Last Game:

Indiana 109, Denver 113

Bankers Life Fieldhouse, Indianapolis, IN

In a shootout reminiscent of the era when the Pacers and Nuggets traded jump shots in the ABA, brought to life by the electric retro uniforms worn by both teams, Denver held on in the face of a valiant rally to beat Indiana 113-109 in Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Danny Granger scored 26 and David West 22 for the Pacers (17-10), who lost their third in a row. Ty Lawson scored 27 and Arron Afflalo 23 for the Nuggets (16-12), who snapped a five-game losing streak. Trailing 104-92 with 5:12 remaining, the Pacers put together a 13-2 run that included a pair of 3-pt FG from Paul George and a three-point play by Darren Collison that cut the deficit to 106-105 with 2:40 left. Arron Afflalo hit a 3-pt FG to put Denver up 111-105 with 1:35 left, but West scored twice in a row to make it a two-point game. After Afflalo missed a fadeaway with 30 seconds left, the Pacers had an opportunity to tie or take the lead, but David West misfired on a return pass to Darren Collison, resulting in a turnover that gave the ball back to the Nuggets with 10.6 seconds remaining and Afflalo iced it at the line. No more than six points separated the teams in the third quarter, though Denver held a tenuous lead most of the period. The Pacers got a big energy boost from the bench late in the period, including a couple of buckets from Tyler Hansbrough and a putback by Lance Stephenson that cut it to 85-84 late in the period, but Denver answered with a 10-1 run to push the lead to 95-85 with 9:01 remaining. The Pacers controlled most of the first half, but even the briefest lapse can prove costly against an explosive team like the Nuggets. The Pacers had theirs in the final minutes of the second quarter as Denver tore off a 15-2 run to wipe out what had been a 13-point lead just minutes before. The Pacers built that lead behind the hot shooting of Price, who scored 13 in the period, but the Nuggets came back behind Lawson and Brewer, who combined for 17 in the comeback. Granger scored 20 in the half, 18 as the Pacers rolled up a season-high 35 points in the first quarter, building a nine-point lead in the process. For the game, Granger shot 10-18 FG, but made just three buckets after the first quarter. West was 10-11 from the field, adding seven rebounds to his 22 points. Paul George scored 15 on 5-9 shooting with six rebounds and Roy Hibbert had 12 points, five rebounds and four assists. A.J. Price had a season high 13 points off the bench, all in the second quarter. The Pacers shot .532 from the field but committed 20 turnovers. Ty Lawson shot 10-17 FG for the Nuggets, while Afflalo was 8-11. Corey Brewer scored 19 with five rebounds and Al Harrington scored 10, shooting 4-18 from the field. Nene scored 11 points in 22 minutes before leaving with a strained calf muscle.

In a game that was tight throughout -- tied after each of the first three quarters -- the Grizzlies put together a late 7-1 run to create just enough breathing room to hang on for a 98-92 victory over visiting Indiana in FedEx Forum. As a result, the Pacers (17-9), who lost 97-87 Wednesday in Atlanta, have consecutive losses for the first time this season. They've lost five in a row to the Grizzlies and their last four trips to Memphis. Rudy Gay's three-point play capped a 9-0 run that put Memphis up 86-77 with 7:04 remaining. With Granger on the bench with five fouls, the Pacers missed eight shots in a row over a span of more than six minutes. Dahntay Jones broke the drought with a 3-pt FG and David West scored in the post as Indiana came back to tie it at 86-all with 4:35 remaining. The offense went dry again as the Pacers produced just one free throw in the next three and a half minutes, as Memphis pulled out to a 93-87 lead with 1:09 remaining. Though West and Granger both scored in the final minute, the Grizzlies sealed it at the free-throw line. David West had his fourth double-double as a member of the Pacers, but first since Jan. 9, with season highs of 22 points and 13 rebounds, shooting 8-13 from the field and 6-10 from the line. Danny Granger battled foul trouble and finished with 19 points, including 4-5 from the 3-point line. Dahntay Jones had 10 points off the bench. In his first game since being selected an Eastern Conference All-Star reserve, Roy Hibbert shot 1-7 FG and had a season-low five points and seven rebounds. Paul George had a career-high 10 rebounds but shot 2-13 from the floor. The Pacers shot 39 percent from the field overall and were 5-21 in the fourth quarter. Rudy Gay led Memphis with 21 points. Marreese Speights was the X-factor with a season-high 19 points, adding nine rebounds. Marc Gasol had 15 points, seven rebounds and four assists. Mike Conley scored 15 and O.J. May 13 for the Grizzlies, who shot 47 percent FG and committed just 10 turnovers.

In only their sixth loss in 16 road games, the Pacers fell to the Hawks, 87-97 at Philips Arena on Wednesday. The Hawks snapped a three-game losing streak, and the Pacers lost the second game of a back-to-back for third time out of seven sets so far this season. The Hawks started quickly, jumping out to as much as a 16-point lead in the first quarter and a 21-point lead in the second quarter, ending up being up by 18 points at halftime. Atlanta squandered away much of the 59-41 halftime lead with a poor third quarter, where the Pacers pulled within 75-69. Indiana was as close as seven points early in the fourth, but after bringing a 10-5 road record into the game, Indiana fell for the ninth straight time in Atlanta dating back to Dec. 22, 2006. Although the Pacers came back to take a one-point lead on a Paul George free throw in the fourth quarter; the Hawks came back for the win. Danny Granger led the Pacers with 21 points, and David West and Tyler Hansbrough each chipped in 15. Roy Hibbert and Darren Collison each led the game in their respective category, Hibbert with 13 rebounds and Collison with nine assists. For the Hawks, Josh Smith had 28 points, 12 rebounds, five steals, three assists and three blocks to break a slump of his own, but Hinrich was the difference maker. He entered the game having made shooting 31.4 percent in seven games since returning from shoulder surgery. He made 7-for-9 shots and 3-for-5 3-pointers, ending up with a season high of 17 points. Atlanta had allowed shooting percentages of 48.2, 50.0 and a season-worst 51.9 in losing to Memphis, Philadelphia and Phoenix in Philips Arena, but the Pacers (17-8) shot 40 percent (22-for-55) in quarters other than the third (11-for-20) and 44 percent overall (33-for-75). The Hawks scored 14 fastbreak points and had eight assists -- both stark upgrades from their three-game swoon. On the evening, Atlanta outscored Indiana 14-3 on the break. The margin was 28-11 by game's end. The Pacers are 1-8 when scoring 89 or fewer points. ... Indiana is 2-12 when its bench is out-scored (Atlanta subs out-scored the Pacers' reserves 30-27 with Hinrich and McGrady doing all the scoring for the Hawks).

PACERS' GAME NOTES



Tonight's Opponent:

The Pacers and the Miami Heat go head-to-head for the second time this season, and first time at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, on Tuesday, 2/14. The Heat has won seven of the last eight meetings. Earlier this season, the Heat handed the Pacers their largest loss of the season, 118-83, their 35th win in the series with Indiana. Despite Miami's recent run of success, the Pacers lead the all-time series with Miami, 50-35 and they have won 34 of 42 home games in the series. Since Indiana won 14 straight games against the Heat Bankers Life Fieldhouse, the Heat has won three straight on the Pacers' home floor.

- At American Airlines Arena in Miami, 1/4, the Heat shot 42-80 (.525) from the field and held the Pacers to just 24-69 FG (.348) in defeating Indiana, 118-83. The Heat's duo of LeBron James and Chris Bosh combined for 55 points on 19-32 FG and 17-19 FT, while Indiana's forwards Danny Granger and David West combined for a mere 15 points on 4-19 FG, 1-7 3-pt FG and 6-6 FT. The Heat defense forced Indiana into 23 turnovers that resulted in 28 points off turnovers and they outrebounded the Pacers, 42-36. The Pacers set a Miami opponent record for lowest field goal percentage in a quarter when they made just one of 15 attempts (.067) in the second period.

Next Opponent:

In the middle game of the Pacers' first back-to-back-to-back, the Pacers travel to Ohio to take on the Cleveland Cavaliers tomorrow, for the second of four meetings this season. The Pacers defeated the Cavs, 98-91, at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in the third game of the season, 12/30. That win was the Pacers' sixth straight against the Cavs and their 50th all-time win (50-30) at home vs. Cleveland. Overall, the win evened up the series with Cleveland, 81-81. The Pacers' current winning streak in the series is their longest since before the arrival of LeBron James to Cleveland in 2003. Before James was drafted by the Cavs, Indiana had won eight in a row in the series, then it won just seven of 25 games during his tenure for his hometown team, including his last game for the Cavs in the series, 4/9/10.

- Behind six players in double figures, the Pacers improved to 3-0 on the young season with a 98-91 win over the Cavs at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 12/30. Danny Granger scored 22 points to lead all scorers and Roy Hibbert registered his third straight double-double with 17 points and 13 rebounds. George Hill and Tyler Hansbrough combined for 26 points off the bench, as the reserves outscored the Cavs' bench, 32-29. With three players registering double-doubles and both teams shoot below 40 percent from the floor, the Pacers outrebounded Cleveland, 60-49.

Miscellaneous Team Notes:

Pacers to be Well Represented at All-Star Weekend:

- On Thursday, 2/9, Pacers center Roy Hibbert was selected to be a reserve on the Eastern Conference All-Star team, becoming the 11th player in team history to be so honored.
- Hibbert enters tonight's game ranked among the NBA's top 20 in rebounding (9.9 rpg), field goal percentage (.509), blocked shots (1.84 bpg) and double-doubles (11).
- Pacers forward/guard Paul George has been selected by NBA assistant coaches as a participant in the 2012 BBVA Rising Stars Challenge, which will take place Friday, Feb. 24.
- George is the sixth different Indiana player to participate in the Rising Stars Challenge, joining Antonio Davis, Erick Dampier, Jamaal Tinsley, Danny Granger and Sarunas Jasikevicius.
- He enters tonight's game ranked fifth among the NBA's second-year players with an average of 12.1 ppg and is sixth among sophomores with 5.6 rpg.
- He leads the team with a mark of 43.6 percent from 3-pt range, which is 13th best in the NBA, and in steals with 38. His average of 1.41 spg is 24th best in the NBA, second on the team.

Big Things Are Coming:

- With a mark of 17-10 that includes an incredible 10-7 on the road, the Pacers are off to their best overall start since they were 20-7 in the first 27 games of 2003-04.
- Including their first win in United Center since March 2008, their first win in Orlando since December 2007 and their first win in Dallas since 2004, the Pacers are 10-7 on the road this season, their best start on the road since they were 11-6 away from home to start the 2003-04 campaign.
- Until their loss to the Magic, 1/24, the Pacers had been 5-0 at home for the first time since they won their first seven home games of 2002-03.
- In 65 regular season games with Frank Vogel as head coach, the Pacers have averaged 99.6 ppg, shot 44.1 percent from the floor (2343-5317) and outrebounded (or tied on the boards) 42 opponents.
- In 2011-12, the Pacers are 16-2 when scoring at least 90 points and, until the game in Dallas, 2/3, had hit the century mark in three straight games--their longest streak since hitting the 100-point mark in 12 straight games in January and February 2011.
- Through the first 44 games of last season, the Pacers averaged 97.8 ppg and shot less than 44 percent from the field (.437).
- Defensively, the Pacers have held their last 65 opponents to an average of 98.6 points per game and those foes have shot 44.2 percent from the floor (2389-5400).
- In 2011-12, the Pacers have held 12 of their 27 opponents to 90 points or less and their loss to Orlando, 2/4, was their first in those games.

East vs. West

- In the Denver Nuggets, 2/11, the Pacers faced their eighth Western Conference opponent of the season, and their second inside Bankers Life Fieldhouse
- With the loss to Denver, the Pacers' record against the West dropped to 5-3.
- The Pacers win over the Mavericks, 2/3, was not only their first road win against the Mavericks in eight years, but it was their fourth win in five games vs. Western Conference competition this season--all of which were on the road.
- Four road wins against the West is one more than they had posted in all of 2009-10 and 2010-11 combined.
- In games against the Mavericks, Warriors and Timberwolves this season, the Pacers snapped losing streaks in those respective arenas of seven in a row, four in a row and two in a row.
- Their win in Los Angeles, 1/22, was their second in a row in an arena (STAPLES Center) where they had never defeated the Lakers before last season.

Young Lions

- The 2011-12 edition of the Indiana Pacers is once again one of the youngest teams in the NBA with only five of its current 13-man roster having more than three years of experience in the league.
- The Pacers' 2010 first round draft pick, Paul George turned 21 this summer and Lance Stephenson reached legal drinking age in September
- In contrast, the Pacers also have three players that have logged at least eight NBA seasons, including newcomer David West, Dahntay Jones and Jeff Foster. When Foster he made his first appearance on the court, he became just the second player to ever wear the Pacers' blue and gold for 13 or more seasons--joining future Hall-Famer Reggie Miller.
- The Pacers have three starters (Collison, George & Hibbert) with three years or less of experience in the NBA.

Home Court Advantage

- After playing just 10 of their first 27 games in the friendly confines of Bankers Life Fieldhouse, the Pacers will play five of their remaining seven games in February at home.
- The Pacers' loss to Denver, 2/11, was their third at home this season (6-2) and just their ninth in their last 29 regular season games at the Fieldhouse.
- Indiana's last win over the Pistons in 2010-11, 3/30, was its 21st of the season, ensuring it of a winning record at home for a 22nd straight campaign.
- That is the longest active streak in the NBA.



PACERS' GAME NOTES



Always on the Run

- In its first 11 games Indiana averaged just 9.3 ppg on the fast break with a high of 15 points in its win at New Jersey, 1/2.
- However, the Pacers have been on the run with increased regularity in the last 16 games, averaging 15.6 ppg on the break.
- Against the Magic, 2/4, the Pacers scored just nine fast break points, their fewest in the last 18 games.
- But, they came back and scored 17 fast-break points in their win over the Utah Jazz, 2/7.
- Trailing by a point at halftime, the Pacers sprinted to another double-digit win at Dallas, 2/3, scoring 12 of their 46 second-half points on the fast break.
- In all, the Pacers outscored the Mavericks, 16-11, on the fast break.
- For the season, the Pacers average 13.333 ppg on the break, ranking 13th best in the NBA.
- Conversely, the opposition has averaged 13.296 ppg on the fast break, the 13th lowest average in the NBA.

Winning the Close ones:

- In its first 12 games Indiana had no contest decided by fewer than five points.
- However, seven of Indiana's last 15 games have been decided by five or fewer points, including their win over the Jazz, 2/7, and their 113-109 loss to the Denver Nuggets, 2/11.
- Against Denver, the Pacers had their best quarter of the season, opening the contest with 35 points on 14-18 FG, 3-4 3-pt FG and 4-5 FT.
- But, after the lead grew to as large as 12 points in the second period, the Nuggets outscored the Pacers, 19-7, in the final five minutes of the half to tie the score at halftime, 60-60.
- In the second half, Denver utilized 10 Indiana turnovers to help build a lead and then hold off a late Indiana rally that cut the margin to just one with more than two and a half minutes left.
- Last season, Indiana was 7-8 in contests decided by three or fewer points.

Road Warriors

- One night after the Chicago Bulls became the first team in the NBA to win 10 road games this season, the Pacers matched them with their 10th win in 15 road games by defeating the Dallas Mavericks, 98-87, at American Airlines Center.
- That was Indiana's sixth in its last seven road games and it ended a seven-game losing streak on the Mavericks' home floor.
- With 20, only Chicago has played more road games than the Pacers' 17 games outside of Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
- The Pacers have just two road games in the remaining seven games of February.
- Including its win at Dallas, 2/3, the Pacers have ended six losing streaks of four games or longer on the opposition's home floor. The win over the Magic, 1/29, ended a six-game losing streak at Orlando and Indiana's win in Dallas ended a seven-game road losing streak in that series.

Back-to-Backs:

- Facing their fourth game in five days and their fourth set of back-to-back games in 10 days, the Pacers need a win tonight against the Denver Nuggets to avoid losing both ends of a back-to-back for the first time this season.
- Back-to-backs will play a major factor in determining the Pacers' success in 2011-12, with 23 of its 66 games coming in the second or third game of a back-to-back or back-to-back-to-back.
- In this compressed and shortened season, Indiana will have two sets of three games in three nights, the first of which will take place this coming week.
- Following its game with the Heat at Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Tuesday, the Pacers will travel to Cleveland Wednesday and return to Indianapolis immediately to face the New Jersey Nets on Thursday.

A Full Compliment:

- After a one-game hiatus, the game vs. Atlanta, 1/11, saw the return of the Pacers' "normal" starting lineup of Granger, West, Hibbert, George and Collison.
- That was also the first game in which all 13 players on the roster saw action, including Jeff Pendergraph, who had yet to play since signing as a free agent with the Pacers before training camp.
- With Danny Granger back in the team's hotel in Philadelphia, 1/9, recuperating from a case of food poisoning, Dahntay Jones made his first start of 2011-12, and his third in the last two seasons.
- That move created Indiana's second different starting combination of the season.
- Ending a run of 26 straight regular season, postseason and preseason games with the starting combination of Granger, Hansbrough, Hibbert, Collison and George, Head Coach Frank Vogel inserted veteran power forward David West into the starting lineup for the first time vs. Detroit, 12/26, and the combination of West, Granger, Hibbert, Collison and George have started 26 of the 27 games this season.

The Turnover Battle:

- Against the Denver Nuggets, 2/11, the Pacers shot better than 53 percent from the field, 36 percent from the 3-pt line, and 77 percent the free throw line.
- However, the offense was undone by 20 turnovers that resulted in 22 points for the Nuggets.
- With a chance to tie or take the lead with less than 30 seconds to play, David West's pass back to Darren Collison sailed wide of the Pacers' point guard, resulting in an over-and-back violation and two subsequent free throws by Arron Afflalo that iced the win for Denver.
- That was just the second time this season that the Pacers have had 20 or more turnovers, and the first since having a season-high 23 at Miami, 1/4.
- While committing 15 of their own, the Pacers forced the Memphis Grizzlies into just 10 turnovers at FedEx Forum, 2/10, two more than the lowest for an Indiana opponent in 2011-12.
- Both teams had seven miscues in the second half and Memphis outscored Indiana, 9-8, in points off turnovers in the final two periods.
- In building a game-high 21-point lead early in the second half, the Pacers committed just two turnovers and tallied eight points on seven Utah miscues in the first 28 and a half minutes of the game at Bankers Life Fieldhouse Tuesday.
- But, with the help of six Indiana turnovers in the final 20 minutes, the Jazz managed to turn that deficit into a three-point lead (95-92) with less than four minutes remaining.
- The Jazz scored eight points off those six miscues, including four in the first two minutes of the fourth quarter.
- While Indiana's eight turnovers vs. Utah tied its fewest of the season, the Pacers forced the Jazz into 17 miscues--its 12th game of forcing the opposition into 17 or more turnovers.
- The Pacers are now 9-3 in games in which the opposition has committed at least 17 turnovers.
- The Pacers have scored 17+ points off the opposition's turnovers in 10 of 27 games in 2011-12, including seven of the last 14.
- For the season, the Pacers average of forcing 15.67 turnovers per game is 10th best in the NBA.
- One of the worst in 2010-11 in committing turnovers, and giving up points from those mistakes, the Pacers have committed 411 miscues (15.22 topg) in the first 27 games of 2011-12. That is 16th lowest in the NBA.
- Those mistakes have resulted in 419 points off turnovers (15.519 ppg) for the opposition, tied for the 10th lowest average in the league.
- In contrast, the Pacers have averaged 15.593 points off the opposition's errors this season, 12th lowest in the NBA.



PACERS' GAME NOTES



Recycled:

- Coming off consecutive games without a rejection at all, the Pacers' leading shot-blocker, Roy Hibbert blocked two shots against the Denver Nuggets.
- That was Hibbert's 16th game this season with multiple blocks, and his sixth in the last eight.
- As a team, the Pacers rejected five shots vs. Denver, including one block each by David West, Darren Collison and A.J. Price.
- After five straight games with five or more blocked shots and averaging 6.6 bpg in that span, the Pacers have rejected 17 shots in the last four (4.25 bpg).
- In addition to his career-best 30 points and seven 3-pt FG at Dallas, 2/3, Paul George had one of the most impressive blocked shots for the Pacers this season, chasing down Jason Terry on a fast break and blocking his layup attempt from behind.
- After having its most blocked shots in 10 years with 456 (5.56) in 2010-11, Indiana is once again one of the top shot-blocking teams in the NBA.
- The Pacers have averaged 5.41 bpg this season, eighth best in the league.
- Hibbert's two blocks against the Nuggets give him a team-best 48 blocks and his average of 1.78 bpg is 10th best in the NBA.

The Goon Squad

- Helping lift the Pacers to a game-high 12-point lead, A.J. Price came off the Indiana bench to score a career-high 13 points, all in the second period.
- Price was one of four Indiana reserves to score at least four points vs. Denver and the bench outscored the Nuggets' reserves, 27-26. That was the fifth straight game in which the bench tallied 20+ points.
- In 2011-12, the Pacers' bench has scored less than 20 points just six times, but it has done so four times in the last 11 games, including its 16 points at Minnesota, 2/1, and its 10 at Dallas, 2/3.
- This season, the Pacers' bench has scored 40+ points three times, scored 28 or more points in 12 of its 27 games and averaged 27.03 ppg.

Defense Wins Games:

- Stemming the Utah Jazz tide that had turned a 21-point deficit into a three-point lead late in the game at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 2/7, the Pacers' defense bowed its neck and held the opposition to four points, and one field goal, in the final 3:47.
- That defensive stand allowed the Pacers to post their 17th win of the season and improve its record to 17-5 when allowing the opposition less than 100 points.
- However, in its three games since, the Pacers have given up an average of nearly 105 points per game (104.67 ppg) and those three opponents (Atlanta, Memphis and Denver) have shot a combined 112-236 from the floor (.475).
- Denver's 113 points are the second most scored against Indiana this season and Indiana has allowed the opposition more than 100 points just three times in 2011-12.
- Despite having shot a combined 935-2181 (.429) from the floor in the first 27 games, the Pacers have jumped out to a 17-10 record behind their defense, which has held their opponents to an average of 92.4 ppg, ninth lowest in the league, and a combined 42.5 percent from the floor--which is sixth best in the NBA.
- The Indiana interior defense has been stout through its first 27 games, holding those opponents to just 1070 points in the paint and giving up 345 second chance points on 318 offensive boards.

From the Line

- Head Coach Frank Vogel's "smash-mouth" style of basketball has put an emphasis on getting to the free throw line and, as such, the Pacers have had a definitive upper hand from the foul line in 2011-12, going a combined 532-674 (.789) from the foul line.
- Including its last two, Denver and Memphis, only seven Indiana foes have shot 30+ free throws this season, and just three of the last 12.
- Though it shot just 67 percent from the foul line, Denver benefitted from a 33-22 advantage in attempts and outscored the Pacers, 22-17, from the line in its 113-109 win at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 2/11.
- In a game ultimately decided by just six points, the Pacers left 11 points at the foul line at Memphis, 2/10, shooting 26-37 FT.
- Indiana's starting front three of David West, Danny Granger and Roy Hibbert were a combined 10-18 from the line.
- Including 15-19 from its front line, Memphis shot 29-37 FG, tying the second most free throws by an Indiana opponent this season.
- Despite an off night against the Grizzlies, the Pacers are the second best free throw shooting team in the NBA with a mark of 78.9 percent.
- This season, Indiana's foes have made 60 fewer free throws (472) on 23 fewer attempts (651).

From Downtown

- Coming off one of its most impressive displays of long range shooting ever, the Pacers have struggled to make shots from beyond the arc in the last five games.
- In those five games, the Pacers have shot a combined 27-78 from 3-pt range (.346), including 8-27 by Paul George and 2-8 from Darren Collison.
- On his way to a career-high 30 points at Dallas, 2/3, Paul George drilled 7-11 3-pt FG, one short of the franchise record for 3-pt FG made held by Reggie Miller.
- That was also two short of the most made by any player in the NBA this season. Nicholas Batum of Portland made nine just one night later.
- As a team, the Pacers shot 12-25 from 3-pt range at Dallas, getting 3-8 from Danny Granger and a combined 2-5 from Darren Collison and A.J. Price.
- Despite their recent woes, the Pacers are one of the best long distance shooting teams in the NBA with a mark of 37.0 percent, which is ninth best in the NBA.
- After starting the season 17-26 from long distance (.654), Paul George has made 31-83 3-pt FG (.373) in the last 20 games.
- After missing his first nine attempts from long distance, George Hill has made 19 of his last 41 3-pt FG, including 2-3 at Orlando.

We're Doing the Dishes!

- Including a game-high seven from Darren Collison and a season-high tying four from Roy Hibbert, six Indiana players had at least two assists against the Denver Nuggets and the team had assists on 22 of its 42 field goals.
- However, the loss to the Nuggets was Indiana's first in 10 games this season with 20 or more assists.
- While all five Indiana starters had at least one assist at Memphis, 2/10, Darren Collison was the only player on the team with more than two and he accounted for five of the team's 14 assists against the Grizzlies.
- That was the Pacers' eighth game with less than 15 assists this season.
- Collison has dealt at least five assists in 10 of the last 14 games and his average for the season of 5.5 apg is 21st best in the NBA.
- Indiana's average of 18.04 apg in 2011-12 is fourth lowest in the NBA this season.



PACERS' GAME NOTES



It Takes a Thief:

- Coming off a stretch of five games in which they grabbed 10+ steals four times and averaged 10.6 spg, the Pacers have totaled 22 steals in the last four games, including a season-low tying three against the Grizzlies in Memphis, 2/10, and six the next night vs. Denver.
- Against the Nuggets, Paul George was the only starter with a steal and his one gave him a team-best 38 on the season.
- However, his average of 1.41 spg is just a tick behind Danny Granger's 1.42 spg.
- Including two each from Lance Stephenson and A.J. Price, the bench accounted for five steals vs. Denver. Both Price and Stephenson tied their season-high.
- Danny Granger, and fellow forward, David West accounted for all of Indiana's three steals at Memphis, 2/10, with one and two, respectively.
- West has had multiple steals eight times this season, including two of the last three games. For the season, he is third on the team with 25 thefts.
- Including three of the last four, the Pacers have had fewer than seven steals in just seven of 27 games this season.
- Including his game-high three against Utah, 2/7, and his one vs. Denver, George has collected 14 steals in the last six games (2.33 spg).
- Despite having just 22 in their last four games, the Pacers have averaged more than eight steals a game (8.36 spg) in the last 11 games.
- Led by Paul George's three, the Pacers had three players with multiple steals and a total of seven players with steals against the Orlando Magic, 2/4.
- Though he hasn't played in the last seven games, George Hill, is fifth on the team with 23 thefts, and he is the only member of the Pacers with more steals than turnovers.
- For the season, Indiana is eighth in the NBA with an average of 8.48 spg.

Cleaning the Glass

- Just one night after outrebounding the Grizzlies, 48-37, in Memphis, the Pacers were outrebounded, 39-31, by the Denver Nuggets at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 2/11.
- That was Indiana's fewest rebounds this season and they were led by David West's seven.
- The team's leading rebounder on the season, Roy Hibbert (9.6 rpg) had five boards and Paul George claimed six.
- That was George's 15th with five or more boards in the last 19 games.
- The Nuggets outrebounded the Pacers, 14-6, on the offensive boards and outscored Indiana, 18-13, in second chance points.
- Including a 16-5 edge on the offensive boards, the Pacers outrebounded the Grizzlies, 48-37, at Memphis last night.
- David West had a season-high 13 boards to lead the Pacers and Paul George claimed a career-best 10 for his first career double-double.
- The loss to the Grizzlies was the Pacers' third in 15 games in which they outrebounded the opposition.
- In 65 games since Frank Vogel took over the reins as head coach midway through last season, the Pacers have outrebounded their opponent 42 times, including a 45-43 edge over the Orlando Magic at Bankers Life Fieldhouse, 2/4.
- In that game, four Indiana players had a team-high seven boards and a total of six had five or more.
- After averaging 11.7 offensive rebounds per game in the previous 10, the Pacers have accumulated 189 offensive boards in the last 16 games.
- The Pacers have had 40+ rebounds 21 times and 50 or more boards five times.
- For the season, the Pacers are fifth in the NBA in total rebounds per game (43.79) and are ninth in the league in offensive rebounds per contest (12.00).
- The Pacers outscored Memphis, 17-9, in second chance points and that was Indiana's most points from offensive rebounds in its last 15 games.
- While Roy Hibbert is 14th in the league with an average of 9.6 rpg, David West is 36th with an average of 6.9 rpg.

In the Paint:

- Despite scoring 40+ points for the second time in the last six games and posting their second most points in the paint of the last eight games, the Pacers were thoroughly outmuscled in the paint by the Denver Nuggets, who played the final 20 minutes of the game without their best interior scorer, Nenê.
- The fourth team to score 50+ points in the paint vs. Indiana this season, Denver outscored the Pacers, 62-46, in the paint.
- The loss was Indiana's seventh in 13 games in which it was outscored in the paint.
- Indiana's defensive average of 39.630 ppg in the paint is 15th lowest in the NBA and the opposition has scored 42.903 percent of its points from inside the paint. That is 12th highest in the NBA.
- Despite scoring just 34 points in the paint at Memphis, Indiana has averaged 40.889 ppg in the paint, 12th best in the NBA this season.

Offensive Juggernaut:

- The Pacers have scored 100+ points in five of the last nine games, after doing so just one time in the first 18 games of the season.
- In the last 18 outings, Indiana has topped 45 percent from the field nine times, after doing so just two times in the first nine games.
- The Pacers have won five of their last nine games and averaged 104.6 ppg in those victories.
- The Pacers are now 16-2 this season when scoring 90 or more points.
- The Pacers managed to come away with a win in a game in which it shot less than 40 percent from the field for the fourth time this season with their 97-83 home victory over Boston, 1/14.
- In that game, the Pacers hit just 35-94 FG (.372) and 5-16 3-pt FG, but it also shot 22-23 FT (.957).
- The Pacers started the 2011-12 campaign with three wins in their first four games, despite averaging just 91.8 ppg and shooting less than 40 percent from the floor in each game.
- The season-opening game with Detroit, 12/26, ended a run of 31 straight losses in games in which the Pacers had shot below 40 percent that had stretched back to the 2009-10 season.
- Indiana was 0-19 in such games last season.
- With an average of 94.6 ppg, the Pacers are 17th in the NBA and they are 24th with a mark of 42.9 percent shooting from the floor.

Frank Vogel was named head coach of the Pacers, July 6, 2011, after serving as head coach the last 38 games of the 2010-11 season. He is currently the youngest head coach in the National Basketball Association at the age of 38, a result of perseverance, hard work and dedication to the sport.

Vogel took over for Jim O'Brien, Jan. 30, 2011, and guided the Pacers to a 20-18 record and their first playoff berth in four seasons. In the first round of the Eastern Conference Playoffs against the Chicago Bulls, who had the NBA's best regular season record, the Pacers lost the best-seven series, 4-1, but the Pacers left their mark in the highly-competitive series.

"We're very happy to have Frank as our coach," said Pacers President of Basketball Operations Larry Bird.

"I had numerous talks with Frank and the things he wants to do and along with his staff (associate head coach Brian Shaw, assistant coaches Dan Burke and Jim Boylen), I feel very comfortable we're moving in the right direction."

"I'm very grateful to (team owner) Herb Simon, Larry Bird and (general manager) David Morway for giving me this opportunity," said Vogel. "This is a challenge I embrace and look forward to. Our team last year finished strong with a positive playoff showing and it's something we all can definitely build on. We took a huge step as a team, as a franchise, and it was a big step, but we're not satisfied with that by any stretch."

Vogel, who is entering his 15th NBA season (eight as an assistant coach), got his start in the NBA as the head video coordinator with the Boston Celtics under Rick Pitino. He served in that role from 1997-2001 before becoming an assistant coach with the Celtics under O'Brien, following O'Brien as an assistant in Philadelphia and in 2007 with the Pacers. Vogel spent two seasons as an advance scout for the Los Angeles Lakers (2005-06) and Washington Wizards (2006-07).

Vogel is a graduate of the University of Kentucky with a degree in biology and became the Wildcats video coordinator after graduation. He attended Juniata College in Huntington, Pa., where he was a three-year starter for the Division III Eagles. He then transferred to Kentucky, became a student manager and played on the junior varsity team in 1996. While at Juniata, he made a decision that changed his life. An admirer of Pitino, who was the coach at Kentucky, Frank wanted to learn about coaching from Pitino. He made numerous requests to get to Kentucky as a walk-on, a student manager, anything. He finally got through to Jim O'Brien, as assistant to Pitino, who saw to it that Frank became a student manager, even though the Wildcats preferred in-state students for that job.

Frank was also a member of the junior varsity that year and his work ethic landed him the job as Kentucky's video coordinator after graduation. Pitino left Kentucky for the head coach's position with the Boston Celtics and took Frank with him as the head video coordinator. He had that role until Pitino left and O'Brien became the head coach of the Celtics, naming Frank as an assistant.

As a youth, Vogel attended basketball camps and encountered an instructor who taught him if he believed in something and put his mind to it, he could accomplish anything. The instructor used spinning a basketball on his finger as an example and then spun it on a toothbrush. Frank practiced and practiced the same trick until he, too, accomplished it and brushed his teeth with the toothbrush while spinning the basketball on the end of it. That skill earned him, as a 13-year-old, a national television appearance on "Late Night With David Letterman" in the Stupid Human Tricks segment. It was forerunner of the perseverance that has made Frank one of the rising young stars in coaching.

Frank and his wife, Jenifer, have two daughters, Alexa and Arianna. An avid Philadelphia Phillies and Eagles' fan, his hobbies include spending time with his children, golf, movies and backyard barbeques.
