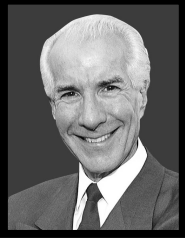

## EXECUTIVE STAFF



### ED SNIDER

#### CHAIRMAN

Ed Snider is one of the true giants of the sports and entertainment industry. His career has been guided by the principle that one must be constantly moving forward in order to succeed, and it's that philosophy that marks his leadership of Comcast-Spectacor today.

Ed first emerged as a leader in Philadelphia's sports business in 1966 when he founded the Philadelphia Flyers. He was the driving force behind the building of the Spectrum, and assumed control of the building in 1971. In 1974, Ed created Spectacor as a management company to oversee the Flyers and Spectrum. Over the next 20 years, Spectacor grew to be a national force in sports and entertainment. Under Ed's guidance, Spectacor started or acquired nearly a dozen businesses over the 20-year period 1974-1994. Many of these enterprises were sold at a time when each was the industry leader in its field.

Perhaps nothing demonstrates Ed's perseverance and desire to succeed like the development of the First Union Center, a \$210 million state-of-the-art arena completed in 1996. In the summer of 2000, the facility gained national prominence as the host facility for the Republican National Convention. Today, the First Union Center and the First Union Spectrum comprise the most active sports and entertainment complex in the world.

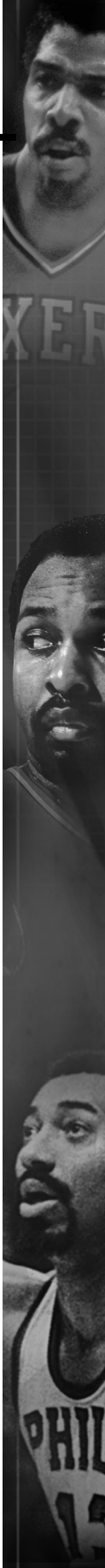
In 1996, Ed merged Spectacor into Comcast Corporation, creating Comcast-Spectacor. The new venture initially consisted of the Philadelphia Flyers, Philadelphia 76ers, First Union Center, First Union Spectrum, and Philadelphia Phantoms. Comcast-Spectacor then joined with the Philadelphia Phillies to form Comcast SportsNet, one of the highest rated regional sports networks in the country.

In the past two years, Comcast-Spectacor has developed the Flyers Skate Zone, a series of regional ice skating rinks; Global Spectrum, an international facilities management company; Ovations Food Services, a national concessions company and three minor league baseball teams, all of which are affiliates of the Baltimore Orioles. These entities all represent components of Ed's vision: take what you do well and grow it.

Ed's successes have been recognized by his peers. He was elected to the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1988 and serves on the NHL's Executive Committee. He is a recipient of the Lester Patrick Award for outstanding service to hockey in the United States and has been elected to the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame and the Flyers Hall of Fame.

In February of 2001, Ed received Temple University's First Annual Sports Leadership Award presented by The Fox School of Business and Management. In May 1999, he was selected by *Philadelphia Daily News* readers as Philly's Greatest mover and shaker of the millennium in mail-in and online balloting. In December 1999, he received the Anti-Defamation League's prestigious Americanism Award. In 1985, Ed received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from MCP Hahnemann University and in May of 1999, he received the same from Thomas Jefferson Hospital. He is also a Benefactor and Advisory Board Member of the Sol C. Snider Entrepreneurial Center of the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. Other Board memberships include Board of Overseers of the Wharton School, the Isadore Brodsky Institute for Cancer and Blood Diseases at MCP Hahnemann University, Institute for The Objectivist Center, and the Simon Wiesenthal Center.

Ed resides in suburban Philadelphia. His children include daughters Lindy, Tina, and Sarena and sons Craig, Jay, and Samuel as well as 13 grandchildren.





### LARRY BROWN

#### HEAD COACH/V.P. OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

While Larry Brown continues to carve his own special niche in 76ers history in only six seasons, it was his 30-year "body of work" as a college and professional head coach that earned him enshrinement into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame's Class of

2002. Brown's resume includes three ABA Coach of the Year awards, the 2001 NBA Coach of the Year honor, a trip to the 2001 NBA Finals and a 1988 NCAA championship.

On Nov. 26, 2002, Brown was announced as the head coach of USA Basketball Men's Senior National Team. Brown will guide the USA Basketball team during the 2003 FIBA Americas Olympic Qualifying Tournament, which will take place from August 20-31 in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Brown, who has posted a winning record in 27 of his 31 seasons as a professional head coach or collegiate head coach, had compiled a 1285-853 (.601) career record. In 20 seasons in the NBA, he has an 879-685 (.562) record. He is seventh all-time in the NBA coaching ranks for victories, having passed Cotton Fitzsimmons (832) and Jack Ramsay (864) this year, and is fourth among active coaches.

The 2002-03 campaign marks the fifth-straight season that the Sixers will be contending in the playoffs. After the team entered the All-Star Break with a 25-24 record, Brown guided his squad to nine-straight wins, and put them in a position to challenge for the top spot in the Atlantic Division and the Conference. He won back-to-back NBA Coach of the Month recognition for February and March, his fourth and fifth such honors (February 1994 with Indiana and March 1992 with the LA Clippers).

After being hired on May 5, 1997, as the 17th head coach in Philadelphia franchise history, Brown recorded his first victory as head coach of the Sixers on Nov. 12, 1997 in Houston. In his first year, he led the Sixers to a nine-win improvement, tying the seventh best single-season improvement in team history and led the franchise to its most victories in six years. In 1998-99, he guided the Sixers to their first winning season since 1990-91 as well as to the NBA Playoffs, becoming the first coach in NBA history to guide six different franchises to the playoffs. He followed that with a second-consecutive playoff appearance in 1999-2000. Brown, who also serves as the 76ers vice president of basketball operations, signed a multi-year contract with the Sixers on March 24, 2000.

2000-01 was a milestone season for Brown and the Sixers, as the team recorded its best year in nearly two decades. Brown led the 76ers to 56 wins, the most for the franchise since 1984-85 and helped tie him for his best NBA winning percentage (San Antonio, 1989-90, .683) as a coach. On April 6, he passed Gene Shue (784) for ninth place on the all-time NBA coaching victory chart. On the same night, the Sixers clinched the Atlantic Division crown for the first time since 1989-90. The next game on April 9, he led Philadelphia to the top spot in the Eastern Conference. Individually, the 2000-01 campaign was certainly one of Brown's best: he was named the NBA's Coach of the Year and made a trip to the NBA Finals, the first such accomplishments in his then 18 years as an NBA coach.

Additional honors for Brown in 2001 included being named the NBA's IBM Coach of the Month for November. He was the Eastern Conference head coach in the 2001 All-Star Game and guided the East All-Stars to a come-from-behind win, while Allen Iverson was named the game's MVP award. Brown was also selected as a finalist for the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Hustle and defense are trademarks of a Larry Brown-coached team. Traditionally, his teams are unselfish and come to compete every night. In the NBA, he has finished first in his division six times (1976-77 and 1977-78 with Denver; 1989-90 and 1990-91 with San Antonio; 1994-95 with Indiana; and 2000-01 with Philadelphia).

Prior to joining the Sixers, the 62-year-old Brown spent four seasons (1993-94 to 1996-97) as head coach of the Indiana Pacers and compiled a record of 190-138 (.579 winning percentage). The Pacers' all-time winningest NBA coach, he took the team to the playoffs three times, including the Eastern Conference Finals twice. Before joining Indiana, Brown was the head coach of the Los Angeles Clippers, San Antonio Spurs, New Jersey Nets and Denver Nuggets, who he helped transition from the ABA to the NBA in 1976-77. He took the Spurs to the postseason twice (1990 and 1991), the Clippers twice (1992 and 1993), the Nets once (1983) and the Nuggets twice (1977, 1978).

Brown spent four seasons in the ABA, earning Coach of the Year honors three times. After two seasons each with Carolina and Denver, Brown returned to the college ranks in 1979 as head coach at UCLA. The Bruins went to the national championship game in Brown's first year as coach. After a two-year stint as coach

of the New Jersey Nets (1981-83), Brown would spend the next five years as head coach at the University of Kansas, where he won the national championship in 1988.

As a coach, Brown draws on his playing days where he was a member of the 1964 gold medal U.S. Olympic basketball team. In the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, Brown added another honor to his resume as an assistant coach on the gold medal Team USA. He is the only U.S. male to both play and coach in the Olympics. The three-time ABA All-Star holds the ABA record with 23 assists in a game and was the Most Valuable Player of the ABA All-Star Game in 1968.

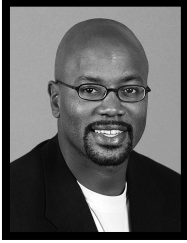

### **BILLY KING**

#### **GENERAL MANAGER**

General Manager Billy King is the 76ers point man for all trades, player procurement, and negotiation of player contracts. Now in his sixth season with the Sixers and fifth as general manager, King also manages the franchise's annual basketball operations budget.

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The 37-year-old King joined the 76ers on June 2, 1997, as vice president of basketball administration, a role in which he served as the point person for basketball operations. Less than a year later, he was promoted to General Manager, and on April 5, 2000, he was signed to a new multi-year contract with the team.

During King's tenure, the Sixers have made drastic improvements in the win-loss column. In his first season, the squad posted a nine-game improvement, sixth-best in the NBA and tied for seventh in franchise history. In 1998-99, Philadelphia earned its first appearance in the NBA Playoffs since 1990-91, advancing to the second round. The Sixers again advanced to the second round in 1999-2000. In 2000-01, the 76ers advanced to the 2001 NBA Finals, winning the Eastern Conference Championship for the first time since 1983 and claiming the Atlantic Division title. This season marks the fifth-straight trip to the playoffs, the longest since a 12-year span from 1978 to 1987, and the fourth straight with 40 or more wins.

He has reshaped the franchise by acquiring a mix of veterans and free agents, and engineered numerous trades over the years, including the three-team deal in December that brought the Sixers Kenny Thomas, and this past summer's blockbuster deal in which he acquired Todd MacCulloch and Keith Van Horn from the New Jersey Nets for Dikembe Mutombo. Additionally, this past summer, he reworked the Sixers lineup with key signees such as Monty Williams, Greg Buckner, Efthimos Rentzias and first round draft choice John Salmons.

Prior to joining the 76ers, King was an assistant coach for the Indiana Pacers under Larry Brown for four seasons. Before he joined the professional ranks, he was an assistant at Illinois State University and spent one year as a color analyst for ESPN's basketball coverage of the Ohio Valley Conference.

King was an outstanding defensive player on Duke's highly ranked teams in the late 1980s, and he received the Henry Iba Corinthian National Defensive Player of the Year award at the end of his senior season. While King was at Duke, the Blue Devils were 112-27, an average of 28 wins per season. During his collegiate career, the Blue Devils went to the Final Four twice, won the Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season championship and two ACC Tournament titles.

King currently serves on the USA Basketball's Senior National Team Committee and was named Treasurer for USA Basketball's Executive Committee. He is also a member of the NBA and WNBA competition committees.

King was honored as the Sports Executive of the Year at the Rainbow Sports Awards in July 2000, reflecting not only his accomplishments in the sports industry, but also the grace, dignity, commitment and humanity that he exemplifies. In 2001, Street and Smith's Business Journal named him one of the industries "Forty under 40." He was also inducted into Duke University's Hall of Honor on Dec. 2, 2001 in its charter group.

A Political Science major at Duke, King follows national and local politics closely. He's also a movie buff and previously hosted his own movie review show for WBNQ-Radio in Bloomington, Ill., titled "Kings Clips." King resides in Suburban Philadelphia with his Neopolitan Mastiff, "Caesar."



### **DAVE COSKEY**

#### **EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT**

With more than 21 years experience in the fields of sports and entertainment, Executive Vice President Dave Coskey has played a large part in the resurgence of the 76ers organization not just in Philadelphia, but in the NBA.

Philadelphia, but in the NBA.

During his tenure, Coskey has played an integral role in the area of attendance enhancement. Over the past seven seasons, the team has increased its overall attendance by 72 percent. In 2001-02, the Sixers had franchise records for total 842,976, average 20,560 attendance and sellouts 25. With their march to the NBA Finals in 2001, the Sixers surpassed the million fan mark for the first time in its history.

Much of this success can be attributed to the creativity that has become a cornerstone of the Sixers' marketing and promotional efforts. Innovative giveaways like the Allen Iverson Celebriduck and the 76ers Pet Rock, extraordinary game presentation, and a high-energy atmosphere at the First Union Center have created a great environment for Sixers fans.

Coskey was elevated to the position of Executive Vice President on July 25, 2001 after spending his first three seasons as vice president of marketing and operations with the 76ers. He was promoted to senior vice president in August 1999.

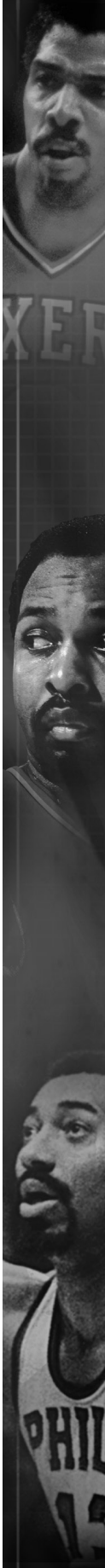
Although still responsible for overseeing the team's overall marketing, promotions, radio and television broadcasts, advertising sales, public relations, community relations, fan relations and game operations departments, Coskey is now also be responsible for the entire business operations and financial aspects of the team. Additionally, in September of 1999, Coskey was chosen by his peers to serve on the NBA's Marketing Advisory Board.

Coskey served as vice president of marketing at Trump Plaza Hotel and Casino before becoming a principal in MediaWorks Communications, an award-winning advertising, public relations and video production firm located in Linwood, NJ.

The recipient of numerous awards for achievement in the fields of advertising and public relations while at MediaWorks, Coskey played a key role in marketing of Seles-Navratilova, named sports marketing event of the year in 1995 by Brandweek Magazine, as well as several of the top-grossing pay-per-view television events of all-time including Holyfield vs. Foreman and the Howard Stern New Year's Eve special.

He is currently in the midst of his second stint with the Sixers, having previously served as the team's director of public relations and assistant director of marketing from 1986-1988.

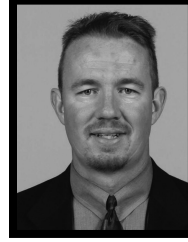
