GAME RECAPS DURING FIRST ROUND:

Game #1: Aug. 18 @ Milwaukee – Magic 122, Bucks 110: Nikola Vučević led six Magic players in double figures with 35 points and 13 rebounds, as Orlando defeated Milwaukee, 122-110, in Game #1 of their best-of-seven First Round playoff series at The Field House at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World. Terrence Ross scored 18 points for the Magic, while Markelle Fultz and Gary Clark each netted 15 points. Giannis Antetokounmpo led the Bucks with 31 points, 17 rebounds and seven assists, while George Hill added 16 points. Orlando shot 49.4 percent from the floor, including 16-of-41 from three-point range, while holding Milwaukee to 43.3 percent shooting. The Magic led 33-23 after the first quarter and 62-52 at halftime. The Bucks would open the third quarter with a 16-7 run and cut the deficit to 69-68 with 8:33 left. However, it was as close as Milwaukee would get. Orlando led 92-79 after the third quarter and by as many as 18 points.

Game #2: Aug. 20 @ Milwaukee – Bucks 111, Magic 96: Giannis Antetokounmpo tallied 28 points, 20 rebounds and five assists, as Milwaukee defeated Orlando, 111-96, in Game #2 of their best-of-seven First Round playoff series at The Field House at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World. Brook Lopez scored 20 points for the Bucks, including 4-of-8 from three-point range, while Pat Connaughton added 15 points, going 5-of-8 from three-point range. Nikola Vučević led the Magic with 32 points and 10 rebounds. The Bucks jumped on the Magic early, leading 25-13 after the first quarter, and never looked back. Orlando made just 3-of-23 shots during the first quarter and trailed by as many as 23 points during the first half. The Magic trimmed the deficit to 101-92 with 3:56 remaining, but that would be as close as they would get. Orlando shot 34.8 percent from the floor and made 7-of-33 from three-point range. Milwaukee outrebounded the Magic, 57-42.

Game #3: Aug. 22 vs. Milwaukee – Bucks 121, Magic 107: Giannis Antetokounmpo recorded 35 points on 12-of-14 shooting from the floor, tallied 11 rebounds and seven assists, as Milwaukee defeated Orlando, 121-107, in Game #3 of their best-of-seven First Round playoff series at The Field House at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World. Khris Middleton had 17 points, eight rebounds and six assists for the Bucks, while Brook Lopez added 16 points. D.J. Augustin led the Magic with 24 points and six assists, while Nikola Vučević and Terrence Ross each scored 20 points. Milwaukee shot 56.1 percent from the floor and was 17-of-37 from three-point range. Orlando connected on a team playoff record 19-of-40 from three-point range, but shot only 44.7 percent from the floor and committed 18 turnovers, which led to 25 Bucks points. After leading 31-23 following the first quarter, Milwaukee seized control of the game during the second quarter, outscoring the Magic, 39-20, and led 70-43 at halftime. The 70 points were the most Orlando had ever allowed in a half during a playoff game. The Bucks led by as many as 34 points during the second half.

Game #4: Aug. 24 vs. Milwaukee – Bucks 121, Magic 106: Giannis Antetokounmpo tallied 31 points, 15 rebounds and eight assists, as Milwaukee defeated Orlando, 121-106, in Game #4 of their best-of-seven First Round playoff series at The Field House at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World. Khris Middleton scored 21 points, including 18 during the fourth quarter, and pulled down 10 rebounds. Nikola Vučević led five Magic players in double figures with 31 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists. Terrence Ross netted 19 points off the bench, while Markelle Fultz recorded 15 points and seven assists. Milwaukee shot 49.5 percent from the floor, including 17-of-41 from three-point range. Orlando connected on 18-of-45 from three-point range, but shot 41.4 percent from the field and committed 16 turnovers. Milwaukee led 84-81 heading into the fourth quarter, where it took control of the contest. The Bucks opened the quarter with an 18-2 run and outscored the Magic, 37-25.

Game #5: Aug. 29 @ Milwaukee – Bucks 118, Magic 104: Giannis Antetokounmpo had 28 points and 17 rebounds, as Milwaukee defeated Orlando, 118-104, in Game #5 of their best-of-seven First Round playoff series at AdventHealth Arena at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World. The Bucks win the series, 4-1, and advance to the Eastern Conference Semifinals. Khris Middleton recorded 21 points, 10 rebounds and seven assists for the Bucks, while Brook Lopez added 16 points. Nikola Vučević led the Magic with 22 points, 15 rebounds and five assists, while Evan Fournier netted 18 points. Orlando shot just 39.4 percent from the floor. Milwaukee led 67-50 at halftime and by as many as 21 points during the second half. The Magic would not quit and went on a 24-7 run during the second half, cutting the deficit to 96-93 with 7:39 remaining in the game. However, it was as close as Orlando would get. Milwaukee answered with a 9-0 run and put the game out of reach.

MAKING MAGIC...

On Aug. 7, the Orlando Magic clinched a berth into the 2020 NBA Playoffs...The Magic have now advanced to the playoffs 16 times during their relatively short 31-year history...The Magic have won six division championships (1995, 1996, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2019) and made two NBA Finals appearances after capturing Eastern Conference titles in 1995 and 2009...During their first trip in 1995, Orlando became the second-fastest team in NBA history to reach the Finals in just its sixth year of existence.

Orlando has advanced to the playoffs for the first time in eight years in back-to-back seasons (since 2010-11 and 2011-12, which capped off six straight appearances)...Last season (2018-19), the Magic went 22-9 during their last 31 games to finish 42-40 en route to a playoff berth...The +17 wins from the previous season was the best win improvement in the NBA...From Jan. 31 to the end of the regular season, the Magic recorded the third-best winning percentage in the NBA, going 22-9 (Houston 24-8, Milwaukee 24-9), and had the best defensive rating in the league.

THE HAPPIEST PLACE ON EARTH...

The remainder of the 2019-20 NBA season and 2020 NBA Playoffs will be held at Walt Disney World Resort in Lake Buena Vista, Fla., as a single site for a campus for all games, practices and housing...Since becoming a 'Champion of the Community' partner with the Orlando Magic in 2010, Walt Disney World Resort has been working with the Magic on outreach initiatives that benefit the local community and make Central Florida a better place to live, work and play...Then in June 2017, the partnership continued to grow, as Disney became the Magic's first jersey sponsor...The uniform sponsorship has strengthened the partnership between Disney and the Magic, and has connected both fan bases, provided shared marketing opportunities and cemented Central Florida's reputation as a global sports destination...The Magic also held their training camps at Disney's Wide World of Sports Complex in 1997 and 2003.

****MAGIC TRICKS – KEEPING THINGS NEUTRAL****

The Orlando Magic and the other 21 NBA teams will essentially be playing neutral site games at Walt Disney World Resort for the remainder of the 2019-20 season and 2020 NBA Playoffs...Entering the restart, Orlando had played five neutral site, regular season games in its history, going 4-1 in those outings...The Magic went 2-0 in Tokyo against the then-New Jersey Nets Nov. 7-8, 1996...Orlando lost to Toronto in London on Jan. 14, 2016, but went 2-0 against Chicago and Utah in Mexico City Dec. 13-15, 2018...The Magic were 3-5 in the Seeding Games at Walt Disney World.

SO ABOUT GAME #1...

Orlando defeated Milwaukee in Game #1 on Aug. 18, 122-110...The Magic are now 13-13 all-time in Game #1's during their playoff history (8-6 at home, 4-7 on the road, 1-0 at Disney World restart)...When Orlando wins Game #1 of a playoff series, they are 10-3 in those series (only losses were in 2003 First Round vs. Detroit, 4-3; 2012 First Round vs. Indiana, 4-1; 2019 First Round vs. Toronto, 4-1).

Prior to the Magic's win over the Bucks, the last time the team with the best record in the NBA lost their playoff opener was during the 2007 Playoffs, when Dallas dropped Game #1 to Golden State on Apr. 21, 2007, 97-85...Along with Orlando beating Milwaukee in the East, 8-seed Portland defeated 1-seed L.A. Lakers on Aug. 18...The last time both 1-seeds lost Game #1 of their First Round series was 2003, when the Magic beat Detroit in the East and Phoenix defeated San Antonio in the West.

Orlando finished the 2019-20 regular season with a .452 winning percentage...That is the lowest win percentage by a team to win their first playoff game of a postseason since the St. Louis Hawks in 1966, who had a .450 win percentage and defeated Washington.

CLIFF NOTES...

Steve Clifford became the 14th head coach in Orlando Magic history on May 30, 2018, bringing more than 30 years of coaching experience at the NBA and collegiate levels, including helping the Magic to the 2009 NBA Finals as an assistant coach...He spent five seasons as an assistant in Orlando from 2007-12...Clifford recorded his 200th career NBA head coaching regular season victory on Nov. 5, 2018 vs. Cleveland...Clifford has compiled a 271-294 (.480) record (196-214 (.478) with Charlotte from 2013-18; 75-80 (.484) record with Orlando), including 31-35 this season.

MAGIC TRICKS – 500

Steve Clifford coached his 500th regular season NBA game on Nov. 6 @ Dallas.

MAGIC TRICKS – CHALLENGE ACCEPTED!

This season, the NBA has implemented the Coach's Challenge, which allows a head coach to trigger one instant replay review per game of a called foul, called out-of-bounds violation or called goaltending/basket interference violation.

Steve Clifford was 15-of-27 (.556) this season on Coach's Challenge attempts.

HOMELAND...

Orlando was 18-17 this season in home games (16-15 at the Amway Center, 2-2 during the NBA Restart at Disney)...The Magic were 25-16 last season at home (including two wins Dec. 13-15 in Mexico City)...The 25 home wins were the most in a season for Orlando since 2010-11, where they went 29-12...Orlando has gone 188-201 (.483) at the Amway Center since it opened in 2010-11...The Magic closed Amway Arena after 2009-10 with an all-time record of 535-309 (.634) in that building.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN...

Orlando was 15-23 this season in road games (14-20 in true road games, 1-3 during the NBA Restart at Disney)...The Magic were 17-24 last season away from home...The 17 road wins were the most Orlando had since 2010-11 (23-18 record).

OFFENSIVE BEHAVIOR...

The Orlando Magic averaged 107.0 ppg. (535 points) during the playoffs...The Magic scored 122 points during their 122-110 victory during Game #1 @ Milwaukee on Aug. 18...It was the second-most points scored during a playoff game in franchise history...The team playoff record for most points in a game is 124, set on Apr. 28, 1995 vs. Boston...It marked the fourth time in franchise history that the Magic have scored 120+ points during a playoff game.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic averaged 107.3 ppg. (7,831 points), recorded 100+ points 48 times (29-19 record), 110+ points 28 times (24-4 record), and 120+ points 15 times (15-0 record), including a season-high 136 points on Feb. 28 vs. Minnesota...Last season, the Magic averaged 107.3 ppg. (8,800 points), scored 100+ points 57 times (38-19 record), 110+ points 36 times (25-11 record) and 120+ points 13 times (11-2 record).

The Orlando Magic shot .420 (186-443) from the floor during the playoffs...During the regular season, the Magic shot .444 (2,871-6,468) from the floor this season and shot 50 percent or better 11 times (10-1 record), including a season-high .607 (51-84) on Mar. 6 @ Minnesota...Last season, the Magic shot .454 (3,316-7,307) from the floor and shot 50 percent or better 19 times (14-5 record)...Since the 2008-09 campaign, Orlando is 150-42 (.781) when shooting 50 percent or better from the field.

MAGIC TRICKS – SCOREBOARD

During their last 20 regular season games (Feb. 10-Aug. 13), the Orlando Magic averaged 118.3 points per game (2,366 points), scored 110+ points 14 times, 120+ points nine times and 130+ points six times.



The Orlando Magic scored 100+ points in 15 consecutive games from Feb. 10-Aug. 4, before being held to 99 points during their 109-99 loss to Toronto on Aug. 5...It was the second-longest streak of scoring 100+ points in franchise history...The longest streak of 100+ points is 30 games, from Feb. 24, 1990-Nov. 2, 1990.

From Mar. 6-Aug. 2, the Orlando Magic scored 120+ points in five consecutive games, marking the first time in franchise history that they scored 120+ in five straight outings...The previous longest streak was three games, from Feb. 24-27, 1991.

On four different occasions this season, the Orlando Magic scored 125-or-more points in consecutive games...The Magic accomplished the feat Dec. 3-4, Feb. 26-28, Mar. 6-8 and July 31-Aug. 2...Prior to this season, Orlando had recorded 125+ points in consecutive games just two times in its 30-year history...The Magic also did it Apr. 1-3, 1990 and Nov. 17-18, 2018.

***Orlando has never scored 125+ points in three straight outings.*

On Feb. 26 @ Atlanta, the Orlando Magic defeated the Hawks, 130-120...During the next game on Feb. 28 vs. Minnesota, the Magic defeated the Timberwolves, 136-125... It marks only the second time in franchise history that Orlando has recorded 130-or-more points in consecutive games...The Magic also did it Nov. 17-18, 2018...Orlando scored 130+ points seven times this season (7-0 record).

****MAGIC TRICKS – HALF OFF SCORING****

On Aug. 2 vs. Sacramento, the Orlando Magic scored 78 points during the first half of their 132-116 victory...The 78 points tied for the second-most during a first half in franchise history...Then on Aug. 13 vs. New Orleans, the Magic scored 77 points during the first half, tying for the fourth-most during a first half in team history...The team record for most points during a first half is 81, set on Apr. 5, 2019 vs. Atlanta:

THREE'S COMPANY...

The Orlando Magic shot .377 (75-199) from three-point range during the playoffs...The Magic connected on 19 three-pointers during Game #3 vs. Milwaukee on Aug. 22...It was the most three-pointers made during a playoff game in franchise history...The previous team playoff record for most three-pointers in a game was 17, set on May 26, 2009 vs. Cleveland.

The Magic went 18-of-45 during Game #4 vs. Milwaukee on Aug. 24...The 45 three-point attempts were the most three-pointers attempted during a playoff game in franchise history...The previous team playoff record for most three-pointers attempted in a game was 44, set on April 19, 2019 vs. Toronto.

The Orlando Magic have made at least one three-point field goal in 1,057 consecutive games, dating all the way back to Mar. 17, 2007 (last game without a three-pointer: Mar. 14, 2007 vs. Utah, 0-for-9)...It stands as the fifth-longest active streak in the NBA...The Phoenix Suns have connected on at least one three-pointer in 1,295 games dating back from Mar. 29, 2004, the longest streak in NBA history...The last time an NBA team did not make a three-pointer was Feb. 5, 2016, when Miami went 0-for-9 @ Charlotte.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic shot .343 (807-2,354) from three-point range and made 10+ three-pointers 48 times (27-21 record), including a season-high 18 three-pointers on Feb. 10 vs. Atlanta and Aug. 2 vs. Sacramento...Last season, the Magic shot .356 (937-2,633) from three-point range, which ranked 11th in the NBA, and made 10+ three-pointers 63 times (37-26 record).

Last season, the Magic broke the team records for most three-pointers made and attempted in single season, which were both set in 2017-18, shooting 844-of-2,405.

The Orlando Magic shot .838 (88-105) from the free throw line during the playoffs.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic shot .774 (1,282-1,656) from the free throw line...Last season, the Magic shot a team-record .782 (1,231-1,575) from the free throw line, which ranked 12th in the NBA...The previous team record for highest free throw percentage in a season was .777 (1,616-2,079), set during the 2002-03 campaign.

****MAGIC TRICKS – NOTHING’S FOR FREE****

On Nov. 10 vs. Indiana, the Magic (6) and Pacers (5) combined for 11 free throw attempts, breaking the NBA record for fewest free throw attempts by two teams combined in a single game...The old NBA record was 12, set on Mar. 28, 1980 by the L.A. Lakers (3) and San Diego (9).

QUARTERLY REPORT...

The Orlando Magic scored 30+ points during a quarter eight times during the playoffs, including a playoff-high 34 points during the third quarter on Aug. 22 vs. Milwaukee in Game #3 and second quarter on Aug. 24 vs. Milwaukee in Game #4.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic scored 30+ points during a quarter 89 times this season and had 40+ points eight times, including a season-high 44 points during the first quarter on Aug. 2 vs. Sacramento...The 44 points also tied a team record for most points scored in a first quarter (also had 44 in the first quarter on Feb. 8, 2008 vs. L.A. Lakers and Nov. 18, 2018 vs. New York)...Last season, the Magic had 30+ points in a quarter 113 times...The most points ever scored in any quarter in franchise history is 49, set on Feb. 20, 1995 @ Milwaukee (third quarter).

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic had five-or-more players score in double figures 54 times (26-28 record), had six-plus players score in double figures 25 times (17-8 record) and seven-or-more players with 10+ points five times (5-0 record), including a franchise-record-tying eight players on Dec. 15 @ New Orleans...Last season, the Magic had five-or-more players scored in double figures 48 times (29-19 record), had six-or-more players score in double figures 23 times (15-8 record) and a season-high seven players score 10+ six times (4-2 record)...Orlando has now had a team-record eight players score 10+ points eight times in franchise history.

THIS SPACE IS RESERVED...

The Orlando Magic reserves averaged 39.8 ppg. (199 points) during the playoffs and scored a playoff-high 62 points on Aug. 22 vs. Milwaukee in Game #3.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic reserves averaged 38.1 ppg. (2,778 points), had 40+ points 29 times (15-14 record) and 50+ points nine times (9-0 record), including a season-high 65 points on Mar. 10 @ Memphis and Aug. 2 vs. Sacramento...Orlando's bench outscored (or tied) the opposition's 40 times (20-20 record)...Last season, the Magic averaged 35.9 ppg. (2,940 points), scored 40+ points 31 times (20-11 record) and outscored (or tied) their opponent's reserves 41 times (26-15 record)...The most points scored off the bench in team history is 85, done on Mar. 26, 1995 vs. Golden State.

****MAGIC TRICKS – CALLING FOR BACKUP****

On Mar. 8 @ Houston, the Orlando Magic received 61 points off the bench...The following game on Mar. 10 @ Memphis, the Magic reserves tallied a season-high 65 points...It marks the first time Orlando had 60+ points in consecutive games since Dec. 15-17, 1999.

D.J. Augustin, Michael Carter-Williams and Terrence Ross each scored 15+ points in three consecutive games from Mar. 6-10...Per Elias Sports Bureau, they are the first trio from the same team to have 15+ points off the bench in three straight games since the NBA officially started tracking starters and bench players in 1970-71.

DISHING IT OUT...

The Orlando Magic averaged 23.8 apg. (119 assists) during the playoffs...They dished out 20+ assists four times (1-3 record), including a playoff-high 29 assists on Aug. 18 @ Milwaukee in Game #1.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic averaged 23.9 apg. (1,747 assists), dished out 20+ assists 63 times (31-32 record) and 30+ assists ten times (10-0 record), including a season-high 36 assists on Feb. 28 vs. Minnesota...Last season, the Magic averaged 25.5 apg. (2,095 assists), which ranked 12th in the NBA, dished out 20+ assists 75 times (42-33 record) and 30+ assists 14 times (10-4 record).

(7,905 points), which ranked fifth in the NBA...Orlando held its opponent to under 100 points 16 times (12-4 record) and under 90 points eight times (8-0 record), including a season-low 83 points on Oct. 30 vs. New York and Jan. 20 @ Charlotte...Last season, the Magic allowed 106.6 ppg. (8,742 points), which ranked fifth in the NBA, and held their opponents to under 100 points 22 times (19-3 record).

The Orlando Magic allowed Milwaukee to shoot .482 (212-440) from the floor and .383 (79-206) from three-point range during the playoffs.

During the regular season, the Orlando Magic averaged 44.5 rpg. (3,249 rebounds)...The Magic averaged 10.29 orgp. (751 offensive rebounds) and 34.22 drpg. (2,498 defensive rebounds)...Last season, the Magic averaged 45.4 rpg. (3,724 rebounds).

Orlando had an offensive rebound percentage of .223, a defensive rebound percentage of .791, which ranked fifth in the NBA, and a total rebound percentage of .507, which ranked eighth in the league...Last season, the Magic had a defensive rebound percentage of .797, which ranked third in the league, and a total rebound percentage of .508, which ranked eighth in the NBA:

The Orlando Magic averaged 6.80 stlpg. (34 steals) during the playoffs...During the regular season, the Magic averaged 8.21 stlpg. (599 steals), which ranked eighth in the NBA...The Magic recorded 10+ steals 22 times (13-9 record), including a season-high 18 steals on Jan. 8 vs. Washington...The team record for most steals in a game is 20, set on Feb. 10, 1999 @ New Jersey and Mar. 21, 2003 vs. Cleveland...Last season, the Magic averaged 6.62 stlpg. (543 steals).

On Jan. 8 vs. Washington, the Orlando Magic recorded 13 of their 18 steals during the second half, setting a new franchise record for most steals in a half...The previous record was 12, done during the second half on Dec. 5, 2001 vs. Chicago and during the second half on Feb. 20, 2007 @ New York.

Orlando also had a steals-to-turnover ratio of 0.64 (599/937), which ranked second in the league.

BLOCK PARTY...

The Orlando Magic averaged 3.20 blkpg. (16 blocked shots) during the playoffs...During the regular season, the Magic averaged 5.42 blkpg. (396 blocked shots) this season, which ranked eighth in the NBA...The Magic recorded 10+ blocked shots six times (2-4 record), including a season-high 13 blocks on Dec. 23 vs. Chicago...Last season, the Magic averaged 5.43 blkpg. (445 blocked shots), which ranked sixth in the NBA.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK...

On Feb. 24 @ Brooklyn, Orlando rallied from a 19-point deficit in the second half and defeated the Nets, 115-113, marking their largest comeback victory of the season...The Magic have overcome double digit deficits and won five times this season...The largest overall comeback ever in Orlando Magic history is 25 points, set back on Nov. 8, 1989 @ Cleveland...Here's a look at the biggest comebacks in Orlando Magic history:

VOOOOOOOOOOOOCH...

Nikola Vučević recorded a career playoff-high 35 points and 14 rebounds on Aug. 18 @ Milwaukee during Game #1...Vučević became just the fourth player in Orlando Magic history to record 35+ points and 10+ rebounds during a playoff game...He joined Shaquille O'Neal (four times), Dwight Howard (three times) and Tracy McGrady (once) as the only players to reach the 35+ point/10+ rebound plateau during a postseason outing.

Vučević then tallied 32 points and 10 rebounds on Aug. 20 @ Milwaukee in Game #2...He became just the fifth player in franchise history to record consecutive 30+ point games during the playoffs and the first to do it since Apr. 16-19, 2011, when Dwight Howard went for 46 points and 33 points...Vučević joins Tracy McGrady (Apr. 22-28, 2001; Apr. 23-30, 2002; Apr. 20-23, 2003), Shaquille O'Neal (May 23-25, 1995), Anfernee Hardaway (Apr. 29-May 4, 1997) and Howard (Apr. 16-19, 2011)...McGrady (Apr. 22-28, 2001 and Apr. 23-30, 2002) and Hardaway (Apr. 29-May 4, 1997) are the only players with three straight 30+ point playoff games in team history.

Vučević recorded 31 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists on Aug. 24 vs. Milwaukee in Game #4...He became the fourth player in team history to have three 30+ point games in a single playoff series...It was the sixth time it has ever occurred...Shaquille O'Neal (1995 Eastern Conference Finals vs. Indiana), Anfernee Hardaway (1997 First Round vs. Miami) and Tracy McGrady (three times – 2001 First Round vs. Milwaukee, 2002 First Round vs. Charlotte, 2003 First Round vs. Detroit) are the only other players to accomplish the feat.

****MAGIC TRICKS – A DIFFERENT VOUCH THIS POSTSEASON****

Nikola Vučević averaged 28.0 ppg. during the 2020 NBA Playoffs...Last postseason, he averaged 11.2 ppg. during the First Round against Toronto...Vučević improved his scoring by 16.8 ppg., which would be the second-largest increase in playoff scoring average in consecutive playoff appearances in NBA Playoffs history (since 1957-58, minimum 10.0 ppg.)...Tracy McGrady went from 16.7 ppg. during the 2000 NBA Playoffs to 33.8 ppg. in 2001, good for an increase of 17.1 ppg.

During the regular season, Nikola Vučević recorded a team-high 41 double-doubles this season, which ranked eighth in the NBA, and now has 326 double-doubles during his NBA career...Last season, he had a team-high and career-high 60 double-doubles, which ranked third in the NBA...Vučević recorded his 300th career NBA double-double on Jan. 3, 2020 vs. Miami.

Nikola Vučević stands second in Orlando Magic history with 324 double-doubles...On Oct. 30, 2018 vs. Sacramento, he passed Shaquille O'Neal (226) for second all-time.

On Nov. 17 vs. Washington, Vučević tallied 30 points, 17 rebounds and six assists...It was the fourth time in his career that Vučević has recorded 30+ points, 15+ rebounds and 5+ assists in a single game...Vučević is one of five players in Orlando Magic history with games of 30+ points, 15+ rebounds and 5+ assists and his four games are the most ever:

VOOCH CLIMBING THE LADDER...

On Nov. 10 vs. Indiana, Nikola Vučević scored his 8,299th point in an Orlando Magic uniform, passing Tracy McGrady (8,298) for third place on the Magic's all-time scoring list...Earlier this season on Oct. 30 vs. New York, he passed Jameer Nelson (8,184) for fourth on the list...Vučević now has 9,343 points with Orlando:

THE FRENCH CONNECTION...

During the regular season, Evan Fournier scored in double figures 59 times this season, 20+ points 27 times and 30+ points four times, including a career-high-tying 32 points on Dec. 1 vs. Golden State...He led (or tied) the team in scoring a team-high 24 times and in assists ten times.

Fournier has now scored 30+ points eight times during his NBA career...He also scored a career-high 32 points on Jan. 16, 2018 vs. Minnesota.

FLASH GORDON...

During the regular season, Aaron Gordon scored in double figures 48 times this season, 20+ points 14 times and 30+ points once, including a season-high 32 points on Dec. 4 vs. Phoenix...He has also recorded 20 double-doubles and one triple-double (see later triple-double note below)...Gordon scored the game-winning basket and free throw with 1.1 seconds left on Jan. 13 @ Sacramento.

Last season, Gordon scored in double figures 68 times, had 20+ points 24 times and 30+ points once...Gordon also recorded 19 double-doubles.

Gordon has now scored 30+ points ten times during his NBA career...He had a career-high 41 points on Oct. 24, 2017.

****MAGIC TRICKS – AG****

During his last 20 regular season games played (Feb. 1-Aug. 5), Aaron Gordon averaged 16.9 ppg., 8.7 rpg., 5.4 apg. and 1.05 stlpg. (337 points, 174 rebounds, 107 assists, 21 steals, 18 blocks).

“THE HUMAN TORCH”...

Terrence Ross, AKA “The Human Torch,” provides tremendous scoring off the bench for the Orlando Magic...During the regular season, Ross scored in double figures 51 times, had 20+ points 18 times and 30+ points twice, including a season-high 35 points on Mar. 4 @ Miami...Last season, Ross scored in double figures 60 times, had 20+ points 20 times and 30+ points four times...Ross has now scored 30+ points seven times during his NBA career, including a career-high is 51 points, set on Jan. 25, 2014 vs. the L.A. Clippers.

****MAGIC TRICKS – FLAME ON!****

On Mar. 4 @ Miami, Terrence Ross went 8-of-10 from three-point range, pouring in a season-high 35 points...Ross is one of only ten players in Orlando Magic history to make eight-or-more three-pointers in a game...It was the 19th time in Magic history that a player made at least eight three-pointers in a game...Ross also connected on eight threes on Mar. 22, 2019 vs. Memphis...Only three players in team history have made nine threes in a game (Dennis Scott (twice), Nick Anderson, Jason Richardson)...The franchise record for most three-pointers made in a game is 11, set by Dennis Scott on Apr. 18, 1996 vs. Atlanta.

****MAGIC TRICKS – SPECIAL RESERVE****

During his last 16 regular season games played (Feb. 21-Aug. 9), Terrence Ross averaged 19.3 ppg. and 1.13 stlpg., while shooting .431 (59-137) from three-point range (308 points, 18 steals).

When Terrence Ross scored 15+ points this season (34 times), Orlando had a record of 19-15.

Last season, Terrence Ross stood fourth in the NBA among all reserves in total points with 1,223 and led all reserves in three-pointers made with 217...His 217 three-pointers made were the most in NBA history by players who did not made a single start and was second in NBA history for most three-pointers made coming off the bench, trailing only Wayne Ellington, who made 218 in 2017-18...This season, he had 177 three-pointers, which is the sixth-most off the bench in NBA history:

MARKELLE MAKING HIS MARK...

During the regular season, Markelle Fultz scored in double figures 51 times this season and 20+ points six times, including a career-high 25 points on Jan. 6 vs. Brooklyn...It marks the first 20-point games of his NBA career...Fultz led (or tied) the team in scoring four times, in rebounding once and in assists a team-high 31 times...He dished out a career-high 14 assists on Feb. 3 @ Charlotte.

MESSING AROUND AND GETTING TRIPLE-DOUBLES...

On Jan. 15 @ L.A. Lakers, Markelle Fultz tallied 21 points, a career-high 11 rebounds and 10 assists for his second career triple-double...Fultz also had a triple-double on Apr. 11, 2018 vs. Milwaukee...It was the first triple-double for the Magic since Oct. 20, 2018 @ Philadelphia, when Nikola Vučević had 27 points, 13 rebounds and 12 assists.

On Feb. 28 vs. Minnesota, Aaron Gordon recorded 17 points, a career-high 12 assists and 11 rebounds for his first career triple-double...It was the 32nd triple-double in Orlando Magic history.

J-I...

Jonathan Isaac enjoyed a career-night on Nov. 23 @ Indiana, pouring in a career-high 25 points, going 10-of-16 from the floor, including 4-of-6 from three-point range...Isaac has scored in double figures 23 times and 20+ points four times...He has also recorded five double-doubles.

MAGIC TRICKS – THE MINISTER OF DEFENSE

Jonathan Isaac causes havoc on the defensive end, recording at least one blocked shot 30 times and at least one steal 24 times...In fact, Isaac had multiple blocked shots 22 times and multiple steals 12 times...He recorded four-or-more blocks seven times this season.

At the time of his injury diagnosis to his left knee (Jan. 3), Isaac had ranked fourth in the NBA in blocked shots, 11th in steals, 17th in steals-to-turnover ratio and 40th in rebounding.

On Nov. 6 @ Dallas, Isaac tallied 13 points, 10 rebounds, a career-high five assists, a career-high six blocked shots and four steals...Isaac became just the third player in Orlando Magic history to record 6+ blocks and 4+ steals in a single game, joining Bo Outlaw and Ben Wallace:

Per SportRadar, Isaac became just the third player in the NBA since 1983-84 with a stat line of 13+ points, 10+ rebounds, 5+ assists, 6+ blocked shots and 4+ steals, joining Hakeem Olajuwon (who did it eight times) and Ralph Sampson, and the first to accomplish it since Apr. 14 1998 (Olajuwon, 13 points, 18 rebounds, 8 assists, 6 blocks and 4 steals @ Houston).

On Dec. 28 @ Milwaukee, Isaac recorded a career-high seven steals...That is one shy of the franchise record for most steals in a game...Nick Anderson had eight steals on Nov. 12, 1991 @ Washington...Isaac became just the seventh player in the NBA since 2003 to have 6+ blocks in a game and 7+ steals in a game during the same season (Draymond Green, Kawhi Leonard, Josh Smith, Shawn Marion, Gerald Wallace, Andrei Kirilenko).

BACK-TO-BACKS...

The Orlando Magic were 6-16 this season in back-to-backs (5-6 in first game, 1-10 in second game)...Orlando was scheduled to play 11 back-to-back sets this season (four away/away, four home/away, one away/home and two home/home) prior to the NBA restart...They completed their lone back-to-back scheduled during the NBA Restart – Aug. 4 @ Indiana (loss) and Aug. 5 vs. Toronto (loss)...Last season, Orlando played 14 back-to-back sets and were 16-12 in those games last season (10-4 in first game; 6-8 in second game).

MAGIC TRICKS – L.A. STORY

Orlando completed a back-to-back set against both the Lakers and the Clippers in Los Angeles Jan. 15-16...The Magic beat the Lakers on Jan. 15 at Staples Center, 119-118, then fell to the Clippers the following night (Jan. 16), 122-95...It marked the second time in franchise history that the Magic have played both the Lakers and Clippers in a road back-to-back...The other time was Nov. 24-25, 1990 (Nov. 24 @ L.A. Lakers, 115-89 loss; Nov. 25 @ L.A. Clippers, 119-91 loss).

****MAGIC TRICKS – HOME AND HOME****

Orlando had two home back-to-back sets this season...Orlando went 0-2 during their first set on Nov. 1 vs. Milwaukee and Nov. 2 vs. Denver...Orlando then went 1-1 during the second set Jan. 3 vs. Miami (win) and Jan. 4 vs. Utah (loss)...The Magic have now played 23 home/home back-to-backs in franchise history...Orlando is 13-10 in the first game and 10-13 in the second game...The Magic have swept both games seven times, the opponent has swept seven times and there have been nine splits.

G LEAGUE GOSSIP...

On June 4, the NBA G League officially cancelled the remainder of the 2019-20 season...The Lakeland Magic finished 25-17 during the 2019-20 season, including winning what ended up being their final six games.

During the last three seasons, Lakeland has recorded 85 victories, the most in the NBA G League during that span...Lakeland lost in the 2019 NBA G League Eastern Conference Final, 108-106 in overtime @ Long Island...The Lakeland Magic finished the 2018-19 regular season with a record of 32-18, clinched first place in the Southeast Division, its second straight playoff appearance, and a first round bye during the 2019 NBA G League Playoffs.

Steve Clifford became the 14th head coach in Orlando Magic history on May 30, 2018...Brings more than 30 years of coaching experience at the NBA and collegiate level, including helping lead the Magic to the 2009 NBA Finals as an assistant coach...Returned to Orlando after spending the previous five seasons (2013-18) as head coach of the Charlotte Hornets...Compiled a record of 196-214 (.478) and led Charlotte to the NBA Playoffs in two of his first four seasons at the helm after the team qualified for the postseason just once in the previous 10 seasons...Recorded his 200th career NBA head coaching victory on Nov. 5, 2018 vs. Cleveland...Coached in his 500th career NBA game on Nov. 6, 2019 @ Dallas.

During his first season at the helm of the Magic, guided Orlando to a 42-40 record (.512), a 17-win improvement, which was the largest turnaround in the NBA and the second-biggest improvement in franchise history...The Magic clinched a berth into the 2019 NBA Playoffs for the first time since 2012 and captured the Southeast Division title, the franchise's first since 2009-10.

A native of Island Falls, Maine, arrived in Charlotte after spending the 2012-13 season as an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Lakers, first under Mike Brown and then under Mike D'Antoni...Prior to the Lakers, spent five seasons as an assistant coach with Orlando from 2007-12...As a member of Stan Van Gundy's staff, helped the Magic to a 259-135 record (.657) and five straight playoff appearances, including a trip to the 2009 NBA Finals...The team won 50 games or more in four straight seasons from 2007-11, winning three consecutive Southeast Division titles (2007-08, 2008-09 and 2009-10).

Before going to Orlando, spent four seasons as an assistant coach under Jeff Van Gundy with the Houston Rockets from 2003-07...Began his NBA career with the New York Knicks, serving as the team's advance scout in 2000-01 before moving to the bench as an assistant coach from 2001-03.

Prior to the NBA, spent 15 years coaching at the collegiate level, including four years as head coach at Adelphi University in Garden City, New York from 1995-99, where he posted a record of 86-36 (.705) and led the school to four straight 20-win seasons, becoming the first coach in school history to record consecutive 20-win campaigns, and four straight appearances in the NCAA Division II Tournament...His winning percentage remains the second-best of the 12 head coaches in the program's 65-year history.

Began his college coaching career at Saint Anselm College in New Hampshire, where he spent four seasons as an assistant coach...Then served as an assistant coach for one year at Fairfield University, four seasons at Boston University and one season at Siena University before becoming the head coach at Adelphi...Also spent one season as an assistant coach at East Carolina University in 1999-2000 before moving to the NBA.
