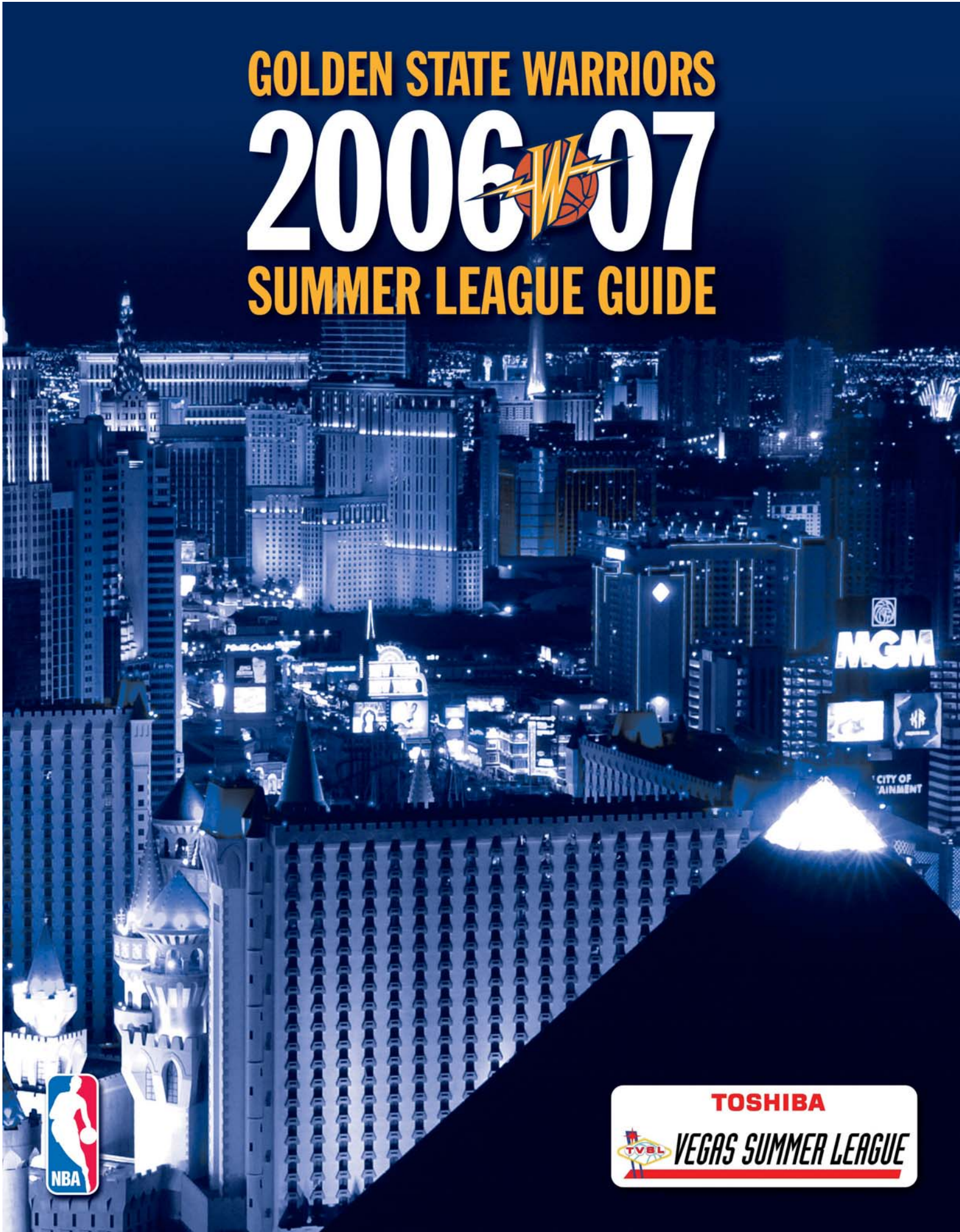

SUMMER LEAGUE NOTES

A LOOK BACK AT LAST SUMMER: The Warriors participated in the Reebok Vegas Summer League last summer, compiling a 1-4 record in five contests...2005 first-round pick (#9 overall) Ike Diogu averaged 18.4 points per contest (7th in VSL) and 8.4 rebounds (3rd in VSL)...Diogu was a member of the 2005 first team all-VSL roster...Fellow rookie Monta Ellis was a member of the second team all-VSL roster...Ellis was second on the team with a 15.8 ppg average...Second year center Andris Biedrins averaged 1.2 blocks per game (9th VSL).

SUMMER LEAGUE COACHES

Mario Elie will serve as the head coach of Golden State's entry at the Toshiba Vegas Summer League for the second consecutive year. Elie, who played 11 seasons in the NBA – including two with Golden State – completed his second year as a Warriors assistant coach and his third season on an NBA coaching staff in 2005-06.

Prior to joining the Warriors coaching staff, Elie spent the 2003-04 campaign on the bench as an assistant coach with the San Antonio Spurs.

Elie, 42, enjoyed a successful NBA playing career, averaging 8.6 points, 2.8 rebounds and 2.6 assists in 732 regular season games with Golden State, Philadelphia, Portland, Houston, San Antonio and Phoenix. He also played in 116 career playoff contests, winning three NBA Championships with Houston (1994 & 1995) and San Antonio (1999).

A native of New York City, Elie enjoyed some of his finest playing moments as a member of the Houston Rockets. He started all four games of the 1995 NBA Finals against Orlando, averaging 16.3 points, 4.3 rebounds and 3.3 assists en route to winning his second consecutive title. Additionally, his best individual season came in 1996-97, when he averaged 11.7 points, 4.0 assists and 3.0 rebounds in 78 games for the Rockets. In 1998, he was named to the Rockets 30-Year Team as one of the top 10 players in club history.

After going undrafted by the NBA in 1985 out of American International College – a Division II school in Springfield, Massachusetts – Elie played in Portugal, Argentina, Ireland, the USBL, the WBL and the CBA before making his NBA debut with the Philadelphia 76ers in December of 1990. After appearing in three games for the 76ers, Elie signed a 10-day contract with Golden State on February 23, 1991. Five days later, he signed a contract to keep him with the Warriors through the end of the following season. During his two seasons in the Bay Area (1990-91 & 1991-92), Elie appeared in 109 regular-season games, averaging 7.8 points, 3.1 rebounds and 2.0 assists in 21.1 minutes per contest. In 13 playoff contests, he averaged 10.3 points, 4.2 rebounds and 1.8 assists, while playing alongside current team executives Chris Mullin and Rod Higgins.

As a sophomore at Power Memorial High School in New York City, Elie teamed with Mullin on a junior varsity team that went 25-0. Mario (pronounced MEERY-oh) and his wife, Gina, are the parents of triplets, Gaston, Glenn and Lauren. Gina is a television personality who has most recently worked as a national correspondent for MSNBC and as a nightly news anchor for KTRK-TV in Houston. Elie, who earned a degree in human relations from American International, speaks Spanish, Portuguese and French. In March of 2005, he was named to the Northeast-10 Conference 25th Anniversary Basketball Team for his accomplishments at American International.

Russell Turner will serve as the assistant coach for the Warriors summer league team at the Toshiba Vegas Summer League. Turner, 35, concluded his second season as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors in 2005-06 after spending his first year in the NBA in that same role in 2004-05.

Among his many duties with Golden State the last two seasons, Turner has worked closely with players on individual skill development. Additionally, Turner served alongside Mario Elie as coaches for the Warriors 2005 summer league entry at the Reebok Vegas Summer League.

Prior to joining the Warriors coaching staff, Turner spent the previous four seasons at Stanford University, working alongside current Warriors' Head Coach Mike Montgomery. During his time at Stanford, the Cardinal amassed a 74-21 record (.779) and advanced to three-straight NCAA Tournaments. His duties included on-floor coaching, recruiting, scouting, game preparation and scheduling. Turner also played a prominent role in the Stanford Boys Basketball Camp each summer while on "The Farm."

Before joining the coaching staff at Stanford, Turner served as an assistant coach at Wake Forest University from 1994 to 2000. During his time at Wake Forest, the Deacons won a pair of ACC Championships and an NIT title, while reaching post-season play in all six seasons. Turner helped coach several future NBA players, including Tim Duncan, Josh Howard and Darius Songaila.

A native of Roanoke, Virginia, Turner worked for one season (1993-94) as an assistant coach at his alma mater, Hampden-Sydney (VA) College, prior to joining the staff at Wake Forest. That season, the team finished 22-8 and reached the Division III NCAA Tournament Sweet Sixteen for just the second time in school history.

As a player at Hampden-Sydney, Turner was a two-time All-American (1991-92), set the school's all-time scoring record (2,272 points) and was runner-up for the NCAA Division III Player of the Year award in 1992. His teams set school records for wins, while earning two league championships and made the school's first two appearances in the NCAA Tournament.

Turner graduated in 1992 with Magna Cum Laude honors and a B.A. in English and Economics. He also gained numerous academic honors, including introduction into Phi Beta Kappa. Born October 24, 1970, Turner and his wife Elizabeth live in Menlo Park with their daughter Devlin.

Travis Schlenk will be an assistant coach for the Warriors 2006 entry in the Toshiba Vegas Summer League. Schlenk completed his second season with the Golden State Warriors in 2005-06, his first as an assistant coach. His current duties include the preparation of scouting reports for the coaching staff and players, assisting on-court at all practice sessions and working with players on individual skill development.

Schlenk joined the Warriors prior to the 2004-05 season as a video scout, after spending the previous four years as the video coordinator for the Miami Heat. Prior to joining the Heat, he was an assistant coach at the University of Georgia during the 1998-99 season under Ron Jirsa. Schlenk's introduction to the NBA came as a member of the Orlando Magic's basketball operations staff during the 1997-98 campaign.

A native of Selden, Kansas, Schlenk earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Health Management & Human Ecology from Bethel College, where he was also a member of the school's basketball team. After graduation from Bethel, he received a Masters of Education with an emphasis in Sports Administration from Wichita State University.

Travis and his wife, Sarah, currently reside in Oakland.

2005-06 (Golden State): Appeared in 68 games (two starts), averaging 3.8 points and 4.2 rebounds in 14.7 minutes...Shot 63.8% (118-185 FG) from the field, which was tops among all NBA players with 150-or-more shot attempts...In fact, according to Elias Sports Bureau, his season-ending field goal percentage was the sixth-best in NBA history among all players who have tried a minimum of 150 shot attempts in a season...Established new career highs in every major category with the exception of free throw percentage...Was once again the youngest player on the Warriors roster, turning 20 in the last month of the season...In his last 33 games played (two starts), averaged 5.4 points and 5.6 rebounds in 19.0 minutes, while shooting 64.0% (80-125 FG) from the field...Seven points and career-high-tying 11 rebounds at Utah (4/19)...Nine points and 11 rebounds vs. Portland (4/17)...14 points and team-high 10 rebounds at Portland (4/15)...12 points (6-6 FG) vs. Washington (3/27)...First start of season (second of career) at Minnesota (3/5) and registered nine points and five rebounds...14 points and season-high 10 rebounds vs. Utah (2/27)...12 points and eight rebounds at Sacramento (2/21) and 11 points at Cleveland (2/11), marking first time in career with back-to-back games with 10-or-more points...Six rebounds and career-high six blocks in 18 minutes vs. Denver (2/6)...Eight points and season-high nine rebounds in 28 minutes...Career-high 16 points, eight rebounds and career-high three assists in career-high 32 minutes at Seattle (2/1)...Eight points (4-4 FG) at Philadelphia (12/21)...Eight points in 13 minutes vs. Toronto (11/26)...Returned to action on 11/14 vs. Chicago after missing the previous six games on the Inactive List while nursing a sprained right ankle...10-or-more points six times...10-or-more rebounds four times...Two double-doubles...Five-or-more blocks once...Led the team in rebounds six times, steals twice and blocks 12 times...Missed 12 games due to injury...Was on the inactive list for six games...DNP-CD twice.

CHECK THIS OUT: In 18 games when playing 20-or-more minutes in 2005-06, averaged 8.2 points and 6.6 rebounds.

NBA CAREER: Was selected by Golden State in the first round (11th overall) of the 2004 NBA Draft after entering the draft as an international early entry candidate...Owns career averages of 3.7 points and 4.1 rebounds in 14.1 minutes (98 games in two seasons with Golden State)...10-or-more points seven times..10-or-more rebounds eight times...Three double-doubles...Five-or-more blocks once...Was the youngest player in the NBA during his rookie season in 2004-05 and, at 18-years-old, became the youngest player ever to appear in a game for Golden State...Is the second player from Latvia to ever play in the NBA, following Gundars Vetra who played 13 games for the Minnesota Timberwolves in 1992-93.

EUROPEAN CAREER: Prior to joining the NBA, had played professionally for Skonto Riga in the Latvian Basketball League for each of the previous two seasons, averaging 9.1 points, 6.4 rebounds and 1.54 blocks in 69 contests, while shooting 61.1% from the field...Competed in the 2004 Under-18 European Championship, averaging 21.8 points, 14.4 rebounds, 4.4 blocks and 3.8 steals...Tallied 21 points and 16 rebounds against France, matching-up against highly regarded French prospect and current Seattle SuperSonics center Johan Petro...Registered 28 points and 11 rebounds against the Republic of Georgia...Logged 26 points and 20 rebounds against Italy....In 2002, participated in the Euro Junior Championship, where he averaged 6.6 points and 7.3 rebounds...In 2001, was a member of the Latvian National Team at the Euro Cadet Championship, where he finished 4th in scoring (16.3 ppg) and 3rd in rebounding (8.5 rpg). **2003-04 (Skonto Riga, Latvia):** In his second year of professional basketball, appeared in 28 Latvian League contests, averaging 18.0 points, 8.9 rebounds, 1.3 assists and 1.86 blocks, while shooting 61.5% from the field...In 11 games during the FIBA European League, averaged 18.6 points, 8.2 rebounds and 1.82 blocks. **2002-03 (Skonto Riga, Latvia):** Appeared in 41 LBL games, averaging 2.9 points, 4.6 rebounds and 1.32 blocks, while shooting 59.8% from the field...Was named Latvian League Newcomer of the Year...Appeared in 11 games during the FIBA Championship Cup, averaging 2.6 points and 4.2 rebounds, while shooting 54.5% from the field.

PERSONAL: Name is pronounced AHN-dris BE-a-drinsch...Is from the town of Riga, Latvia...Attended Valters Basketball School in Riga...Taught himself to speak English in six months while training in Los Angeles prior to the 2004 NBA Draft...Has been extremely active in Warriors community programs during his first two NBA seasons...In 2005-06, attended several season ticket holder and corporate sponsor functions, including the Corporate Partners Luau at Hap Magee Ranch Park in Danville and a pair of season ticket holder parties at Central Park Restaurant in Oakland...Took part in several pregame meet & greets with various community groups, including a visit with a traveling youth baseball team from Lithuania that he hosted at a game...Throughout the season, teamed with teammate Zarko Cabarkapa to purchase and donate tickets to every home game to various children's groups, with their guests sitting in the "A to Z" section...As a rookie, participated in the team's Thanksgiving Food Serving at Patrick David's Cafe in Danville, hosted a halftime Holiday Party for underprivileged children at the Warriors game vs. Memphis on 12/22, attended the Warriors Kids Day celebration, as well as the Run With TMC Fantasy Camp reception...Additionally, he visited injured American troops just back from Iraq at Bethesda Naval Hospital outside of Washington D.C. when the team was in the area in early March...Resides in Oakland.
