The Raptors lead the series, 3-1. Normal Powell and Pascal Siakam each scored 16 points for the Raptors. Aaron Gordon led the Magic with 25 points, seven rebounds and five assists, while Evan Fournier added 19 points. Toronto shot 53.3 percent from the floor, was 11-of-28 from three-point range and forced the Magic to commit 17 turnovers, which led to 21 points. The Magic opened the game with a 7-0 spurt, but the Raptors quickly responded, then outscored Orlando during the second quarter, 30-16, to seize control of the contest. Toronto outrebounded the Magic, 45-34.

PREVIOUS GAMES IN FIRST ROUND VS. TORONTO:

Game #3 – Apr. 19 vs. Toronto – Raptors 98, Magic 93: Pascal Siakam tallied 30 points and 11 rebounds, as Toronto defeated Orlando, 98-93, at Amway Center in Game #3 of their First Round playoff matchup. The Raptors lead the series, 2-1. Kawhi Leonard had 16 points and 10 rebounds, but was 5-of-19 from the floor, while Kyle Lowry added 12 points and 10 assists. Terrence Ross led the Magic with 24 points off the bench, including 5-of-13 from three-point range, while Nikola Vučević recorded 22 points, 14 rebounds and six assists. The Magic shot just 36.2 percent from the floor, but was 22-of-23 from the free throw line and made 13 three-pointers. Toronto led for the majority of the contest, opening the game with an 10-0 run and led by as many as 17 points during the second half. Vučević scored 11 consecutive points during the third quarter, giving the Magic a 61-60 lead. However, the Raptors answered with a 16-0 run. Orlando would pull to within 96-93 after a three-pointer by Ross with 42.4 seconds left, but it would be as close as they would get.

Game #2 – Apr. 16 @ Toronto – Raptors 111, Magic 82: Kawhi Leonard scored 37 points, as Toronto defeated Orlando, 111-82, at Scotiabank Arena in Game #2 of their First Round playoff matchup. The series is now tied at one. Kyle Lowry netted 22 points for the Raptors, while Pascal Siakam tallied 19 points and 10 rebounds. Aaron Gordon led the Magic with 20 points, while Terrence Ross added 15 off the bench. Toronto dominated from start to finish, leading by as many as 34 points during the second half. The Raptors held the Magic to just 37 percent shooting from the floor and forced 17 turnovers, which led to 26 points. The Magic also struggled from the free throw line, connecting on 13-of-24 attempts. The 29-point loss was the third-largest in team playoff history.

Game #1 – Apr. 13 @ Toronto – Magic 104, Raptors 101: D.J. Augustin poured in a career-playoff high-tying 25 points, including the game-winning three-pointer with 3.4 seconds left, as Orlando defeated Toronto, 104-101, at Scotiabank Arena in Game #1 of their First Round playoff series. Seven players scored in double figures for the Magic. Evan Fournier netted 16 points, while Aaron Gordon tallied 11 points and 10 rebounds. Kawhi Leonard led the Raptors with 25 points, while Pascal Siakam added 24 points and nine rebounds. Orlando shot 40 percent from the floor, but was 14-of-29 from three-point range. Late in the second quarter, the Magic went on a 15-0 run and took a 57-41 lead with 1:08 left in the first half. Toronto responded with a 22-2 run and regained the advantage on a three-pointer by Marc Gasol with 8:19 left in the third quarter. Siakam gave the Raptors a 90-84 edge after a short hook with 5:55 remaining in the game. There were five lead changes and four ties during the final 4:16. After Leonard drained a three-pointer to tie the game, he hit a baseline fadeaway with 1:02 left, giving Toronto a 101-99 lead. Augustin answered with a layup to tie the score at 101, then followed it up on the Magic's next possession with the game-winning three-pointer from the top of the key. Leonard's three-point attempt on the last trip fell short and Orlando escaped with the win.

2019 NBA PLAYOFFS - FIRST ROUND VS. TORONTO:

Orlando is 39-46 all-time vs. Toronto (21-19 at home, 18-25 on the road, 0-1 at London) during regular season action, including 2-2 this season (see recaps below)...The Magic lost all three meetings against Toronto last season...The Magic are 5-1 in postseason play against the Raptors (4-1 in 2008 First Round, 1-0 in 2019 First Round)...The Magic have lost nine of the last 14 meetings with the Raptors and 19 of the last 25 overall...Orlando has lost ten of the last 13 meetings at home (including one at London) and ten of the last 12 at Toronto...D.J. Augustin appeared in ten games with Toronto during the 2013-14 season...Khem Birch is a native of Montreal, Quebec, and is a member of the Canadian Men's National Team...Terrence Ross was originally selected in the first round (eighth overall) of the 2012 NBA Draft by Toronto and spent his first four-plus NBA seasons (2012-17, 363 games) with the Raptors before being traded to Orlando on Feb. 14, 2017...President of Basketball Operations Jeff Weltman spent four seasons (2013-17) with Toronto, including his final season as General Manager in 2016-17...Assistant Coach Tyrone Corbin played in 15 games with the Raptors during his final NBA season in 2000-01...For last season's stats vs. Toronto, see p. 304 of the media guide...**Nov. 20 vs. Toronto – Raptors 93, Magic 91:** Danny Green hit the game-winning jumper with 0.5 seconds left, as Toronto edged Orlando, 93-91, at Amway Center. Kawhi Leonard led the Raptors with 18 points. Evan Fournier led the Magic with a game-high 27 points and Aaron Gordon added 16 points. Nikola Vučević tallied 14 points and a season-high 18 rebounds. Toronto led 29-17 after the first quarter and by as many as 18 points during the first half. The Magic battled back, outscoring the Raptors during the third quarter, 38-26, and took a 75-73 advantage heading into the final stanza, thanks to 14 points from Fournier. With the score tied at 89, Serge Ibaka hit a 18-footer with 43.5 seconds remaining to give the Raptors a two-point lead. Fournier and the Magic tied the score at 91 with 2.3 seconds left after a driving, two-handed dunk. On the ensuing possession, Green came off two screens and drilled the short baseline jumper, giving Toronto the victory...**Dec. 28 vs. Toronto – Magic 116, Raptors 87:** Nikola Vučević tallied 30 points, 20 rebounds and eight assists, as Orlando routed Toronto, 116-87, at a sold-out Amway Center. D.J. Augustin scored 17 points for the Magic, while Jonathan Isaac and Terrence Ross each added 14 points. Kawhi Leonard led the Raptors with 21 points. Orlando held Toronto to just 29.5 percent shooting from the floor and outrebounded the Raptors, 60-41. The Raptors led 29-25 after the first quarter and by as many as 10 points during the first quarter, but the Magic dominated the remainder of the contest. Orlando outscored Toronto during the second quarter, 32-19, then seized control for good during the third quarter, where they outscored the Raptors, 35-15...**Feb. 24 @ Toronto – Magic 113, Raptors 98:** Terrence Ross tallied 28 points and nine rebounds off the bench, as Orlando defeated Toronto, 113-98, at Scotiabank Arena. Nikola Vučević recorded 23 points and 12 rebounds for the Magic, while Jonathan Isaac netted 16 points. Kyle Lowry led six Raptors in double figures with 19 points and 10 assists. Orlando went 14-of-36 from three-point range, outrebounded Toronto, 52-42, and dished out 29 assists. The Magic also held Toronto to just 41.8 percent shooting from the field. Leading 80-72 entering the fourth quarter, Orlando put the game out of reach with a 15-5 run late in the stanza...**Apr. 1 @ Toronto – Raptors 121, Magic 109:** Danny Green poured in 29 points, including 7-of-10 from three-point range, as Toronto defeated Orlando, 121-109, at Scotiabank Arena. Six Raptors scored in double figures. Kawhi Leonard and Serge Ibaka each netted 15 points for the Raptors. Evan Fournier led the Magic with 21 points, while Wes Iwundu scored a career-high 16 points and was a perfect 7-of-7 from the floor. Toronto shot 50 percent from the floor and made 19-of-37 from three-point range. Orlando led 36-29 after the first quarter and by as many as 11 points during the first half, but the Raptors seized control of the game during the second quarter, where they outscored the Magic, 33-16.

THIS DATE IN MAGIC HISTORY – APRIL 23...

April 23, 2007 – Hedo Turkoglu led the Magic with 22 points and Grant Hill tallied 21 points and eight rebounds, but it wasn't enough to overcome all five of Detroit's starters scoring in double figures, as Orlando fell 98-90 in Game #2 of their best-of-seven series against the Pistons in Detroit.

April 23, 2003 – Tracy McGrady torched Detroit for a playoff career-high and Magic postseason record 46 points, but five Pistons scored in double figures as they defeat the Magic, 89-77, at The Palace of Auburn Hills in Game #2 of their best-of-seven, first round series. McGrady's 46 points also tied the record for the most points ever scored at The Palace of Auburn Hills. His 89 combined points between Games #1 and #2 were the highest two-game total in Magic playoff history.

April 23, 1993 – Shaquille O'Neal broke his second backboard of the season with a slam dunk at New Jersey. In that contest, Nick Anderson scored a career-high 50 points, as Orlando won, 119-116.

PURE MAGIC...PLAYOFF MAGIC!...

With their 116-108 victory on Apr. 7 @ Boston, the Orlando Magic clinched a berth into the 2019 NBA Playoffs and the 2018-19 Southeast Division title...It marks the 15th time in team history that Orlando has reached the postseason and the first time since 2012...It is also the Magic's sixth division championship and their first since 2009-10...During the last 26 seasons (since 1993-94), the 15 playoff berths are the sixth-most in the Eastern Conference...Orlando has advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals four times (1995, 1996, 2009, 2010) and reached the NBA Finals twice (1995, 2009)...During their first trip in 1995, Orlando became the second-fastest team in NBA history to reach the Finals in just its sixth year of existence.

At 42-40, the Magic also finished the 2018-19 regular season with a winning percentage of .512...Orlando has now finished with a .500 record or better 17 times during the last 27 seasons (since 1992-93), which is the fourth-most in the Eastern Conference.

Orlando travels to Toronto for Game #5 of its First Round playoff series on Apr. 23...The Magic are 7-6 all-time in Game #5's during their playoff history (7-1 at home, 0-5 on the road).

Orlando defeated Toronto in Game #1 on Apr. 13, 104-101...The Magic are now 13-13 all-time in Game #1's during their playoff history (8-6 at home, 5-7 on the road)...When Orlando wins Game #1 of a playoff series, they are 10-2 in those series (only losses were in 2003 First Round vs. Detroit, 4-3, and 2012 First Round vs. Indiana, 4-1).

Orlando trails Toronto in their best-of-seven First Round playoff series, 3-1, heading into Game #5 on Apr. 23...In NBA playoff history, teams facing a 3-1 deficit have come back to win the series 11 times...The latest to do it was Golden State against Oklahoma City during the 2016 Western Conference Finals, then Cleveland against Golden State during the 2016 NBA Finals.

CLIFF NOTES...

Steve Clifford became the 14th head coach in Orlando Magic history on May 30, 2018, bringing more than 30 years of coaching experience at the NBA and collegiate levels, including helping the Magic to the 2009 NBA Finals as an assistant coach...He spent five seasons as an assistant in Orlando from 2007-12...Clifford recorded his 200th career NBA head coaching regular season victory on Nov. 5 vs. Cleveland...Clifford has compiled a 238-254 (.484) record (196-214 (.478) with Charlotte from 2013-18; 42-40 (.512) record with Orlando).



****MAGIC TRICKS – COACH OF THE MONTH****

Steve Clifford was named the NBA's Eastern Conference Coach of the Month for March/April 2019...It marks the second time during his career that Clifford has been named NBA Coach of the Month (April 2014) and the seventh time a Magic coach has won the award...The last time an Orlando coach was named NBA Coach of the Month was Scott Skiles in December of 2015...During March and April, Clifford led the Orlando Magic to a 13-6 record (.684), the best winning percentage in the Eastern Conference...Orlando earned a berth into the 2019 NBA Playoffs, marking the Magic's first trip to the postseason since 2012.

TURNING IT AROUND...

The Orlando Magic finished 42-40 this season...The 42 wins were a 17-game improvement from last season, where the Magic finished 25-57...It is the second-largest win improvement in team history...The largest is a 20-game improvement from 1991-92 (21 wins) to 1992-93 (41 wins)...Here are the biggest improvements from one season to another in Magic history:

Since Jan. 31, the Orlando Magic had a record of 22-9 (.710)...Only Houston (24-8, .750) and Milwaukee (24-9, .727) had a better winning percentage in the NBA during that time.

WINNING BIG...

On Feb. 12 @ New Orleans, the Orlando Magic won by 30 points, 118-88...On Feb. 14 vs. Charlotte, the Magic recorded their largest margin of victory this season, beating the Hornets by 38 points, 127-89...It marked the first time in franchise history that they recorded consecutive wins by 30+ points...The 38-point win on Feb. 14 was Orlando's largest margin of victory this season, the largest margin of victory ever against Charlotte (previous was 32, Jan. 5, 2007) and snapped a 13-game losing streak to the Hornets (last win was Dec. 16, 2015)...It was also the sixth-largest home victory all-time and the 10th-biggest win overall in team history.

HOMELAND...

Orlando is 0-2 at home during the 2019 NBA Playoffs and would host Toronto at Amway Center in a potential Game #6 of their First Round playoff series on Apr. 25...The Magic are now 37-27 all-time in their playoff history at home...Orlando went 35-22 in Amway Arena before moving to the Amway Center in 2010-11, where they are 2-5.

Orlando was 25-16 this season at home (including two wins Dec. 13-15 in Mexico City)...The 25 home wins are the most in a season for Orlando since 2010-11, where they went 29-12...Last season, the Magic finished 17-24 at home...Orlando has gone 172-186 (.480) at the Amway Center since it opened in 2010-11...The Magic closed Amway Arena after 2009-10 with an all-time record of 535-309 (.634) in that building.

****MAGIC TRICKS – HOME STREAK****

Orlando closed their regular season home schedule by winning nine consecutive home games at the Amway Center from Feb. 28-Apr. 5...It marks the first time the Magic have recorded nine straight home victories since they won their final seven games of the 2009-10 season (Mar. 17-Apr. 14, 2010), then the first four games of the 2010-11 campaign (Oct. 28-Nov. 8, 2010)...The last time Orlando won nine straight games during a single season was Nov. 24, 2008-Jan. 9, 2009, when they won 11 straight.

Orlando went a perfect 5-0 during their five-game homestand from Mar. 14-25...It was the first time in franchise history that the Magic went undefeated during a single homestand of five-or-more games.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN...

Orlando is 1-1 on the road during the 2019 NBA Playoffs and will travel to Toronto for Game #5 of their First Round playoff series on Apr. 23...The Magic are now 21-42 all-time in their playoff history on the road.

Orlando was 17-24 this season on the road...The Magic won their ninth road game on Feb. 9 @ Milwaukee, which surpassed Orlando's entire road win total for the entire 2017-18 campaign (8-33)...The 17 road wins were the most since 2010-11, where the Magic finished 23-18 away from home.



****MAGIC TRICKS – ROAD RULES****

The Orlando Magic won four consecutive road games from Feb. 9-24...It marked the first time since Jan. 8-16, 2012 that the Magic have won four straight road games...During Orlando's four-game road win streak, the average margin of victory was 20.3 ppg. (81 combined points).

**The last time the Orlando Magic won five consecutive road games was Mar. 1-22, 2010.*

Orlando went on the road from Feb. 9-12 for a three-game trip and won all three contests by at least 16 points...The Magic defeated Milwaukee, 103-83, on Feb. 9, beat Atlanta, 124-108, on Feb. 10, then downed New Orleans, 118-88, on Feb. 12...It marked the first time the Magic had swept a road trip with three-or-more games since Jan. 8-12, 2012 and it is the first time in franchise history that Orlando has won three consecutive road games by 16-or-more points each.

On Feb. 12 @ New Orleans, Orlando defeated the Pelicans, 118-88...It tied for the seventh-largest margin of victory away from home in team history and was the ninth time that the Magic have ever won on the road by 30-or-more points...Orlando's largest margin of victory on the road all-time is 48 points, set back on Feb. 20, 1995 @ Milwaukee, when the Magic won 152-104.

****MAGIC TRICKS – HOLIDAY ROAD****

From Dec. 31-Jan. 9, the Orlando Magic played six games during a 10-day road trip, covering all four time zones in the continental United States (Charlotte-ET, Chicago and Minnesota-CT, L.A. Clippers and Sacramento-PT and Utah-MT)...It marked the first time in Orlando franchise history that they played a game in each time zone during a single road trip.

OFFENSIVE BEHAVIOR...

Orlando is averaging 91.0 ppg. (364 points) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs and scored 100+ points once (1-0 record), including a playoff-high 104 points during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13...The Magic are shooting .389 (129-332) from the floor during the playoffs.

The Orlando Magic averaged 107.3 ppg. (8,800 points) this season, scored 100+ points 57 times (38-19 record), 110+ points 36 times (25-11 record) and 120+ points 13 times (11-2 record), including a season-high 149 points on Apr. 5 vs. Atlanta...Last season, the Magic averaged 103.4 ppg. (8,479 points).

The Orlando Magic shot .454 (3,316-7,307) from the floor this season and shot 50 percent or better 19 times (14-5 record), including a season-high .609 (56-92) on Apr. 5 vs. Atlanta...Last season, the Magic shot .452 (3,182-7,042) from the floor and shot 50 percent or better 20 times (11-9 record)...Since the 2008-09 campaign, Orlando is 140-41 (.773) when shooting 50 percent or better from the field.

On Apr. 5 vs. Atlanta, the Magic shot .609 from the floor...It was the first time Orlando shot 60%-or-better from the floor since shooting .615 on Mar. 29, 2016 vs. Brooklyn...The team record for highest field goal percentage in a game is .653 on Jan. 26, 1994 @ Charlotte.

****MAGIC TRICKS – SCOREBOARD****

On Apr. 5, the Magic defeated Atlanta, 149-113...It was the third-most points scored in franchise history...The team record for most points in a game is 155, set on Dec. 30, 1990 vs. Denver:

During the same game, Orlando set a franchise record for most points scored in a first half with 81...The previous record was 78, set on Nov. 3, 2010 vs. Minnesota...The 81 tied for the second-most points ever scored in any half in team history...The Magic scored 83 points during the second half on Dec. 30, 1990 vs. Denver and also scored 81 during the second half on Jan. 26, 1994 @ Charlotte.

On Nov. 17 vs. the L.A. Lakers, Orlando scored 130 points...The following evening (Nov. 18), the Magic recorded a season-high 131 points against New York...It was the first time in franchise history that Orlando scored 130+ points in consecutive games...After scoring 130 against the Lakers on Nov. 17, it was the first time Orlando had scored 130+ points in regulation since Dec. 13, 2016 @ Atlanta (131-120).

THREE'S COMPANY...

Orlando is shooting .307 (43-140) from three-point range during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...The Magic made 10+ three-pointers twice (1-1 record), including a playoff-high 14 three-pointers during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13...The 14 three-pointers made tied for the third-most in Magic playoff history...The most three-pointers made in a playoff game by Orlando is 17, set on May 26, 2009 vs. Cleveland in Game #4 of the Eastern Conference Finals.

During Game #3 vs. Toronto on Apr. 19, the Magic went 13-of-44 from beyond the arc...The 44 three-point attempts set a new franchise playoff record, breaking the old mark of 38, also set back on May 26, 2009 vs. Cleveland.



The Orlando Magic have made at least one three-point field goal in 984 consecutive games, dating all the way back to Mar. 17, 2007 (last game without a three-pointer: Mar. 14, 2007 vs. Utah, 0-for-9)...It stands as the fifth-longest active streak in the NBA...The Phoenix Suns have connected on at least one three-pointer in 1,222 games dating back from Mar. 29, 2004, the longest streak in NBA history.

The Orlando Magic shot .356 (937-2,633) from three-point range, which ranked 11th in the NBA and made 10+ three-pointers 63 times (37-26 record), including a season-high 20 three-pointers on Dec. 5 vs. Denver...The Magic broke the team records for most three-pointers made and attempted in single season, which were both set last season with 844-2,405...Last season, they shot .351 (844-2,405) from beyond the arc and connected on 10+ three pointers 49 times (16-33 record).

****MAGIC TRICKS – FROM WAY DOWNTOWN****

The Orlando Magic connected on a season-high 20 three-point field goals on Dec. 5 vs. Denver...It was only the second time in franchise history that Orlando had 20+ three-pointers in a game...The only other time was on Jan. 13, 2009 @ Sacramento, when they connected on a franchise record 23 three-pointers...Here's a look at the top three-point team performances in Magic history:

During the third quarter on Dec. 5 vs. Denver, Orlando tied a franchise record for most three-point field goals made in a quarter with eight...It has been done several times, the last time coming on Dec. 2, 2009 during the third quarter vs. New York.

Also on Dec. 5 vs. Denver, the Magic attempted 49 three-point shots, breaking the team record for most threes attempted in a game...They previously broke the record on both Oct. 27 @ Milwaukee and Oct. 30 vs. Sacramento, when they attempted 43 three-pointers...The record prior to this season was 42, set back on Feb. 8, 2012 vs. Miami.

BUY ONE, GET ONE FREE...

Orlando is shooting .788 (63-80) from the free throw line during the 2019 NBA Playoffs.

The Orlando Magic shot a team-record .782 (1,231-1,575) from the free throw line, which ranked 12th in the NBA...Last season, Orlando shot .757 (1,271-1,678) from the charity stripe...The previous team record for highest free throw percentage in a season was .777 (1,616-2,079), set during the 2002-03 campaign.

****MAGIC TRICKS – PERFECT FROM THE STRIPE****

On Jan. 12 vs. Boston, Aaron Gordon led the Magic with 28 points, including a perfect 13-of-13 from the free throw line...It marked just the ninth time in Orlando Magic history that a player went at least 13-of-13 from the charity stripe and the first time since Steve Francis went 14-of-14 for the Magic @ Golden State on Dec. 10, 2004...The team record for most free throws made without a miss is 17, set by Grant Hill on Nov. 1, 2002 @ Minnesota.

On Apr. 7 @ Boston, the Magic went a perfect 22-of-22 from the free throw line, setting a new team record for most free throws made in a game without a miss...The previous record was 17, set back on Dec. 28, 2017 vs. Detroit.

QUARTERLY REPORT...

The Orlando Magic scored 30+ points during a quarter 113 times, including a season-high 44 points during the first on Nov. 18 vs. New York, tying a franchise record for most points ever scored in a first quarter (44, Feb. 8, 2008 vs. L.A. Lakers)...Last season, Orlando had 30+ points during a quarter 89 times and 40+ points four times...The most points ever scored in any quarter in franchise history is 49, set on Feb. 20, 1995 @ Milwaukee (third quarter).

BALANCING ACT...

Orlando had seven players score in double figures during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13.

The Orlando Magic had five-or-more players scored in double figures 48 times this season (29-19 record), had six-or-more players score in double figures 23 times (15-8 record) and a season-high seven players score 10+ six times (4-2 record), the last on Mar. 30 @ Indiana...Last season, they had five players score in double figures 58 times (21-37 record), six players score 10+ points 18 times (8-10 record) and seven players score 10+ points five times (1-4 record)...Orlando has had a team-record eight players score 10+ points seven times in franchise history.

THIS SPACE IS RESERVED...

Orlando's reserves are averaging 29.5 ppg. (118 points) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...They had a playoff-high 33 points off the bench during Game #3 vs. Toronto on Apr. 19.



The Orlando Magic reserves averaged 35.9 ppg. (2,940 points) this season, scored 40+ points 31 times (20-11 record), including a season-high 64 points on Feb. 14 vs. Charlotte, and outscored (or tied) their opponent's reserves 41 times (26-15 record)...Last season, their bench averaged 33.4 ppg. (2,741 points) and outscored their opponent's reserves 33 times (14-19 record)...The most points scored off the bench in team history is 85, done on Mar. 26, 1995 vs. Golden State.

DISHING IT OUT...

Orlando is averaging 18.8 apg. (75 assists) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...The Magic dished out a playoff-high 20 assists during Game #4 vs. Toronto on Apr. 21.

The Orlando Magic averaged 25.5 apg. (2,095 assists) this season, which ranked 12th in the NBA...Orlando dished out 20+ assists 75 times (42-33 record) and 30+ assists 14 times (10-4 record), including a season-high 37 assists on Mar. 30 @ Indiana...Last season, they averaged 23.4 apg. (1,921 assists), which ranked 11th in the NBA.

HANDLE WITH CARE...

Orlando is averaging 15.3 topg. (61 turnovers) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...The Magic committed a playoff-low 11 turnovers during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13.

The Orlando Magic averaged 13.2 topg. (1,082 turnovers) this season, which ranked fifth in the NBA...Last season, they averaged 14.5 topg. (1,192 turnovers)...Orlando allowed 14.71 ppg. off of its turnovers (1,206 points), which ranked third in the NBA.

The Orlando Magic had an assists-to-turnover ratio of 1.94 (2,095/1,082), which ranked fifth in the NBA...Last season, Orlando had an assists-to-turnover ratio as a team of 1.61 (1,921/1,192).

MUST GET DEFENSIVE...

Orlando is allowing 104.3 ppg. (417 points) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...The Magic allowed a playoff-low 98 points during Game #3 vs. Toronto on Apr. 19...The Magic are allowing the Raptors to shoot .478 (161-337) from the floor and .354 (45-127) from three-point range.

The Orlando Magic allowed 106.6 ppg. (8,742 points) this season, which ranked fifth in the NBA...Orlando held its opponent to under 100 points 22 times (19-3 record), including a season-low 83 points on Feb. 9 @ Milwaukee...Last season, they allowed 108.2 ppg. (8,874 points), held their opponent under 100 points 21 times (12-9 record) and under 90 points three times (3-0 record).

The Orlando Magic allowed the opposition to shoot .456 (3,274-7,185) from the floor this season, which ranked 11th in the NBA...Orlando held its opponents under 50 percent 63 times (36-27 record) and under 40 percent nine times (9-0 record), including a season-low .295 (28-95) on Dec. 28 vs. Toronto...Last season, they allowed the opposition to shoot .468 (3,355-7,176) from the floor, held opponents under 50 percent from the field 55 times (23-32 record) and under 40 percent eight times (6-2 record).

The Magic also held the opposition to .347 (858-2,475) from three-point range, which ranked tenth in the league.

Orlando allowed 47.24 points in the paint per game (3,874 points), which ranked eighth in the NBA...The Magic also allowed 12.71 fast break points per game (1,042 points), which ranked ninth in the league.

****MAGIC TRICKS – DEFENSE!****

On Dec. 28 vs. Toronto, the Orlando Magic held the Raptors to just .295 (28-95) from the field...It marked the fifth-lowest opponent shooting percentage in franchise history and only the sixth time that the Magic ever held the opposition under 30 percent:

ON THE REBOUND...

Orlando is averaging 42.3 rpg. (169 rebounds) during the 2019 NBA Playoffs...The Magic pulled down a playoff-high 48 rebounds during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13.

The Orlando Magic averaged 45.4 rpg. (3,724 rebounds) this season...The Magic did a solid job keeping opponents off the offensive glass, allowing 9.01 orpg. (739 opponent offensive rebounds), which ranked second in the NBA...Orlando also averaged 35.39 drpg. (2,902 defensive rebounds), which ranked 13th in the league...The Magic set a new franchise record for defensive rebounds in a season...The previous record was 2,736, set back in 2009-10.



Orlando also had a defensive rebound percentage of .797 (2,902 defensive rebounds/739 opponent offensive rebounds/3,641 total possible defensive rebounds), which ranked third in the league, and a total rebound percentage of .508 (.220 off. rebound percentage + .797 def. rebound percentage / 2), which ranked eighth in the NBA...The Magic also gave up 10.99 second chance points per game (901 second chance points), which led the NBA.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK...

The Orlando Magic overcame double digit deficits and won 13 times this season, including a season-high 17-point, second half deficit on Mar. 22 vs. Memphis and a 17-point deficit on Mar. 26 @ Miami.

Orlando overcame a 16-point, fourth quarter deficit on Nov. 14 vs. Philadelphia, where they defeated the Sixers, 111-106...It marked the third-largest fourth quarter comeback since the 1996-97 campaign for Orlando (per SportRadar)...Here's a look at the top five fourth quarter comebacks for the Magic since 1996-97:

Orlando trailed entering the fourth quarter during Game #1 @ Toronto on Apr. 13, and won, 104-101...The Orlando Magic came back to win ten times this season when trailing entering the fourth quarter...The ten wins were tied for second-most in the NBA, trailing only Detroit (12) and tied with Houston (ten).

TIGHT SQUEEZE...

The Orlando Magic had 11 games this season decided by three points-or-less (5-6 record)...Last season, the Magic were 3-5 in games decided by three points-or-less...Orlando has also played three overtime games (0-3 record) – Dec. 5 vs. Denver, Dec. 26 vs. Phoenix and Jan. 16 @ Detroit.

MAGIC TRICKS – TICK TOCK!

On Nov. 5 vs. Cleveland, the Magic trailed 100-95 with less than 30 seconds remaining, but pulled out a 102-100 victory after a buzzer-beater by Evan Fournier...Per SportRadar, the last time Orlando trailed by 5+ points with 30 seconds-or-less and won was Dec. 9, 2008 at Portland, when Rashard Lewis and Hedo Turkoglu both made three-pointers to give the Magic a 109-108 victory.

HEY NOW! VOOCH IS AN ALL-STAR!...

Orlando Magic center Nikola Vučević was named to the 2019 NBA All-Star team, the National Basketball Association announced on Jan. 31...It marked the first time that Vučević has been selected as an NBA All-Star during his career...He became the eighth player to be named an NBA All-Star while wearing a Magic uniform (O'Neal, Hardaway, McGrady, Hill, Howard, Lewis, Nelson) and the first since Dwight Howard in 2012...Vučević and the rest of the All-Star reserves were selected by NBA head coaches...He tallied four points (2-2 FG), five rebounds, two assists and one steal in 12 minutes (11:38) of action...Vučević also participated in the Skills Challenge during NBA All-Star Saturday Night, but was eliminated in the first round by Nikola Jokic.

VOOCH SEEING DOUBLE...

Nikola Vučević had a team-high and career-high 60 double-doubles this season, which ranked third in the NBA and now has 285 double-doubles during his NBA career...Last season, he had a team-high 29 double-doubles...Vučević recorded his 200th career NBA double-double on Nov. 5, 2017 vs. Boston and had a then-career-high 46 double-doubles in 2012-13.

Nikola Vučević stands second in Orlando Magic history with 283 double-doubles...On Oct. 30 vs. Sacramento, he passed Shaquille O'Neal (226) for second all-time.

Nikola Vučević has now recorded 25+ double-doubles for seven consecutive seasons...That is the second-longest active streak in the NBA, trailing only DeMarcus Cousins, who entered the season with eight.

On Mar. 17 vs. Atlanta, Nikola Vučević tallied 27 points and 20 rebounds for his seventh career 20-point/20-rebound game...He also has two career 30-point/20-rebound outings.

Vučević has nine career 20+ rebound games (two this season), including a season-high 24 rebounds on Jan. 6 @ L.A. Clippers...He also owns the franchise record for most rebounds in a single game with 29, set on Dec. 31, 2012 vs. Miami...Vučević (twice), Dwight Howard (nine times) and Shaquille O'Neal (four times) are the only players in Orlando Magic history to pull down 24-or-more rebounds in a single game.

On Oct. 20 @ Philadelphia, Nikola Vučević recorded 27 points, 13 rebounds and a career-high 12 assists for his second career triple-double and 30th in Orlando Magic history...He tallied 31 points, 13 rebounds and 10 assists on Dec. 9, 2017 @ Atlanta, becoming the third center in team history to record a triple double, joining Shaquille O'Neal (24 points, 28 rebounds, 15 blocked shots on Nov. 20, 1993 @ New Jersey) and Dwight Howard (30 points, 19 rebounds, 10 blocked shots on Nov. 12, 2008 @ Oklahoma City) and the only one to do it with 10+ assists.

NIK AT NIGHT...

Nikola Vučević now has 115 career games with 20+ points and 10+ rebounds (37 this season) and 50 career outings with 25+ points and 10+ rebounds (19 this season)...He has 19 career 30-point games (six this season) and one 40-point outing – a career-high 41 points on Oct. 20, 2017 @ Brooklyn.

This season, Nikola Vučević had 11 games with 20+ points, 10+ rebounds and 5+ assists...That ties with Tracy McGrady (2001-02) for the most such games during a single season in franchise history.

With 30 points on Nov. 14 vs. Philadelphia, 36 points on Nov. 17 vs. L.A. Lakers and 28 points on Nov. 18 vs. New York, Vučević became the first Magic player since Dwight Howard Mar. 1-5, 2012 to score 28+ points in three consecutive games.

On Nov. 25 @ L.A. Lakers, Vučević tallied 31 points, 15 rebounds, seven assists, three blocked shots and two steals...Vučević became just the eighth player in the NBA since the 2003-04 season to tally 31+ points, 15+ rebounds, 7+ assists and three blocks in a single game (per Basketball Reference)...He joins Giannis Antetokounmpo, Vince Carter, DeMarcus Cousins, Anthony Davis (twice), Joel Embiid, LeBron James and Shaquille O'Neal.

The following night, on Nov. 26 @ Golden State, Vučević recorded 30 points, 12 rebounds and six assists...Vučević became the first player in Orlando Magic history with consecutive games of 30+ points, 12+ rebounds and 6+ assists and only the eighth player in the NBA since the 1994-95 season to accomplish it, joining Kobe Bryant Kevin Durant, Kevin Garnett, James Harden, LeBron James, Karl Malone and Russell Westbrook (per Basketball Reference).

NBA PLAYER OF THE WEEK...

Orlando Magic center Nikola Vučević was named the NBA's Eastern Conference Player of the Week for the period ending Nov. 18, 2018...It marks the second time that he has won the award during his career and the first time a Magic player has won the award since Vučević earned it for the period ending Mar. 30, 2014...During four games (Nov. 12-18), Vučević averaged 27.8 ppg., 10.5 rpg., 4.0 apg. and 1.25 stlpg., while shooting .581 (43-74) from the floor and .471 (8-17) from three-point range...Orlando posted a 3-1 record with wins over Philadelphia, the L.A. Lakers and New York.

FLASH GORDON...

Aaron Gordon scored in double figures 68 times this season, had 20+ points 24 times and 30+ points once, including a season-high 31 points on Nov. 18 vs. New York...He led (or tied) the team in scoring 17 times, in rebounding 15 times and in assists 15 times...Gordon also recorded 19 double-doubles...On Feb. 5 @ Oklahoma City, Gordon dished out a career-high 10 assists.

THE FRENCH CONNECTION...

Evan Fournier poured in a season-high 31 points on Oct. 20 @ Philadelphia, one point shy of tying his career-high...During his first two NBA seasons with Denver, Fournier scored 15+ points 16 times and 20+ points five times in 114 games...Since the 2014-15 campaign with Orlando (343 games played), he has scored 15+ points 184 times, 20+ points 100 times and 30+ points four times.

Fournier drilled a game-winning, 24-foot jumper as time expired on Nov. 5 vs. Cleveland and hit a buzzer-beating, 12-foot, floating jumper on Dec. 30 vs. Detroit...On Mar. 22 vs. Memphis, his driving layup with 17.7 seconds left tied the game and forced overtime...On Oct. 22 @ Boston, Evan Fournier had 14 points and dished out a career-high 10 assists.

T-ROSS, AKA "THE HUMAN TORCH"...

Terrence Ross provided tremendous scoring off the bench this season for the Orlando Magic...Ross scored in double figures 60 times this season, had 20+ points 20 times and 30+ points four times, including a season-high 35 points on Apr. 10 @ Charlotte...He led (or tied) the team in scoring 16 times and in assists twice this season...Ross has now scored 30+ points five times during his NBA career...His career-high is 51 points, set on Jan. 25, 2014 vs. the L.A. Clippers.

MAGIC TRICKS – SPECIAL RESERVE

Terrence Ross stood fourth in the NBA among all reserves in total points with 1,223 and led all reserves in three-pointers made with 217...His 217 three-pointers made were the most in NBA history by players who did not made a single start and was second in NBA history for most three-pointers made coming off the bench, trailing only Wayne Ellington, who made 218 in 2017-18.

On Mar. 22 vs. Memphis, Ross went 8-of-12 from three-point range...Ross tied for the fifth-most three-pointers in a game in franchise history and became the tenth player in a Magic uniform to ever connect on eight-or-rmore trifectas...The team record is 11, set by Dennis Scott on Apr. 18, 1996 vs. Atlanta.

Steve Clifford became the 14th head coach in Orlando Magic history on May 30, 2018...Brings more than 30 years of coaching experience at the NBA and collegiate level, including helping lead the Magic to the 2009 NBA Finals as an assistant coach...Returned to Orlando after spending the previous five seasons (2013-18) as head coach of the Charlotte Hornets...Compiled a record of 196-214 (.478) and led Charlotte to the NBA Playoffs in two of his first four seasons at the helm after the team qualified for the postseason just once in the previous 10 seasons...Recorded his 200th career NBA head coaching victory on Nov. 5, 2018 vs. Cleveland.

During his first season at the helm of the Magic, Clifford guided Orlando to a 42-40 record (.512), a 17-win improvement, which was the largest turnaround in the NBA and the second-biggest improvement in franchise history. The Magic clinched a berth into the 2019 NBA Playoffs for the first time since 2012 and captured the Southeast Division title, the franchise's first since 2009-10.

A native of Island Falls, Maine, Clifford arrived in Charlotte after spending the 2012-13 season as an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Lakers, first under Mike Brown and then under Mike D'Antoni...Prior to the Lakers, spent five seasons as an assistant coach with Orlando from 2007-12...As a member of Stan Van Gundy's staff, helped the Magic to a 259-135 record (.657) and five straight playoff appearances, including a trip to the 2009 NBA Finals...The team won 50 games or more in four straight seasons from 2007-11, winning three consecutive Southeast Division titles (2007-08, 2008-09 and 2009-10).

Before going to Orlando, Clifford spent four seasons as an assistant coach under Jeff Van Gundy with the Houston Rockets from 2003-07...Began his NBA career with the New York Knicks, serving as the team's advance scout in 2000-01 before moving to the bench as an assistant coach from 2001-03.

Prior to the NBA, Clifford spent 15 years coaching at the collegiate level, including four years as head coach at Adelphi University in Garden City, New York from 1995-99, where he posted a record of 86-36 (.705) and led the school to four straight 20-win seasons, becoming the first coach in school history to record consecutive 20-win campaigns, and four straight appearances in the NCAA Division II Tournament...His winning percentage remains the second-best of the 12 head coaches in the program's 65-year history.

Clifford began his college coaching career at Saint Anselm College in New Hampshire, where he spent four seasons as an assistant coach...Then served as an assistant coach for one year at Fairfield University, four seasons at Boston University and one season at Siena University before becoming the head coach at Adelphi...Also spent one season as an assistant coach at East Carolina University in 1999-2000 before moving to the NBA.

Clifford's first coaching experience came at Woodland High School in Maine, where he coached for two seasons after graduating from the University of Maine at Farmington with a degree in special education...Played four years for the Beavers, being named Best Defensive Player in his final two seasons while serving as team captain.
