2005-06 Season: Averaged 8.7 points and 2.9 rebounds in 23.6 minutes (79 games) ... finished seventh on the team in scoring ... led team in scoring four times and in rebounding three times ... tied two franchise records for three-pointers attempted and made in a quarter with five 3FGM (also done by Baron Davis) and seven 3FGA (also done by Davis and Dell Curry) in the fourth quarter 2/28 at SEA. ... scored in double figures in 29 games, including two 20+ point performances and one career 30+ point outing ... first career double-double (11 points/career-high 11 rebounds) 4/5 vs. GSW. ... started 19 games to finish the season, averaging 11.2 points and 4.2 rebounds ... in his best game as a starter, scored a career-high 32 points, drained a career-high seven three-pointers, hit a career-high 12 FG and grabbed two rebounds 3/21 vs. LAC. ... hit at least one three-pointer in 12 straight games between 12/21 and 1/13. ... scored in double figures 12-of-14 games between 3/21 and 4/10. ... 23 points, three rebounds and two assists 2/28 at SEA. ... career-high four offensive rebounds 2/15 vs. POR. ... 20 points, five rebounds and one block 3/29 at GSW. ... missed three games due to DNP-CD.

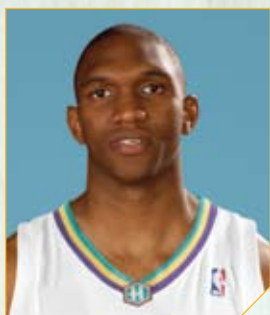

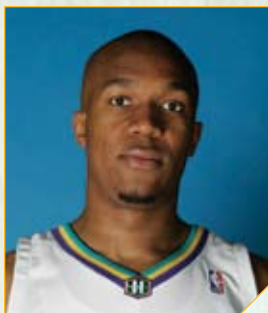
