The fourth oldest player in the NBA in 2005-06, he played in 62 games with two starts for the Mavericks...he averaged 2.1 ppg, 1.4 apg and 1.3 rpg in 10.0 minutes per game...he shot 43-128 from the floor (.338), 11-48 from 3-point range (.228) and 33-42 from the line (.786)...he recorded a DNP-CD 20 times and did not miss a game due to injury or illness...the Mavericks were 13-4 in games in which he tallied three or more assists...he dealt a season-high five assists in the regular season opener at Phoenix, 11/1...that was one of just two games in which he led the team in assists...he tied Adrian Griffin and Jerry Stackhouse for the Mavs' lead in assists with two against the Spurs, 3/2...he collected three or more rebounds 13 times, including a season-high 10 boards at Memphis, 12/9...in his first 25 games of the season he did not score more than six points, but against Houston, 1/18, he scored nine points, including 4-4 FTS and 1-2 3-pt FG, in 12 minutes...that was his best offensive outing until hitting on 3-4 FGS, 1-2 3-pt FGS and 1-2 FTS for his 10 points vs. Golden State, 3/23...he then scored a season-high 12 points on 4-7 FGS, 2-3 3-pt FGS and 2-2 FTS at Phoenix, 4/13...he enters the 2006-07 season ranked 12th on the NBA's all-time career free throw percentage list (.880) and shot a career-low 78.6 percent (33-42) from the line in 2005-06...he grabbed 27 steals and had a season-high two thefts eight times, including a run of three straight games, 4/8 to 4/13.

2004-05: In 66 games (14 with New Orleans, 52 with Dallas), he averaged 4.0 ppg, 2.7 apg and 1.7 rpg in 15.0 mpg...he shot 89-277 from the floor (.321), 28-111 (.252) from 3-point range and 56-88 (.853) from the line...with Dallas, he averaged 2.3 ppg, 2.2 apg and 1.3 rpg in 11.1 mpg...he started 16 games, including seven for the Mavericks...he recorded a DNP-CD with Dallas 13 times but did not miss a single game due to injury with either the Hornets or Mavericks...he led Dallas in assists eight times...he scored a season-high tying 21 points (8-17 FGS, 5-9 3-pt FGS) for New Orleans at Milwaukee, 11/13/04...he dealt a season-high tying eight assists for New Orleans vs. Phoenix, 11/17...he also had a season-high tying 21 points (9-20 FGS, 3-6 3-pt FGS) for the Hornets against the Lakers in L.A., 11/28...he handed out a season-high tying eight assists for Dallas at Houston, 12/11...**2003-04:** In 79 games for New Orleans, he averaged 10.6 ppg, 3.9 apg, 2.9 rpg and 1.68 spg in 28.4 mpg...he ranked sixth in the league in 3-point FG attempted and 18th in 3-point FG made...his steals per game ranked 11th in the league...he started 22 games and averaged 15.0 ppg, 6.5 apg and 2.0 spg as a starter...his career-high 35 points (11-21 FGS) at San Antonio, 1/24, included the game winning 3-pt FG with 1.9 seconds to play...he dished out a team season-high 15 assists at Portland, 4/3...he registered his first double-double of the season with 27 points and 11 assists vs. Dallas, 2/4...he scored 29 points with a career-high three blocked shots vs. Philadelphia, 1/21...he recorded a season-high six steals vs. Atlanta, 12/26...he missed the last three games of the season with a sprained right ankle...**2002-03:** He averaged 9.4 ppg, 3.9 apg, 3.6 rpg and team-high-tying 1.65 spg (14th in NBA) in 82 games with Orlando...he was the only Magic player to appear in all 82 games...he shot a team-high 87.8 percent (165-188) from the free throw line and ranked eighth in the NBA...he made 23 starts, averaging 10.4 ppg, 4.8 apg, 4.3 rpg and 1.43 spg in 33.0 mpg as a starter...he led the team (or tied for the team lead) in assists 23 times, including a season-high 11 assists vs. Washington, 12/30, and at Utah, 12/18...he scored in double figures 38 times, including a season-best 21 points at Minnesota, 11/1...he earned the NBA's Community Assist Award for March...**2001-02:** Playing in all 82 games with Orlando, he averaged 12.4 ppg, 5.5 apg, 3.9 rpg and 1.91 spg in 33.3 mpg...he tied for third in the NBA in free throw percentage at 88.8 percent (182-205 FTs) and ranked sixth in steals...**2000-01:** He averaged 15.9 ppg, 7.0 apg, 4.6 rpg and 1.8 spg in 75 games with Orlando...he shot 220-249 (.884) from the free throw line...he posted career-highs in assists (524), rebounds

(343) and minutes (2,767)...**1999-2000:** Starting all 82 games for the Magic, he averaged a career-high 16.2 ppg to go along with 6.1 apg, 3.3 rpg and 2.06 spg...he ranked third in the NBA in free throw percentage (.911)...his total of 169 steals ranked second highest in the league and he was third in the NBA in steals per game (2.06)...**1998-99:** The NBA's Most Improved Player, he averaged 13.8 ppg, but started just 15 of 50 games and was also named the league's Sixth Man of the Year...while leading the team in assists (6.7 apg), he was third on the team in scoring...one of two Magic players ranked in the top 10 in steals per game, he was second on the team and eighth in the league with an average of 2.16 spg...he was also third in the NBA in free throw percentage at 90.4 percent (161-178 FTS)...**1997-98:** He averaged 9.2 ppg, 4.9 apg, 3.3 rpg and 1.2 spg in 48 games with the Magic before his season was cut short by a torn rotator cuff in his right shoulder...**1996-97:** He appeared in 67 games for Orlando, averaging 6.1 ppg and 2.6 apg...**1995-96:** He averaged 3.2 ppg with Orlando...though he played in just 13 games for the Magic, he represented the team in the Slam Dunk competition during the 1996 NBA All-Star Weekend...**1994-95:** He played in the Spanish League with Coren Orense, averaging 24.6 ppg, 4.5 rpg and 2.5 apg in 38 games en route to 1994-95 European All-Star accolades...signed with the Magic as a free agent on April 8 and went on to see action in three games, scoring 10 points and dealing out three assists in eight minutes.

2005-06: He appeared in 11 games and in a total of 47 minutes for the Mavericks, he scored eight points with two assists, three steals and just one turnover...he shot just 3-of-15 from the floor and 2-2 FTS...**2004-05:** In nine games for Dallas, he averaged 2.0 points and 1.0 assists in 7.3 minutes per game...had nine points on 4-4 FGS and a team-high tying four assists in 19 minutes in Game 7 vs. Houston, 5/7/05...**2003-04:** He appeared in all seven games of New Orleans' first round matchup with Miami, averaging 3.4 ppg, 2.3 apg and 2.1 rpg in 21.4 mpg...**2002-03:** He played all seven games for Orlando against Detroit in the first round...he averaged 9.4 ppg, 3.7 apg and 2.4 rpg in 32.3 mpg...**2001-02:** He started all four games of the Magic's first-round matchup with Charlotte, averaging 15.3 ppg, 3.3 apg and 2.8 rpg in 39.5 mpg...**2000-01:** He started all four of Orlando's first-round games vs. Milwaukee, averaging 13.3 ppg, 5.5 rpg, 4.8 apg and 2.00 spg in 41.8 mpg...**1998-99:** Starting all four of Orlando's first-round games vs. Philadelphia, and matching up against Allen Iverson, he averaged 14.8 ppg, 6.3 apg, 5.0 rpg and 2.25 spg in 40.8 mpg...**1996-97:** He saw action in all five of Orlando's first-round games vs. Miami, averaging 11.4 ppg, 4.2 rpg, 3.4 apg and 1.60 spg in 28.6 mpg off the bench.

COLLEGE

A walk-on at Division II Fayetteville State in North Carolina, he averaged 14.3 points per game over the course of his career and 16.4 ppg as a senior en route to First Team Black College All-America honors and First Team All-Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference accolades...he was the 1990 CIAA Slam Dunk Champion...he was a placekicker on the school's football team for two years and kicked a school record 48-yard field goal twice.

PERSONAL

Full name is Darrell Eugene Armstrong...chose to wear number three with the Hornets in 2003-04 as a personal dedication to his favorite football player, former Washington Redskins kicker Mark Mosley (switched back to number 10 for 2004-05)...a two-time recipient of the Rich and Helen DeVos Community Enrichment Award (1998, 2000) while with the Magic...for four straight years (2000-03), was named among all professional athletes as "Good Guys in Sports" by *The Sporting News*, recognizing athletes for outstanding character and exemplary civic responsibility...established the Darrell Armstrong Foundation for Premature Babies...inducted into the Boys & Girls Club Hall of Fame in May 1998...other inductees have included Denzel Washington, Michael Jordan, Gale Sayers and Brooks Robinson...distributed toys to underprivileged kids during Christmas...earned Hometown Hero Award during the 1999 Florida Sports Awards for his community service efforts...majored in physical education at Fayetteville State...spent the summer of 1993 working the midnight shift at the Dixie Yarn Mill in his hometown of Gastonia, N.C. for \$200 a week after the Global Basketball Association folded...did not play high school basketball until his senior year...he and his wife, Deidra, have two daughters, Arkia and Mayliah, and one son, Darrell, Jr.

In 62 games with 29 starts, he averaged 10.2 ppg, 3.6 rpg, 2.8 apg and 1.08 spg in 28.5 mpg...he shot 48.0 percent (246-512 FGS) from the floor and 75.4 percent (138-183 FTS) from the line...he missed a total of 16 games with a strained neck (12/16-12/18, 12/22-12/26, 1/6-1/22 and 3/31-4/2), two due to a family emergency (1/25-1/26), one (4/19) with a strained right hamstring and one due to a coaching decision (2/4)...he averaged 17.2 points on 51.7 percent FGS in a nine-game span from 11/29 to 12/14, before missing his first game with the strained neck injury...as a starter, he averaged 13.2 ppg, 4.6 rpg, 3.7 apg and 1.3 spg...he led the team in assists 12 times and in steals 18 games...he scored in double figures 33 times and had 20 or more points four times...he led the Mavericks in scoring with a season-high 24 points in a 92-90 loss vs. San Antonio, 12/1...in that game, he shot 8-12 from the foul line, tying his career-high in free throws made and setting his career-high in attempts from the foul line...he led the Mavs in assists 13 times and dealt a season-high eight assists on three separate occasions, all of which came in a span of 10 games from 2/27 to 3/17...for the season, Dallas was 16-3 when he tallied four or more assists...one of four Dallas players to average a steal per game or better (1.08 spg) for the Mavericks, he was the only one of those four to start less than half his appearances...he recorded three or more steals in five games and had a season-high four thefts twice, both coming in the season's first 11 games...he started 10 of 11 games in December and averaged 14.4 ppg, 4.7 rpg, 3.7 apg and 35.4 mpg in those 11 games...in December, he shot 62-122 FGS (.508) and made 34-46 FGS (.739).

2004-05: He appeared in 60 games with 17 starts and averaged 9.1 ppg, 3.6 rpg, 2.1 apg and 1.38 spg in 23.5 mpg...he shot 43.7 percent (220-504) from the floor and 73.7 percent (98-133) from the line...he missed a total of 22 games due to injury, all coming before the All-Star break...he missed 15 games with a sore left ankle (12/7/04 at Minnesota and 12/28/04-1/29/05)...he missed seven games from 2/4-2/17 while recovering from an appendectomy...he scored in double figures 28 times and had 20+ points three times...he recorded three or more steals 10 times...he would have ranked 28th in the NBA in steals per game had he qualified...in his first start of the season, he scored 22 points in 31 minutes at Miami, 11/11...he registered his first career double-double with 11 points and a career-high 10 rebounds vs. Minnesota, 11/22...he scored 10 points with six rebounds, six assists and six steals vs. Utah, 12/4...he recorded a career-high and an NBA season-high tying eight steals in 31 minutes at Chicago, 12/13...he nearly posted a triple-double with 29 points, nine rebounds and eight assists vs. Sacramento, 2/24...he notched a season-high 32 points (13-30 FGS, 6-6 FTS) vs. Toronto, 3/7...**2003-04:** He was named to the NBA's All-Rookie Second Team despite seeing limited playing time before the month of March...over the final 24 games of the season, he averaged 14.0 ppg, 4.8 rpg, 3.8 apg and 1.50 spg in 30.7 mpg...for the season, he averaged 8.5 ppg, 2.6 rpg, 2.1 apg and 18.6 mpg in 56 games, including 15 starts...he shot 49.4 percent (203-411 FGS) from the floor and 76.9 percent (60-78) from the line...he ranked eighth among rookies in scoring and first in field goal percentage...he scored 10 or more points 22 times, 20 or more points six times and had 30 or more points three times...over the final 11 games of the season, averaged 20.7 ppg, 6.2 rpg, 4.9 apg and 2.09 spg, while shooting 53.0 percent from the floor...he played three complete games...he had a game-high 21 points (8-16 FGS, 2-3 3FGS), a team-high eight rebounds, seven assists and three steals in all 48 minutes at Houston, 3/14...he scored a game-high 30 points (12-19 FGS, 6-6 FTS) with eight rebounds, seven assists and four steals in 48 minutes vs. Memphis, 4/13...he recorded 31 points (15-23 FGS) and a career-high tying nine rebounds in 48 minutes at Miami, 3/26/04...he scored a career-high 33 points (14-18 FGS, 4-4 FTS) at Seattle, 4/10...he recorded a near triple-double with 14 points (6-15 FGS), a career-high tying nine rebounds and a career-high nine assists vs. Seattle, 3/2...he missed three games with the flu, 1/20-1/23.

He started all five games in the First Round series with Sacramento and averaged 15.8 ppg, 6.2 rpg, 3.0 apg and 2.00 spg in 36.8 mpg...he shot 32-75 (.427) from the floor and 14-22 (.636) from the line...he notched a double-double with 16 points and a team-high 11 rebounds in Game 2 at Sacramento, 4/20...he scored a game-high tying 22 points (10-20 FGS) in Game 3 vs. the Kings, 4/24.

COLLEGE

He was named to All-Southeastern Conference Second Team as a senior and Third Team All-SEC as a sophomore by SEC coaches...he was named SEC Player of the Year by The Birmingham News and CollegeInsider.com after his senior season...he finished his career ninth on Auburn's all-time scoring list and as the school's all-time career steals leader...he earned the team's MVP award his sophomore, junior and senior years...as a senior, he led the SEC and was 23rd in nation in steals (2.3 spg)...he ranked second in the SEC in scoring, was fifth in field goal percentage and 10th in assists...he paced the team in scoring 20 times and in rebounding 12 times...he registered a career-high 38 points on 16-21 FGS vs. Troy State...he posted a 27-point, 10-rebound, seven-assist effort vs. Georgia State...he was named the SEC Player of the Week after averaging 22.0 ppg and 6.0 rpg in wins over Alabama and at South Carolina...he averaged 23.3 points and 7.0 rebounds in three NCAA Tournament contests, scoring 25 points and grabbing eight rebounds in a win over St. Joseph's...he tallied 18 points in the Tigers' victory over Wake Forest and led the team with 27 points and nine rebounds vs. eventual NCAA champion Syracuse in the Sweet 16...as a junior, he led the team in scoring, rebounding, assists, and steals (1.9 spg)...he ranked fifth in the SEC in assists and sixth in steals...he recorded a season-high 23 points vs. Florida in the SEC Tournament...he registered a double-double with 16 points and 11 rebounds to go along with six assists vs. Kentucky...tallied 14 points and a career-high 13 rebounds at Alabama...earned SEC Player of the Week honors after registering 19 points, five rebounds, seven assists, and five steals vs. Marshall...as a sophomore, he paced the SEC in steals (2.2 spg), while leading the team in scoring and rebounding...he recorded a season-high 28 points on 13-15 FGS vs. Grambling...after becoming eligible in mid-December, he averaged 4.5 ppg in 12.7 mpg...he led the team with 16 points in his collegiate debut at Puerto Rico-Mayaguez in the San Juan Shootout...he tallied 12 points and seven rebounds vs. Iowa State in the NCAA Tournament.

PERSONAL

He graduated from college with a degree in sociology in just three and a half years...he attended Mt. Zion Christian Academy in Durham, North Carolina, the same school as Houston's Tracy McGrady...he created the Q6 Foundation, which works to fight sickle cell anemia and assist children living with the disease...it also provides affordable housing for families in the Orlando area...Q6 Foundation hosted a celebrity weekend Billiards Tournament in the summer of 2005 that raised money for these causes...he sponsors a youth basketball team out of Orlando called the "Team Daniels Showtime Ballers"...he was a frequent visitor to Mavs Summer Hoop Camps, and was the Co-Commissioner of the Dallas Mavericks Basketball League, along with Devin Harris...has adopted a playroom at Cook Children's Hospital in Ft. Worth.

ironically against the Pistons and scored 21 points with seven rebounds and five blocked shots...hitting 295-391 FTS (.754), he shot better than 75 percent from the line for the second season in a row...at the time he went down with the shoulder injury, he was among the league leaders with an average of 2.10 bpg...he blocked three or more shots 15 times...he had a season-high six blocked shots game in three consecutive NBA seasons...he finished third in the NBA Most Valuable Player voting and was second-team All-NBA...he made his second straight start in the 2004 All-Star game in Los Angeles, 2/15, and scored 16 points with a team-high nine rebounds in 28 minutes...in leading the Pacers to a 9-7 record in December, he averaged 21.2 ppg and 10.3 rpg in the month and was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Month...he collected 11 double-doubles in the Pacers' 16 games in December...one of only two Pacers' players (joining Detlef Schrempf) to ever be named Player of the Month, he garnered the award three times in the year 2003...leading the team with 348 free throws made, he shot a career-best 75.7 percent from the foul line...he recorded the fourth 20-rebound game Eastern Conference to average 20+ points and 10+ rebounds during the season, leading the Pacers in both departments...he led Indiana in blocked shots and was the first Pacers' player in the NBA to register a triple-double with points, rebounds and blocked shots, as he rejected a team NBA record 10 shots vs. Toronto, 1/22, to go with 18 points and 10 rebounds...leading the Eastern Conference in double-doubles for the second time in the last three seasons, he collected 43...his 796 total rebounds featured 594 defensive boards, a Pacers' single-season record...he ranked seventh in the NBA with an average of 2.31 bpg...voted by the fans to start the 2003 NBA All-Star game in Atlanta, 2/9, he became the second Pacers' player (along with Reggie Miller) to ever start an All-Star game...he
