COLLEGE: Averaged 16.9 ppg (.428 FG%, .377 3pt%, .789 FT%), 2.5 rpg, 4.4 apg, and 1.31 spg in 116 collegiate games (started 103) at Cal State Fullerton ... Finished career as the Titan's all-time leading scorer (1,961 points), ranking ninth in Big West Conference history ... Also ranks first in Fullerton annals in career three-pointers made (307) and third in assists (516) ... Averaged 20.2 ppg (.468 FG%, .388 3pt%, .789 FT%), 2.6 rpg, 5.1 apg, and 1.30 spg as a senior (2006-07), earning First Team All-Big West accolades and All-District honors from the NABC and USBWA, meriting consideration as a Bob Cousy Award finalist (bestowed on the nation's top point guard) ... Finished first in assists and ranked second in the conference in scoring behind Santa Barbara's Alex Harris ... Posted a career-high 47 points (17-20 FG, 11-13 3pt, 2-2 FT) vs. Bethune Cookman (12/16/06), setting a single-game school record for three-pointers made and tying the Big West all-time mark ... Tallied 36 points (13-24 FG, 6-13 3pt, 4-4 FT), five rebounds, four assists, two steals, and a block vs. Long Beach State (2/14/07) ... Poured in 30 points (11-23 FG, 1-6 3pt, 7-8 FT) in the First Round of the conference tournament vs. Pacific (3/8/07) ... Accrued averages of 17.5 ppg (.426 FG%, .377 3pt%, .727 FT%), 2.6 rpg, 4.6 apg, and 1.55 spg as a junior (2005-06), finishing four points shy of the Big West Conference scoring title for the second time in as many years (trailed Pacific's Christian Maraker by 0.01 ppg) ... Named to the All-Tournament squad after amassing 54 points (18-45 FG, 10-19 3pt, 8-8 FT), five rebounds, and four assists in a pair of contests at the Florida International Holiday Classic (12/27 - 12/28/05) ... Sank six three-pointers en route to 28 points (9-22 FG, 6-15 3pt, 4-4 FT) vs. Cal Poly (1/2/06) ... Averaged 16.8 ppg (.414 FG%, .348 3pt%, .827 FT%), 2.6 rpg, 4.7 apg, and 1.32 spg as a sophomore (2004-05), finishing four total points shy of the Big West scoring title—trailing teammate Ralph Holmes by 0.11 ppg ...
