Pro Career Highlights: Participated in NBA training camp with the Milwaukee Bucks in the fall of 2006. Spent the 2005-06 season in Ukraine with BC Kyiv. In Ukrainian League play, averaged 10.4 points and 6.5 rebounds in 29 games. In EuroCup play, averaged 8.5 points and 5.1 rebounds in 17 games.

College Highlights: Earned First Team All-WAC his junior and senior seasons. Finished collegiate career as the fourth player in WAC history to record 2,000 points and 1,000 rebounds. Ranks as Rice's all-time leading scorer (2,014 points, ninth all-time in the WAC) and rebounder (1,111 rebounds, fourth). Also ranks third all-time in WAC history in career field goal percentage (.602). Holds the school record for career games played (121) and ranks second in career blocked shots (119). Led the team in scoring all four years, only the third player in school history to accomplish the feat. Posted 55 career double-doubles. Started 85 of 121 career games.

Senior (2004-05): Ranked fourth in the nation in rebounding (11.7 rpg) and 15th in scoring (20.6 ppg). Also ranked 11th nationally in field goal percentage (.608). Point total of 639 ranks second all-time in school history, and rebound total of 363 ranks first. Started all 31 games. Scored in double figures in every game, surpassing the 20-point mark 19 times, and reaching the 30-point mark three times. Recorded a career-high 31 points on 11-for-13 shooting and grabbed ten rebounds vs. Grambling State. Scored 30 points and pulled down a career-high 24 rebounds vs. Hawaii, the second-best single game high in school history. Tallied 30 points, 11 rebounds, and four steals at Fresno State. Posted 25 points at Syracuse. Notched 22 points and nine rebounds at Connecticut. Scored 24 points and grabbed ten rebounds at Missouri State in the first round of the post-season NIT.

Junior (2003-04): Led team in scoring (17.5 ppg, ranked fourth in the WAC) and rebounding (8.9 rpg, third). Led the league and ranked seventh in the nation in field goal percentage (.603). Started all 33 games. Paced the team in scoring 20 times. Scored 20 or more points 13 times. Posted season highs of 30 points and 15 rebounds vs. Boise State. Tallied 27 points and 14 rebounds vs. Louisiana-Lafayette. Scored 25 points and grabbed seven rebounds vs. Connecticut. Named MVP of the BP Top of the World Classic after averaging 15.3 points and 11.3 rebounds in three games and helping lead Rice to the tournament championship. Scored 29 points vs. Hawaii in the first round of the WAC Tournament.

Sophomore (2002-03): Ranked sixth in the WAC in scoring (15.3 ppg) and fifth in rebounding (7.3 rpg). Ranked fifth in the nation in field goal percentage (.623), the second-best single season total in school history. Started four times in 28 games. Scored 20 or more points five times. Recorded eight double-doubles. Registered season-high 25 points in back-to-back games at Nevada and vs. Fresno State. Matched a season-high with 14 rebounds twice, vs. Fresno State and Nevada. Posted a 14-point, ten-rebound double-double at Stanford. Named Second Team All-WAC.

Freshman (2001-02): Averaged 12.8 points and 8.6 rebounds (ranked third in the WAC) in 24.7 minutes a contest. Ranked second in the league in field goal percentage (.572) and sixth in blocked shots (1.2 bpg). Started 17 of 29 games. Scored in double figures 22 times, with three games of 20 or more points. Registered 12 double-doubles. Scored season-high 22 points vs. San Jose State and Centenary. Posted a 21-point, 13-rebound double-double vs. Hawaii.

Personal: Was enrolled in the Wiess College. Cousin, Stephen Simmons, was an offensive lineman at TCU.
