight from 10/31/10 – 11/6/10. His current streak is the longest since connecting on 24-straight from 4/8/11 – 4/11/11. Below are Wade's top free throws made streaks.

TRAILING: The HEAT never trailed in the second half at ATL on 2/12 (Atlanta's last lead was 13-12 with 6:57 remaining in the 1Q). It marked the eighth time in the last 16 games the HEAT never trailed in the second half. Additionally, Miami didn't trail in the fourth quarter in the same game, marking the 12th time in the last 16 games the HEAT did not trail at all in the final period.

JANUARY: The HEAT recorded their best record for the month of January in franchise history. Miami finished the month 12-5. The HEAT's previous record for wins in January was 10, which occurred on three previous times. The record gives Miami double-figure wins in any month for the 25th time, and for the first time since December of 2010 when they posted a franchise-best 15-1 record. Additionally, Miami has now been .500 or better in 11 consecutive months, the third-longest streak in franchise history. The franchise record is 13 months from March 2004 – March 2006.

LBJ FG%: LeBron James has increased his field goal percentage in each of the past four consecutive years and in six of his seven career seasons. He is currently on pace to not only increase his field goal percentage once again this season compared to the 2010-11 season, but to also set a new career-high from the field. Below is a breakdown of James' career season-by-season shooting percentage from the field.

PLAYER OF THE MONTH: LeBron James was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Month for January. It marked the 14th time a Miami player has earned the honor in franchise history and James' fourth as a member of the HEAT. He posted nine double-doubles while leading the team in scoring 16 times, assists 15 times, minutes on 10 occasions, rebounds and steals seven times each and in blocks three times while leading the HEAT to their most wins during the month of January in franchise history. Miami finished with a 12-win month, surpassing the previous franchise-best of 10 wins which was set on three prior occasions (2001, 2002 & 2006).

PLAYER OF THE WEEK: LeBron James was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Week for games played January 23-29; for the third time this season and extending his lead for the most Player of the Week honors in league history to 34. He led the HEAT to a 4-0 week after averaging 29.0 points, 6.0 assists, 7.5 rebounds and 1.00 steals, while shooting 48.8 percent from the field. Below are the top three players that have captured both the most Player of the Week accolades in their NBA career and in HEAT franchise history.

FRANCHISE PACE: The HEAT is averaging 103.0 points per game, second-most in the NBA, while holding opponents to 95.1 points per game. Their +7.9 point differential is the third-best in the NBA. Among league leaders, they also rank first in field goal percentage (.483) and fifth in three-point field goal percentage (.388). Defensively, Miami ranks third in forced turnovers per game (17.1), seventh in opponent field goal percentage (.426) and seventh in steals per game (8.57). Below you will find the franchise's best seasons in each category compared to this season's team.

ALL-STAR WEEKEND: The NBA announced on 2/9 that HEAT forward Chris Bosh was named to the 2012 NBA All-Star Team. He will join teammates LeBron James and Dwyane Wade, who were selected as starters, on the Eastern Conference for the 2012 NBA All-Star Game. This marks as Bosh's seventh All-Star appearance as James will be taking his 24.4 points per game All-Star average, the highest scoring average in NBA All-Star history, to Orlando for his eighth All-Star appearance. Wade will be making his eighth All-Star appearance as well. The 61st NBA All-Star Game will be played at the Amway Center on Sunday, February 26.

PLAYER TICKET PROGRAM: One of the most generous and trend-setting programs in the NBA, the Miami HEAT's Community Player Ticket Outreach Program will spend the entire 2011-12 regular season reaching out to children and youth less fortunate who typically would only dream of watching a HEAT game live. HEAT players Joel Anthony, Shane Battier, Chris Bosh, Mario Chalmers, Udonis Haslem, Juwan Howard, LeBron James, Dwyane Wade along with Head Coach Erik Spoelstra and Alonzo Mourning, Vice President of Player Programs, joined forces to donate tickets for every single home game to local charitable organizations that would otherwise not have the means to attend HEAT games. Each player, based upon availability, graciously provides several private "Meet & Greet" opportunities for the groups prior to each HEAT home game, where the players give inspiring talks to the children, sign autographs and take pictures with the group. The participating organizations also attend a private viewing of the team warm-ups. Over the course of the season, the children, many for the first time, will have the opportunity to enjoy a HEAT game, courtesy of their favorite HEAT players and role models.

ERIK SPOELSTRA (Portland), Head Coach

Regular Season Coaching Record: 169-105, Currently in 4th Season

Erik Spoelstra enters his fourth season as head coach of the HEAT and his 17th as a member of the organization. Since being elevated to his current position on April 28, 2008, Spoelstra has led Miami to a 148-98 regular season record and an 18-15 mark in the postseason. He currently ranks second in franchise history in victories and winning percentage in both regular season and postseason play. In each of his three seasons the HEAT has increased its victory total and earned a postseason berth, including an Eastern Conference championship in 2010-11 and Miami's second NBA Finals appearance.

Spoelstra led Miami to a 58-24 regular season record, a Southeast Division title and an Eastern Conference championship in 2010-11. The 58 wins mark the third best total in franchise history and Miami's 28 road wins tied for the most in the NBA in 2010-11 and rank second in HEAT history. Spoelstra earned NBA Eastern Conference Coach of the Month honors in December after guiding the HEAT to a 15-1 record, including a perfect 10-0 mark on the road. The 15 total wins and 10 road victories in December each set a franchise record for any month and the HEAT established an NBA record for most consecutive road wins in a calendar month. Defense was once again the stalwart of the HEAT's success as Miami led the NBA in point differential, finished second in defensive field goal percentage and sixth in scoring defense.

After an impressive rookie campaign, Spoelstra guided Miami to a 47-35 record in 2009-10. Under his leadership the HEAT closed the season by winning 18 of its final 22 games, including a 12-3 record in March which earned him NBA Eastern Conference Coach of the Month honors. The 2009-10 season was one of its best defensive seasons for Miami as the HEAT allowed the fewest field goals in the NBA and finishing second in both points allowed and defensive field goal percentage.

During his rookie season, Spoelstra led Miami to its greatest single-season improvement. He inherited a 15-win team and directed it to a 28-win improvement, marking the greatest improvement by a rookie head coach in NBA history, bettering the previous record of a 20-win improvement by Chicago's Ed Badger during the 1976-77 season. It also marked the seventh-best single-season improvement in NBA history by any coach. As a result of a 43-win season, the most by a head coach in his first year guiding the HEAT, Spoelstra led Miami to the 2009 NBA Playoffs. The 2009 postseason appearance made Miami just the second team in NBA history to win 15-or-fewer games one year and make the postseason the next, joining the 1968-69 San Diego Rockets.

Before taking over the reins as the sixth head coach in HEAT history, Spoelstra had served Miami in a number of roles in his first 13 years. He was originally hired as video coordinator and over the years was promoted to assistant coach/video coordinator, assistant coach/advance scout and assistant coach/director of scouting before ascending to head coach. In his seven seasons as the HEAT's assistant coach/director of scouting, he had the primary role of developing game plans for upcoming opponents. To that end, he coordinated the video staff and advance scouts while overseeing the development of scouting reports and videos.

Spoelstra has earned the respect of players throughout the league with a strong reputation as a teacher over the years by heading the HEAT's Individual Player Development Program. As an assistant coach, where he also served for three seasons (2005-07) as the head coach of the HEAT's summer league team, and as the HEAT's head man now, he has worked tirelessly with many of Miami's young players in areas of fundamentals, skill development and shooting. This consistent emphasis of fundamentals contributed to the HEAT setting a franchise-record in 2008-09 for fewest turnovers in a season.

Additionally, Spoelstra helped design and integrate a proprietary statistical database and scouting software for the HEAT. Under Spoelstra, the HEAT continues to embrace the use of technology and continues to use the state-of-the-art statistical software to evaluate team productivity, individual player productivity and trends for both the HEAT and the team's opponents. That use of technology as a teaching tool also included putting the team's video playbook on iPads for his players.

In 1992, he graduated from the University of Portland with a degree in communications. While attending Portland, Spoelstra was the starting point guard for four years and was named the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year in 1989. Upon graduating he spent two years as a player/coach for Tus Herten, a team in the professional sports league of Germany.

He has returned to his native Philippines in each of the last three offseasons to host clinics and promote education, health and wellness to thousands of at-risk youth through grassroots programs and events. The 9-day program in Manila this past summer was the largest NBA FIT event ever hosted in Southeast Asia under the NBA Cares umbrella.

Raised in Portland, OR, Spoelstra, who was inducted into the Jesuit High School Athletic Hall of Fame in September 2009, is the first Asian/Filipino-American head coach in any of the major North American sports leagues.

Spoelstra is the son of Jon Spoelstra, a long-time NBA executive who has guided the Portland Trail Blazers, Denver Nuggets, Buffalo Braves and New Jersey Nets. His grandfather, Watson, was a Detroit Tigers beat writer for many years.

- **DOUBLE-DOUBLES:** Recorded his 12th double-double of the season with 23 points and 13 rebounds at ATL on 2/12, marking it the 207th double-double of his career and his 43rd as a member of the HEAT. He ranks 12th on the HEAT all-time double-double list, one shy from tying Sherman Douglas (44) for the 11th spot.
- **DOUBLE-FIGURES:** Has scored in double-figures in a career best 384 consecutive games.
- **20-10-5:** His 23-point, 13-rebound, 6-assist game at ATL on 2/12 marked as his 10th 20-10-5 game this season.

- **30+:** Scored at least 30 points in six-straight road games from 4/3/11 – 1/7/12, setting a new HEAT franchise record for consecutive 30-point games on the road. His six game streak was only one shy from tying his career best 30-point road streak which he has done on three separate occasions.
- **500:** Recorded his 500th point of the season on 1/27 vs. NY, his 18th game of the season. It ties the franchise record for the fewest games to reach the 500-point plateau. Dwyane Wade previously hit the mark in 18 games on two occasions, once during the 2006-07 and then again in 2008-09.
- **17:** With his third assist on 1/30 vs. NO, he became the 17th player in NBA history to at least score 17,000 points, grab 4,500 rebounds and dish out 4,500 assists. 13 of those players are Hall of Famers, the others are Gary Payton (recently retired), Kobe Bryant and Kevin Garnett.
- **18,000:** His 15th point on 2/3 at PHI was the 18,000th point of his career.
