**2006-2007 SEASON** – Named first-team All-WAC and to the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District 8 First Team, as well as earning a spot on the WAC All-Academic Team for the third straight season. Averaged a team-best 17.2 points and 4.3 rebounds per game. Finished third all-time in scoring at Boise State with 1,698 career points. Also finished in the top 10 in school history in 3-pointers, 3-pointers attempted, free throws, free throws attempted, free throw percentage, field goals, field goals attempted, assists and rebounds. Scored in double figures 25 times this season, including five games with 20 or more points. All time school leader in games played (127), 3-pointers made (266) and 3-pointers attempted (717).

**2005-2006 SEASON** – Named second-team All-WAC. Named to the U.S. Basketball Writers Association District VIII Team. Named to the NABC District 13 Second Team. Named to *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District 8 Second Team. Named to the WAC All-Academic Team for the second straight season. Became just 11<sup>th</sup> Bronco to score more than 400 points in two separate seasons. Scored 499 points, the 12<sup>th</sup> most in a season in school history. Also finished with the 16<sup>th</sup> best scoring average (17.2 ppg), the seventh most made free throws (129), the 10<sup>th</sup> most free throw attempts (162), the sixth most made 3-pointers (70) and the seventh most 3-pointers attempted (177) in a single season in school history. Named to all-tournament team at Arizona State tournament. Named to the WAC All-Academic team for the second straight season. Finished among the WAC leaders in six season-long categories and six conference-only categories. Finished eighth in the WAC in scoring for the season, while ranking third in scoring in league games with an average of 19.1 points per game. Also ranked among the league leaders in field goal percentage (8<sup>th</sup>), free throw percentage (5<sup>th</sup>), assists (5<sup>th</sup>), 3-point field goals made (3<sup>rd</sup>) and defensive rebounds (7<sup>th</sup>) in all games, while also ranking among the leaders in league games in field goal percentage (6<sup>th</sup>), free throw percentage (5<sup>th</sup>), 3-point field goal percentage (2<sup>nd</sup>), rebounding (15<sup>th</sup>), assists (8<sup>th</sup>) and 3-point field goals made (3<sup>rd</sup>). Scored in double figures in 27 of Boise State's 29 games, including a career-high 32 points against Nevada. Scored 20 or more points 11 times, including a run

of three straight against Louisiana Tech (20 on Feb. 8), Hawaii (26 on Feb. 11) and New Mexico State (23 on Feb. 15). Finished with two double-doubles (points-rebounds) when he had 19 points and a career-high 14 rebounds in a home win over Fresno State and when he had 21 points and 10 boards at Idaho State. Tied a career-high with eight assists at San Jose State. Also had seven assists twice—at Nevada and against Cal State Northridge. In addition to scoring, led Boise State in free throw percentage (70.6%), assists (117), blocks (14) and steals (tied with two others with 30).

**2004-2005 SEASON** – Named to the WAC All-Academic team. Finished sixth in the WAC in assists, while dishing out 129 during the season—the fifth most in school history. Finished sixth in the WAC in 3-point field goals made per game, while connection on 67—the seventh most in school history. Started and played in a school record 34 games for the Broncos. Finished second on the team in scoring averaging 12.7 points per game, while also grabbing 3.7 rebounds. Scored in double digits 24 times, including 20 or more points three times. Had a career-high 24 points making 5-of-8 shots, 4-of-6 three-pointers, and 10-of-12 free throws in the WAC Tournament final against UTEP. Other 20-plus point games came against Weber State when he had 22 points and at Nevada when he had 21 points. In the Weber State game, made a career-high eight baskets and six 3-pointers. Scored 19 points four times, vs. Idaho, vs. Tulsa, at SMU, and at Hawai'i. Finished with 18 points, on 7-of-10 shooting, and a career-high four steals, and five assists in Boise State's upset of nationally-ranked Nevada in the WAC Tournament. Scored 17 points once, 16 points twice, 15 points four times, 14 points once, 13 points once, 12 points four times, 11 points once, and 10 points twice. Dished out a career-high eight assists against Fresno State, while handing out seven assists three times—at BYU, at SMU, and vs. Fresno State in the WAC Tournament. Grabbed seven or more rebounds three times, including a season-high eight at SMU. Shot nine or more free throws five separate times, including making 11-of-12 against Idaho State, 10-of-11 against Henderson State, 10-of-12 against UTEP, 9-of-11 at Nevada, and 8-of-9 at Tulsa.

**2003-2004 SEASON** – Played in a then school record 33 games (along with Jason Ellis, Joe Skiffer, and Aaron Haynes), starting 17. Had one of the best freshman seasons in Boise State history when he scored 309 points, the fourth most ever by a freshman at Boise State (Steve Connor, Tanoka Beard, Steve Shephard) while becoming just the fifth Bronco freshman to score more than 300 points in a season (Connor, Beard, Shephard, and Chris Childs).

**2002-2003** — Redshirted during his first season with the Boise State basketball program.

**HIGH SCHOOL** — A graduate of Homestead High School in Mequon, Wisconsin. Earned first-team all-conference and honorable mention all-state honors as a senior after averaging 17.5 points and 5.7 rebounds per game. Hit 75% of his free throw attempts and 35% of his 3-point shots. Selected to play in the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Division I All-Star game in 2002. Finished second in the North Shore Conference in scoring as a senior. Also named to the All-Suburban Team. As a junior, averaged eight points and two rebounds per game. High school coach was John Chekouras.
