## LAST GAME:

Apr. 14 vs. Milwaukee - Magic 113, Bucks 88: Paolo Banchero recorded 26 points, 11 rebounds and seven assists, as Orlando routed Milwaukee, 113-88, at a sold-out Kia Center. Franz Wagner scored 25 points for the Magic, while Cole Anthony added 13 points off the bench. Jonathan Isaac got the start for Orlando and tallied 10 points, eight rebounds and three blocked shots in 26 minutes. Khris Middleton and Bobby Portis each scored 17 points for the Bucks, while Damian Lillard added 16 points, but was just 2-of-14 from the floor. Orlando trailed by 11 points during the first half, but outscored Milwaukee during the second quarter, 25-12, to take a 47-42 halftime lead. The Magic put the game out of reach with an 18-2 run to open the fourth quarter, capped off with a three-pointer by Joe Ingles with 7:10 left in the contest. Orlando outscored the Bucks during the final stanza, 33-17.

## RECENT GAMES:

Apr. 12 @ Philadelphia - Sixers 125, Magic 113: Joel Embiid had 32 points, 13 rebounds and seven assists, as Philadelphia defeated Orlando, 125-113, at Wells Fargo Center. Tyrese Maxey netted 28 points for the Sixers, while Kelly Oubre Jr. added 21 points. Franz Wagner led the Magic with 24 points, Paolo Banchero tallied 22 points, 15 rebounds and seven assists, while Jalen Suggs scored 20 points. Philadelphia was 18 -of- 37 from beyond the three-point arc, while Orlando was just 8 -of- 27 . The Sixers jumped out to a 40-27 lead after the first quarter and never trailed again. The Magic cut the deficit to 113-107 with 4:35 left in the game, but it would be as close as they could get, as Philadelphia immediately answered with a 12-2 run.

Apr. 10 @ Milwaukee - Bucks 117, Magic 99: Bobby Portis scored 24 of his game-high 30 points during the first half, as Milwaukee defeated Orlando, 117-99, at Fiserv Forum. Damian Lillard had 29 points and nine assists for the Bucks, while Jae Crowder chipped in with 14 points. Cole Anthony led the Magic with 23 points off the bench, while Paolo Banchero had 20 points. Milwaukee, who was without Giannis Antetokounmpo and Khris Middleton due to injury, shot 51.2 percent and was $15-\mathrm{of}-40$ from three-point range. Orlando committed 16 turnovers, which led to 27 points for the Bucks. Milwaukee took control of the game during the second quarter, outscoring the Magic, 37-27. Portis went 7 -of- 8 from the floor and scored 15 points during the period. The Bucks led by double digits for the entire second half and by as many as 27 points.

Orlando is 61-65 all-time vs. Cleveland (38-26 at home, 23-39 on the road) during the regular season, including 2-2 this season (see recaps below)...The Magic lost all four meetings with the Cavaliers last season...Orlando is 4-2 vs. Cleveland in the playoffs (2009 Eastern Conference Finals)...The Magic have lost eight of the last 11 meetings with the Cavaliers, but won 12 of the last 21 matchups overall...The Magic have won eight of the last 11 matchups at home, but lost 15 of the last 20 on the road...General Manager Anthony Parker played three seasons (2009-12) with the Cavaliers...Head Coach Jamahl Mosley spent four seasons (2010-14) as an assistant with Cleveland...Assistant Coach Bret Brielmaier spent three seasons (2013-16) as an assistant with Cleveland...For all-time results vs. Cleveland, see p. 341 of the media guide...Dec. 6 @ Cleveland - Cavaliers 121, Magic 111: Donovan Mitchell poured in 35 points, as Cleveland defeated Orlando, 121-111, at Rocket Mortgage Fieldhouse. Darius Garland scored 26 points for the Cavaliers, while Max Strus added 17 points. Paolo Banchero led the Magic with a career-high 42 points, while Cole Anthony chipped in with 19 points. Cleveland shot 53.5 percent from the floor and was 14 -of- 34 from three-point range. Orlando struggled beyond the arc, connecting on just 2-of-23 from three-point range. The Cavaliers led from start to finish and exploded out of the gates, leading 37-20 after the first quarter, and by as many as 23 points during the first half. Orlando trimmed the deficit to eight points several times during the final stanza, but could get no closer...Dec. 11 vs. Cleveland - Magic 104, Cavaliers 94: Paolo Banchero tallied 20 points and 10 rebounds, as Orlando defeated Cleveland, 104-94, at a sold-out Amway Center. Franz Wagner had 19 points and eight rebounds for the Magic, while Goga Bitadze had 15 points and four blocked shots. Darius Garland poured in a game-high 36 points for the Cavaliers, while Donovan Mitchell netted 22 points. Orlando held Cleveland to just 35.3 percent shooting from the floor and 9 -of- 40 from three-point range. The Magic also scored 26 points off of turnovers. Orlando trailed $54-51$ at halftime, but dominated the third quarter, outscoring Cleveland, 30-15. Banchero scored 11 points during the third quarter alone...Jan. 22 vs. Cleveland - Cavaliers 126, Magic 99: Sam Merrill scored 26 points, including 8 -of-13 from three-point range, as Cleveland defeated Orlando, 126-99, at a sold-out Kia Center. Six Cavaliers scored in double figures. Donovan Mitchell tallied 25 points and 13 assists, while Jarrett Allen had 14 points and 11 rebounds. Paolo Banchero led the Magic with 18 points, while Franz Wagner added 17 points. Cleveland led from start to finish, leading by as many as 36 points during the second half. The Cavaliers shot 56.2 percent from the floor and was 20 -of- 38 from beyond the three-point arc. Orlando was outscored $38-19$ during the first quarter and trailed by double digits for most of the contest...Feb. 22 @ Cleveland Magic 116, Cleveland 109: Moritz Wagner tallied 22 points and seven rebounds off the bench, as Orlando defeated Cleveland, 116109, at Rocket Mortgage Fieldhouse. Six Magic players scored in double figures. Franz Wagner netted 14 points, while Cole Anthony added 13 points and six assists. Darius Garland, Max Strus and Jarrett Allen each scored 18 points for the Cavaliers. Both teams shot well from the floor. Cleveland shot 55.7 percent, while Orlando shot 51.2 percent, including 14-of-25 from three-point range. The Magic forced the Cavaliers to commit 19 turnovers, which led to 28 points. Orlando's bench also dominated play, outscoring Cleveland's reserves, 63-24.

The Orlando Magic have advanced to the NBA Playoffs for the $17^{\text {th }}$ time during their relatively short 35 -year history...The Magic also have won their seventh division championship (1995, 1996, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2019, 2024)...Orlando made two NBA Finals appearances after capturing Eastern Conference titles in 1995 and 2009...During their first trip in 1995, Orlando became the secondfastest team in NBA history to reach the Finals in just its sixth year of existence.

## FIRST THING'S FIRST...

Orlando takes on Cleveland in Game \#1 of its First Round playoff series on Apr. 20...The Magic are 13-13 all-time in Game \#1's during their playoff history ( $8-6$ at home, $4-7$ on the road, $1-0$ at Disney)...When Orlando wins Game \#1 of a playoff series, they are 10-4 in those series (only losses were in 2003 First Round vs. Detroit, 4-3; 2012 First Round vs. Indiana, 4-1; 2019 First Round vs. Toronto, 41; 2020 First Round vs. Milwaukee, 4-1).

## THIS DATE IN MAGIC HISTORY - APRIL 20...

April 20, 2010 - Dwight Howard was named the NBA Defensive Player of the Year for the second consecutive season having also won the award in 2008-09. Howard led the NBA in rebounds (13.2 rpg.) and blocks ( 2.78 blkpg.) and became the first player in NBA history to lead the league in both categories more than once, accomplishing the feat in consecutive seasons. Howard also paced the league in field goal percentage (.612), becoming the first player to lead the league in all three categories.
April 20, 2008 - Dwight Howard recorded his ninth 20-20 game of the season with 25 points and 22 rebounds, and Jameer Nelson scored 24 points, and the Orlando Magic defeated the Toronto Raptors 114-100 in Game \#1 of their first-round series of the 2008 Playoffs. Howard scored six straight points in a 10-0 run during the fourth quarter that sealed Orlando's first playoff win since 2003. He also blocked five shots and made 9 -of-11 free throws. The Magic's 43 points were the third-highest in a first quarter for the playoffs, and Orlando's nine 3-pointers tied Boston's record for most in a playoff quarter.
April 20, 2006 - Dwight Howard was named April's Eastern Conference Player of the Month. Howard averaged 18.1 points, shooting .559 while pulling down an average of 14.0 rebounds. Howard led the Magic to a 7-2 record in April and recorded an NBA-best seven double-doubles that month.
April 20, 2005 - Rookie Dwight Howard concluded the season by starting his $82^{\text {nd }}$ game of the regular season, becoming the first player in NBA history to start in every NBA regular season outing during his rookie campaign coming directly out of high school.
April 20, 1994 - Shaquille O'Neal scored a then-Magic record 53 points during a 121-101 victory vs. Minnesota.

## YOUTH GONE WILD...

The Orlando Magic entered the 2023-24 season with an average age of 24.79 years old...Orlando began the season with 11 players on its roster with three-or-less years of NBA experience and nine players age 24-and-under...The Magic roster's average number of seasons of NBA experience is 3.44 ...Last season, Orlando had the fourth-youngest roster in the NBA at 23.94 , according to the league's annual survey.

## LEVEL UP...

The Orlando Magic finished 47-35 (.573) during the 2023-24 campaign...Last season, Orlando was 34-48...The last time Orlando was 12 games above . 500 was Mar. $30,2012 \ldots$ The Magic won their $35^{\text {th }}$ game on Mar. 3 , surpassing last season's win total after their $61^{\text {st }}$ game of 2023-24.

The 47 victories are the most for Orlando since the 2010-11 season, where they finished $52-30 \ldots$ Orlando has also secured a winning percentage above .500 for the $15^{\text {th }}$ time in franchise history.

## MAKING STRIDES..

## ON THE ROAD AGAIN...

Orlando finished 18-23 this season on the road...Last season, the Magic were 14-27 on the road...The 18 road wins are the most for Orlando since 2010-11, when they went 23-18... Orlando has finished above .500 on the road five times in franchise history, with its best record being 27-14, done in both 2007-08 and 2008-09.

## **MAGIC TRICKS - WESTWARD BOUND**

After opening the 2023-24 regular season at home on Oct. 25 vs. Houston, the Orlando Magic hit the road for a four-game, west coast trip Oct. 27-Nov. 2...lt marked the earliest west coast trip in franchise history and the only west coast trip that has ever started in October for Orlando...The earliest previous trip out west occurred during the 2017-18 campaign, when the Magic traveled to Denver, Golden State and Portland from Nov. 10-15 (Orlando went 1-3)... Paolo Banchero led (or tied) the team in scoring 44 times, in rebounding 27 times and in assists 42 times...He scored in double figures 78 times, 20+ points 54 times, $30+$ points 11 times and $40+$ points twice, including a career-high 43 points on Jan. $3 @$ Sacramento...Banchero recorded a team-high 16 double-doubles and two triple-doubles...Banchero pulled down 10+ rebounds 13 times, including a season-high 15 rebounds on Apr. 12 @ Philadelphia, and dished out 10+ assists five times, including a career-high 11 assists on Jan. 5 @ Denver and Mar. 21 vs. New Orleans.

During his brief NBA career, Banchero has now scored $20+$ points 94 times ( 54 times this season), $30+$ points 17 times (11 times this season) and 40 + points twice (both this season), including a career-high 43 points on Jan. 3 @ Sacramento and 42 points on Dec. 6 @ Cleveland.

## **MAGIC TRICKS - DREIßIG-FOR-DREIßIG BY FRANZ**

Franz Wagner scored 30+ points in three consecutive games from Nov. 26-Dec. 1 (30, Nov. 26 vs. Charlotte; 31, Nov. 29 vs. Washington; 31, Dec. 1 vs. Washington)...It is the first time an Orlando player has scored $30+$ points in three consecutive outings since Feb. 13-25, 2011, when Dwight Howard did it in four straight games...The franchise record is 14 straight games, set by Tracy McGrady from Mar. 5-Apr. 1, 2003.

On Feb. 4 @ Detroit, Wagner tied his career-high with 38 points...He was 17 -of-25 from the floor, including 4-of-7 from three-point range...Amazingly, Wagner did not have a single free throw made or attempted in the game...The 38 points were the second-most in a game without a free throw made in franchise history...Dennis Scott scored 41 points on Apr. 13, 1993 vs. Milwaukee without going to the charity stripe (16-31 FG, 9-19 3FG).

## DYNAMIC DUO...

Paolo Banchero and Franz Wagner scored $\underline{20+}$ points each in the same game 23 times this season (17-6 record) and $\underline{43 \text { times during }}$ their careers (23-20 record).

## AND THIS IS MY OTHER BROTHER, DARRYL...I MEAN MOE...

Moritz Wagner led (or tied) the team in scoring three times, in rebounding eight times and in assists once...He scored in double figures 49 times and $20+$ points four times this season, including a season-high 27 points on Nov. 24 vs. Boston...Wagner scored 849 points off the bench ( $10.7 \mathrm{ppg} ., 79$ games off bench), which ranked sixth in the NBA.

## COLE WORLD...

Cole Anthony led (or tied) the team in scoring eight times, in rebounding three times and in assists 14 times...He scored in double figures 50 times, $20+$ points 10 times and $30+$ points once, including a season-high 30 points on Nov. 26 vs. Charlotte.

During his brief NBA career, Anthony has now scored $\underline{20+}$ points 41 times (10 times this season) and $\underline{30+}$ points five times (once this season), including a career-high 37 points on May 16, 2021 @ Philadelphia.

Anthony had 15 points and dished out a season-high 10 assists on Nov. 21 vs. Toronto...He has now dished out $10+$ assists five times during his NBA career and tallied 13 career double-doubles (three this season).


Anthony scored 937 points off the bench ( 11.6 ppg., 81 games off bench), which ranked fourth in the NBA and his $1020+$ point games as a reserve ranked fourth in the Eastern Conference and eighth in the league...Last season, his eight 20+ point games as a reserve ranked third in the Eastern Conference and he scored 730 points off the bench ( 13.0 ppg ., 56 games), which ranked fourth in the Eastern Conference and eighth in the NBA.

## **MAGIC TRICKS - ${ }^{\text {TH }}$ MAN ${ }^{* *}$

On Nov. 26 vs. Charlotte, Cole Anthony tallied 30 points, seven rebounds and seven assists...Then on Nov. 29 vs. Washington, he recorded 25 points, six rebounds and five assists...Anthony was one of only three bench players in the NBA this season with multiple games of $25+$ points, $5+$ rebounds and $5+$ assists, joining Malik Monk (4, Sacramento) and Dalano Banton (3, Portland).

## SUGGS - ALL-DEFENSE, MOST IMPROVED...

Jalen Suggs led (or tied) the team in scoring five times, in rebounding twice and in assists eight times... He scored in double figures 53 times and 20+ points 11 times, including a career-high 27 points on Jan. 5 @ Denver...To compare, entering this season, Suggs had scored $20+$ points 10 times.

Suggs recorded at least one steal 57 times and two-or-more steals 31 times, including a career-high six steals on Nov. 9 vs. Atlanta...He also had at least one blocked shot 35 times and two-or-more blocks 11 times, including a career-high-tying three blocked shots on Jan. 12 @ Miami.

## **MAGIC TRICKS - SUGGS FROM DEEP**

On Jan. 5 @ Denver, Jalen Suggs made seven three-pointers...Then on Jan. 7 vs. Atlanta, Caleb Houstan made seven threepointers...The only other time in franchise history that two different players made seven-or-more three-pointers in consecutive games was Mar. 4-5, 1996, when Dennis Scott made eight, then Nick Anderson drained seven.

After making seven three-pointers on Jan. 5, Jalen Suggs then connected on six three-pointers on Jan. 7 vs. Atlanta...Suggs became only the third player in franchise history to make 6+ three-pointers in consecutive games, joining Dennis Scott (Feb. 20-21, 1996; Feb. $28-29,1996$ ) and Evan Fournier (Dec. 1-3, 2019) as the only Magic players ever to accomplish the feat...No Orlando player has ever had 6+ three-pointers in three straight outings.

Suggs also became just the fifth player in Magic history to make 4+ three-pointers in four-or-more consecutive games, joining Dennis Scott, Jameer Nelson, Terrence Ross and Nick Anderson...The longest streak with 4+ three-pointers made in Orlando history is six games, done by Scott from Feb. 28-Mar. 8, 1996...Jameer Nelson made 4+ trifectas in five straight contests from Dec. 23, 2012-Jan. 5, 2013.

## MINISTER OF DEFENSE...AND OFFENSE?!?...

Jonathan Isaac recorded at least one blocked shot 41 times and two-or-more blocks 21 times, including a season-high four blocked shots on Jan. 31 @ San Antonio...He also had at least one steal 33 times and two-or-more steals 10 times.

Isaac scored in double figures 13 times this season, including a career-high-tying 25 points on Mar. 23 vs. Sacramento...It marked the first time Isaac scored $20+$ points since he had 21 on Dec. 15, 2019 @ New Orleans...During his last 20 games played (Feb. 24-Apr. 14), Isaac shot . 511 (24-47) from three-point range.

## BACK-TO-BACKS...

The Orlando Magic had 15 back-to-back sets during the 2023-24 campaign and were 12-18 in those outings (7-8 in the first game, 5-10 in the second game)...Last season, Orlando had 13 back-to-backs and was $7-18$ in those outings ( $6-7$ in the first game, 1-11 in the second game).

## G LEAGUE GOSSIP...

The Osceola Magic, Orlando's NBA G League affiliate, finished the regular season with a record of 22-12 and as the \#1 seed in the Eastern Conference...They were eliminated from the NBA G League Playoffs by Long Island in the Eastern Conference Semifinals with a 120-112 loss on Apr. 5...Osceola plays its home games at Osceola Heritage Park at Silver Spurs Arena...All team records and statistics reset following the completion of the NBA G League Winter Showcase in December, where Osceola went 10-6.

On April 11, 2023, the Orlando Magic announced that it relocated its NBA G League affiliate to Kissimmee, Fla., and it was rebranded as the Osceola Magic...The Magic finished the 2022-23 regular season with a record of 18-14...However, after a four-way tie-breaker, they finished eighth in the Eastern Conference and failed to reach the playoffs.

The Orlando Magic's G League affiliate captured the 2021 NBA G League championship, defeating Delaware in the title game on Mar. 11, 2021, $97-78 \ldots$ All games were played at a single-site location at the ESPN Wide World of Sports Complex at Walt Disney World Resort near Orlando, Fla.

## DeVOS FAMILY CONTINUES TO GIVE BACK...

More than 30 years ago, shortly after acquiring the Orlando Magic franchise, Rich DeVos had one request - please don't call him the owner..."The real stake in the team is the community and people who are the fans who come to the games," DeVos said at the time..."We're just the caretakers of your team and we'll try to do a good job for you"...On Aug. 14, as part of the Orlando Magic's continuing commitment to the Central Florida community, the team announced $\$ 1,000,000$ in grants to be distributed through the Orlando Magic Youth Foundation (OMYF) in three ways - a summer grant cycle, a winter grant cycle and microgrants...The first set of grants (summer grant cycle) totaling $\$ 370,000$ were distributed in surprise visits on Aug. 10 nonprofit organizations in Orange and Seminole counties assisting at-risk youth in Central Florida...Magic Community Ambassadors Nick Anderson and Bo Outlaw presented the 10 organizations an OMYF novelty check with the amount they will be granted at each of the visits...The second set of grant recipients (winter grant cycle) will be announced in February 2024 through surprise visits as well...In addition, the Magic will award microgrants to smaller, up-and-coming local nonprofits to assist them in growing their organizations...Approximately $\$ 530,000$ will be distributed to the second set of grantees (to be determined) in February along with $\$ 100,000$ in microgrants for a total of $\$ 1$ million to assist at-risk youth in Orange, Seminole, Brevard, Lake, Polk, Volusia, and Osceola counties...This marks the $16^{\text {th }}$ time the team has distributed at least $\$ 1$ million to the community with the Magic granting more than $\$ 29$ million over the past 34 years to local nonprofit community organizations through the OMYF.

Orlando's NBA franchise since 1989, the Magic's mission is to be world champions on and off the court, delivering legendary moments every step of the way. Prior to joining the Mavericks, spent four seasons (2010-14) as an assistant coach with the Cleveland Cavaliers...Before joining the Cavaliers, spent five seasons (2005-10) with the Denver Nuggets...Tenure began in player development and advance scouting, before becoming an assistant coach for his last three seasons (2007-10) with the franchise...The Nuggets reached the playoffs, winning 50 games or more, each of his final three years...
